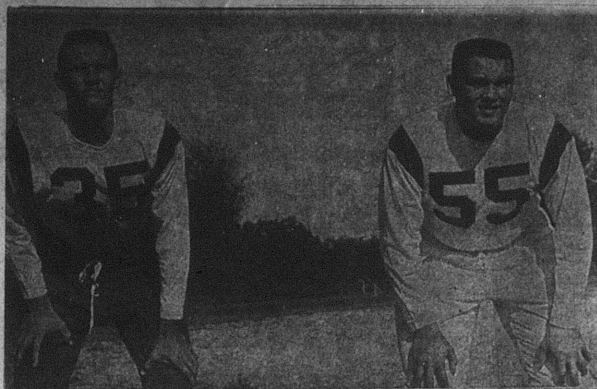

Last NCC preview tomorrow to test spirit of Big Red eleven

Preview of North Central conference's last year game will be staged in Mary Fete park tomorrow at 8 p.m., with three of the five teams in the loop banging heads in abbreviated contests.

Plymouth's Big Red, more red than big in pre-season scrimmages, will meet Colonel Crawford in the opener.

Berlin Heights' Tigers, decimated by graduation, will tackle up-and-coming Western Reserve in the second encounter.

The Roughriders return to play Colonel Crawford and Berlin Heights will meet Plymouth in the finale.

Game time is 8 p.m. Tickets are \$1 for adults, 50 cents for bona fide pupils.

IT IS APPARENT TO SIDELINE quarterbacks who've watched the local entry in four ill-fated scrimmages, the latest against Waynedale here Friday, that a dull season is in store unless the Big Red comes up with some hard-nosed football.

"The size is there and there's some speed," one old-timer said Friday night. "But up to now I can't see that there's anybody who wants to play football."

He was quick to qualify his observations: "Not among the first dozen or so, anyway!" In this opinion he has agreement from the coaching staff, as any bystander can hear for himself during practice sessions.

Nevertheless, Friday's scrimmage against Waynedale, a smartly coached outfit with one giant of a fullback and

three other smooth operators in the backfield, was not without its bright spots.

It appears that Dayton Reed's passing to Jim Russell and, when he's back from his vacation, Ken Van Loo will gain substantial ground for the Big Red.

And it would seem that when Russell rounds into shape, he will be useful on outside plays. Dan Carter gained some yardage against Waynedale. Fate Christian seems a day late in gaining the form he displayed last year.

The forward wall has size but not much speed. Phil Slone has found a home at center and Dave Barbour is a sure-fire starter at guard. Ben Root has a tackle berth nailed down. He will play with contact lenses this season.

Ken Van Loo will see much service at end, certainly on offense, perhaps on defense.

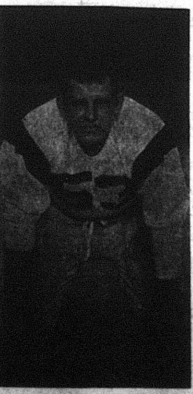
Gary and Phil Fletcher, Jim Fetters and Dennis Sprowles are due for considerable service on the other side of the line. They are long on height, for the most part, but short on seasoning.

"THIS IS A YEAR OF REBUILDING at Berlin Heights and we don't have much to rebuild with," says Coach C. B. (Spec) Sanders of his Tigers. Six let-terms are back, headed by Co-Capt. Harold Linden and Bob Robertson. The others are Charles Hensley, 172-pound fullback, Don Leonard, tackle; Larry Leimbach, end, and Kenny Cline, guard.

This is the smallest squad at the Erie county school in five years. Only 27 players have turned out. Seven of these are freshmen.

"If no one gets hurt, we should improve as the year goes on," Sanders says. He implies he doesn't expect much tomorrow.

Sheriff dismisses Borgia

Deputy Sheriff John Borgia has been discharged by his boss, Mrs. Harry Broome, "for misconduct in the line duty."

Mrs. Broome would not elaborate to an Advertiser inquiry last night. "He's the Republican candidate for sheriff and I am a Republican and I will say no more," Mrs. Broome announced.

Borgia defeated Deputy Herbert Shaffer, his senior, in the GOP primaries in May. He will oppose Paul Simon for the office, richest plum in Huron county politics, in November, if charges by Mrs. Broome do not reach the criminal courts.

The Republican executive committee was to make a statement last night. It has been an open secret for some time that Mrs. Broome, appointed by the commissioners to succeed her late husband, has kept close watch on Borgia, a vigorous and keen police officer accused by many of having "a Wyatt Earp approach to the law — a sort of crusade to put every wrongdoer behind bars." It was also apparent that Shaffer was disappointed in losing to Borgia, his junior.

