Plymouthite fined for petty larceny by judge at Huron

A 28-year-old Plymouth man pleaded guilty to charges of petty larceny at Huron July 27 and paid fines and costs amounting to \$56.20.

Desmond V. Donnenwirth admitted to police he and a companion, Rod Edwards, 25, Canton, entered a Fied Piper custard stand at Rts. 2 and 6 and took about \$11 from the cash box.

The two men were arrested by Huron police about 10 p.m. July 26. They told police they found the keys to the establishment near their premises earlier in the evening of July 26, about the time the proprietor, Arthur Kurtz, reported their loss to the police. They returned later, used the keys and took the money.

About \$4 of the \$11 which was taken has been recovered.

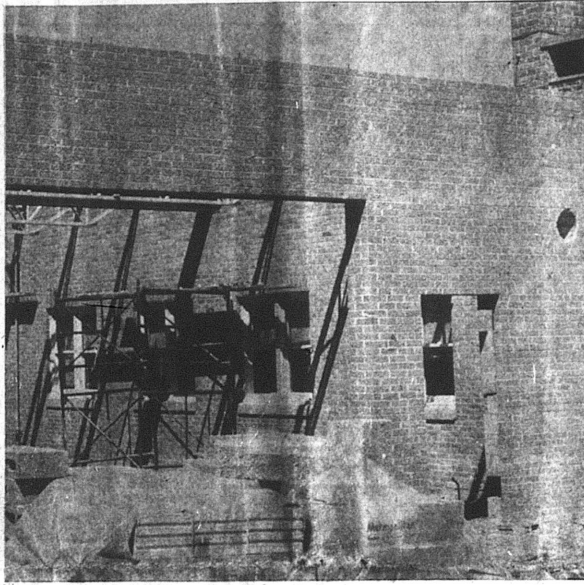

4.5 acre fire reservoir plan wins approval of council here

A natural pond covering about 4.5 acres to furnish a fire reservoir in its area will be constructed in the south end of the village by Army Engineer Reserve units.

The possibility is strong that after the pond has been installed and its primary function serviced, recreational facilities may be obtained.

Four property holders appeared by proxy before the village council Tuesday night to signify their approval of arrangements made by one of them, Gerald W. Caywood.

Commanding General XX U.S. Corps, Ft. Hayes, Columbus, has approved participation of Co. A, 865th Airborne Engineer Bn. (Heavy Construction) to furnish earth moving and grading services.

The area lies behind the

properties of Caywood, Robert Danhoff, Willard W. Wirth and D. J. Doran. Access to it is available from all properties. The homes now located in Route 61, south of the village, are served by a four-inch water line which, Caywood said, "most likely would be totally inadequate in case of a fire in the vicinity, which also includes the Plymouth Drive-In theater."

Mayor William Fazio read a report on the progress of the fire house, concluding with a statement that Focht Bros. estimates the building will be completed within two months. Fazio also discussed the opening of Maple street to alleviate the traffic problem at the high school and the obtaining of a right-of-way on the D. W. Ellis property in Walnut street

for an additional loop of waterlines.

Placing of fire signs and posts for West Broadway and Trux street prohibiting parking on those sides of the streets where the fire hydrants are located was opposed.

James C. Davis, representing Shelby Mutual Insurance Co., explained the additional insurance liability coverage available to the village in addition to what it now has on a fleet policy on its 12 transportation units. Since another company is interested in offering a policy to the village, it was agreed that specifications will be issued and bids received for further action.

DDD day Sunday, H hour 2 a. m., say NOTelCo. officers

Sunday is DDD day for telephone subscribers here.

Promptly at 2 a.m. Northern Ohio Telephone Co. will inaugurate direct distance dialing, by which telephone calls may be executed between Plymouth and other exchanges without the intervention of an operator.

Plymouth's direct distance dial code is 160.

For calls within the "160" region, the subscriber follows this procedure:
1. Dial 160.
2. Then dial the number of the party sought, as Chery 3-2345.

If the subscriber does not know the number of his party, or if he wishes to place a person-to-person or a collect call, he should call the operator.

The operator will tell him the party's number if the call is station-to-station. The subscriber then follows the procedure set forth above.

To place a call outside the direct distance dialing code area (that is, outside of an area generally north of Delaware, west of Oberlin, south of the Michigan line and west to the Indiana line) the subscriber:

1. Dial 160, then
2. Dial the area code number (for example, Berea is 216). This he may obtain from the operator.

3. Then dial the number of the party desired, thus: 160 then 216 then EXchange 3-24-56.

ORDINANCE NO. 19-60
AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE EMPLOYMENT OF SPECIAL COUNSEL TO PREPARE AND SUPERVISE PROCEEDINGS REQUIRED FOR THE SUBMISSION OF THE QUESTION TO THE ELECTIONS OF THE ISSUANCE OF SEWAGE SYSTEM AND DISPOSAL PLANT BONDS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, RICHLAND AND HURON COUNTIES, OHIO:

Section 1. That the law firm of Squire, Sanders & Dempsey of Cleveland, Ohio, municipal bond attorneys, be employed by this Village as Special Counsel for the purpose of preparing and supervising the proceedings of this Village required for the submission of the question to the electors of a proposed issue of sewage system and disposal plant bonds in an amount now estimated of \$150,000 at the general election to be held November 8, 1960.

Section 2. That for the services so to be rendered by said law firm a fee of \$125 shall be paid by the Village which sum is hereby appropriated and set aside for such purpose; and the Clerk of this Village is hereby authorized and directed to make appropriate certification as to the availability of such funds and to issue appropriate orders for the payment of said fee as the same shall become payable.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
