New elementary school likely to be ready for use Feb. 6

Occupancy of the new elementary center at Shiloh may be possible by Feb. 6, Plymouth Board of Education was told Dec. 14.

Architect James Crawford said he has been informed by Weithman Bros., Inc., Gallion, general contractors, that barring delays in installation of the heating system, that date will be met.

The new facility will house the eight sections of the four lower grades, relieving pressure in the older structures. To avoid ending the fiscal year in the red, the board adopted some novel procedures.

Annual reorganization meeting took place last night. Because of fundamental changes in the demographic pattern in northern Richland and southern Huron counties, the board was forced to take another costly step. It will buy a 66-passenger, rather than a 60-passenger, bus, in financing of which the state will participate.

Supt. Maynard J. Coon told the board two families with 22 children between them have moved to the area west of the village. The net gain in school children was 16. Additionally, he said, families in the lower economic order, many of whom are headed by unskilled workers, are now doubling up with relatives because of adverse economic conditions. Councilman Donald H. Levering reported a complaint registered with him by Ray Dinninger, a service station propri-

etor in Sandusky street. Dinninger told Levering he gathered up a case of beer bottles Sunday morning. He implied they had been thrown on his premises by revelers at an adjacent dance hall and threatened to summon the Huron county sheriff if action is not taken.

Although the door to the village rest rooms beneath the clerk's office was locked, it was broken down, Levering said.

He had fire in his eye when he asked where the police were at this time.

Mayor William Fazio stepped into the discussion at this point, defending the police. He said he told the dance hall operator, Frank Lillo, to close at midnight, whereas Donald Shaver, adviser of Teen Town USA, claimed he had been authorized to remain open until 1 a.m. Fazio denied he had given Shaver such permission.

The rest room had been closed earlier because of a broken gas line, alleged to have been done by teenagers attending the dance hall.

Despite an intervening conversation on electric matters, Councilman Charles Vansdale returned to the dance hall subject like a lever on a besieged mine. He flatly said he thinks something must be done to correct what he called "continual disturbances" and asked for an ordinance to do so.

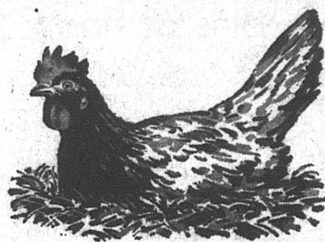

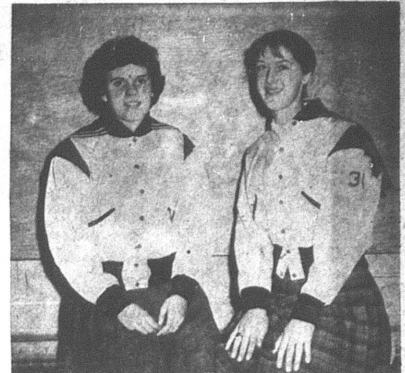

Dallas Newton, six feet seven inches tall, can't jump with Culver, who's a mere 6-2, but he bailed out a few rebounds.

Each of these players out-reaches the best Plymouth can offer, height-wise.

For the Big Red, it was the first loss at home since Jan. 16, 1959, when Union dumped Plymouth 45 to 55. The Big Red has lost only three of its last 30 home engagements. Bloomville downed the Luron entry, when it played as Huron

Valley, on Jan. 14, 1958, by a count of 53 to 49.

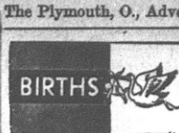

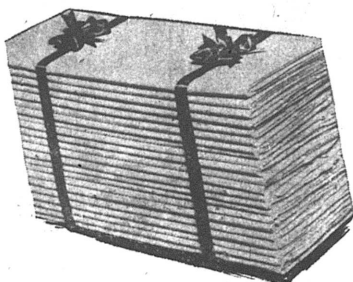