An unimpeachable source told The Advertiser last night that "what touched this was an incident in Bellevue. Borgia got a report some boys broke some windows. He tracked 'em down and told them they'd have to pay for the windows. He didn't bring 'em into juvenile court. The sheriff got wind of it and BOOM!"

Borgia could not be reached for comment.

Enrollment up to 1,178 pupils

Enrollment in Plymouth public school has increased by 11-55 per cent, Supt. Maynard J. Coon reported Tuesday afternoon after 1,178 pupils reported for first-day classes.

Enrollment increased by 18 from 1,160 last year.

Plymouth Elementary school has 330 pupils in six grades, two sections each. Shiloh Elementary school has 320 pupils enrolled, on the same basis.

By grades, enrollment is follows:

First, Plymouth, 57; Shiloh, 58;

Second, Plymouth, 55; Shiloh, 57;

Third, Plymouth, 50; Shiloh, 68;

Fourth, Plymouth, 51; Shiloh, 44;

Fifth, Plymouth, 54; Shiloh, 44;

Sixth, Plymouth, 63; Shiloh, 49;

A TOTAL OF 287 PUPILS has enrolled in Shiloh Junior High school, in grades seven through nine.

Plymouth High school enrollment is 241 pupils.

By classes, enrollment is recorded thus:

Class of 1961, 86; Class of 1962, 76; Class of 1963, 79; Class of 1964, 81; Class of 1965, 104; Class of 1966, 102.

Coon said overcrowding was apparent in both the high school and the junior schools, conditions which are expected to be alleviated next spring when the present building program is completed.

Storm water gripes grate on council

Five indignant residents of Trux street groused with village council Tuesday night and withdrew with mild promises and a suggestion.

If they will reduce the complaint to writing, Mayor William Fazio told the five, the village council will take it up with the Akron, Canton and Youngstown railroad to ascertain if relief can be obtained.

Horace A. Goldsmith and Billy Vanderpool were the two spokesmen for the five, who also included Fred Barnes, J. J. McCurdy and James Reynolds.

Goldsmith exhibited snapshots of water which filled his basement and resulted in such a pool in his yard that a six-foot man swam in it with depths over his head.

Vanderpool asserted the fault to be of the railway, which apparently refuses to install a storm sewer large enough to convey storm drainage from high ground in Route 603 east of the railway.

It also said the state has some liability, in that water is shed by the highway onto the adjoining properties.

Before the remonstrance pressure could abate, Donald J. Willet asked the council if it intends to afford relief to properties in East Main street. Residents of Plymouth street then asked for relief of flood waters draining from west of Wall street and south of Mills avenue.

After two hours of discussion, these solutions were decided upon:

1. Trux street residents will be asked to await the results of a representation to the AC&Y railway, to start which they must file a written complaint.

2. Assistance of a federal employee will be sought to determine if larger conduits need to be laid between Sandusky and Portner streets or east of the latter street.

3. Street Supervisor Henry Trauger will investigate the feasibility of installing a catch basin in Wall street west of Plymouth and north of West High street to trap storm waters flowing from west of Wall street.

To avoid advertising for bids, council awarded a con-

tract to furnish insurance coverage for the village motor fleet to Lofland Insurance agency at \$750.69 and to State Agency, Inc., whose local agent is Mayor Fazio, for comprehensive liability at \$523.78.

Thirty-five dead trees will be removed from Greenlaw cemetery, by the lowest and best bidder, the council ruled.

Assistance of its fiscal advisers having been of little value so far, council said it will proceed to prepare a financing plan for a sanitary sewer system estimated to cost about \$625,000.

Mr. Shepherd and Mrs. Beck attended last rites in San Leandro Friday.

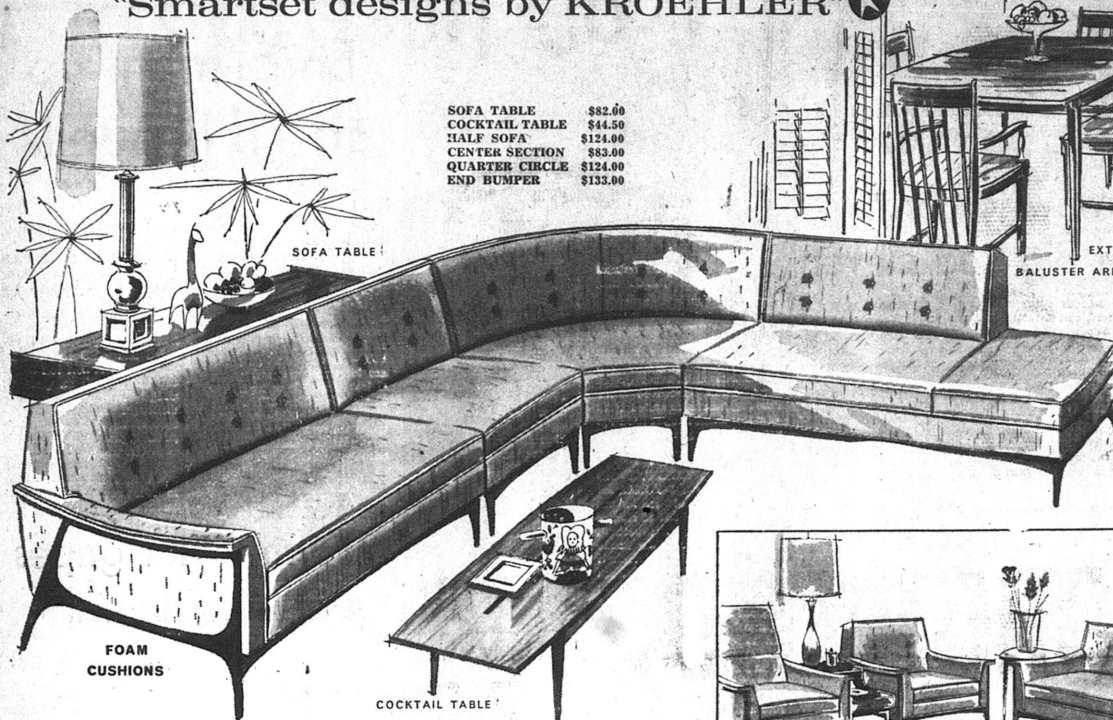

Big business

Opening of public schools brings to mind that our schools are big business, really big business.

What is done there affects 1,100 young people every day, directly affects about 800 families, indirectly every family.

More than a quarter of a million dollars is paid out in salaries for teachers, administrators, managers and maintenance personnel each year.

Slightly over 52 per cent of that expense, as indeed all costs of the system, is borne by the taxpayer locally. The remainder derives from the state foundation fund.

The clerk of the school board deals with almost half a million dollars annually.

The schools operate two restaurants which serve about 135,000 meals a year. The cost is about \$36,000 a year.

Before capital investment needs are considered, operational expense amounts to about \$325 per pupil per year.

To put it otherwise, every man, woman and child of the Plymouth district has a share in the education of our children amounting to about \$92 annually.

Yes, the schools are big business, and every citizen is a stockholder in that business, whether he likes it or not.

Because the schools are publicly supported, they are subject, and rightfully so, to criticism. Constructive criticism is good for education, good for teachers and good for pupils.

By reason of control over the state board of education, every voter has a means of expressing his views as to how those schools should be run, so far as minimum curriculum and policies go.

By reason of his control over the local school board, every voter has a means of expressing his views on such matters as finances, housing, extra-curricular programs and the like.

Every voter ought to express himself. He ought to do it fairly, properly and often.

Fairly means without rancor in the right spirit without bias, for the common good.

Properly means through the proper channels: to the school board member, preferably when it is convened in regular or special session, but at other times if necessary, in writing where need be. But not through teachers or supervisors.

Often means when the citizen has something worthwhile saying, that is pertinent, substantial and well-considered. It also means every time he has something pertinent, substantial and well-considered.

The professional school man or woman wants to deal with education. He prefers to have policies and finances debated and settled by the public which he serves. In part because the public has abdicated responsibilities, professional school personnel has acquired enormous powers, powers which to some extent have been regularized by statute.

There is good reason to quarrel about those statutes, we think, but that is not the fault of the incumbents who seek to serve as they have been taught and have learned how to serve.

They can serve better when they receive encouragement for what is good, constructive criticism for what is bad, and polite treatment in either event.

A newspaper's job is to report faithfully the deliberations of the school board, the development within the schools that are properly in the public domain the results of policies pursued or not pursued by the school management, and achievements, or lack thereof, of products of the schools, whether during school hours or outside.

In these duties we shall not be remiss. But we don't know it all, not by a long shot. When we are right, we naturally look for support.

The best kind of public education is that which meets the needs of the people whose children are being educated at the lowest possible expense, in keeping with the dignity of man and the rights he has fought to obtain.

The best way to insure such education is to speak up when it's necessary, to pipe down when there's nothing to be said, and to pay the fair freight, no more and no less.

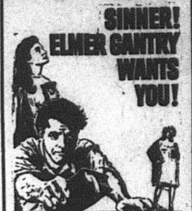

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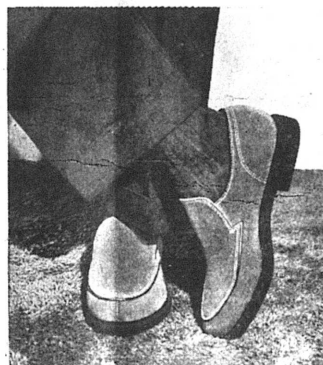
