Shelbian arrested in Hass station theft

A 17-year-old Shelby youth was arrested by local police at his home there yesterday morning on a charge of breaking and entering Hass Marathon service station here Oct. 25 and making off with about \$400.

Police say Thomas Glick, whose home is in Gamble street next to Amato's market, has confessed the theft.

They say they found Glick hiding under a table in the basement of his home.

Glick is said to have escaped from Shelby police at Delaware while he was being escorted to a state penal institution near Columbus and was sought for parole violation.

Charged here with unlawful attempts to obtain credit and indicted by the Huron county grand jury on that charge, Donald Searles, 40, Greenwich route 2, was sentenced to stay out of Ohio for five years and given one year to pay the costs of the action against him by Judge Robert J. Vetter this week.

Complaining witness in the case was Donald E. Fetters.

Coomie Swetcoff, 41, pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of auto theft and was given a year to pay the costs of the action against him.

Delbert Irvin, 32, formerly of Plymouth, pleaded guilty and waived grand jury action on a charge of auto theft. He was sentenced to five years' banishment from Ohio and probation by the juvenile court was continued.

Grand jury to sift facts on teacher

A Huron county grand jury will decide whether there is sufficient evidence to indict John Stansberry, 26, Plymouth High school teacher, for assault and battery upon a minor.

Represented by Robert D. R. Y. Y., Columbus, general counsel for the Ohio Education association and author of the standard text book on school law, Stansberry pleaded not guilty before Mayor William Fazio at 8 p. m. Friday.

Fazio read the affidavit, sworn before Police Chief Robert L. Meiser by John Selick, Jr. charging that Stansberry committed assault and battery against John Selick, 3rd, and specifying that the boy's head was thumped against the floor, giving him a blackened eye.

Since the charge was laid under a portion of the Revised Code of Ohio, the mayor's court has no jurisdiction. Stansberry's bond of \$200 was continued pending decision of the case by the Huron county grand jury.

About 15 persons, including four from Shiloh and four pupils, two of them openly hostile to Stansberry, appeared for the hearing. School board president David E. Cook and Supt. Maynard J. Coon attended.

OFG told to reduce demands or suffer under old contract

Plymouth has made its last offer on natural gas rates, its village council said Nov. 21.

Ohio Fuel Gas Co. will either revise its original offer or continue with the contract rates which expired Sept. 20, the council said.

Plymouth's offer differs from what Ohio Fuel wants from its 600 customers here by about 99 cents per house-hold per month, the council claimed.

Both parties agree upon a minimum of \$2.50 monthly for all customers, whether they use gas for heating or only for cooking, and a rate of 25 cents per 1,000 cu. ft. for the first 1,500 cu. ft. Where the contention arises is in the next bracket of 98,500 cu. ft. Plymouth offers 72 cents per 1,000 cu. ft., Ohio Fuel wants

75 cents.

"I individually feel," said Councilman Donald E. Akers, "that if Plymouth will pay 99 cents additional to what Shelby customers pay for the same services, then Plymouth is paying a fair share of the cost of operating the Shelby office of the company."

Councilman Elmer E. Markley, who retires next month, was more emphatic. "Either agree to our proposal or give us a duplicate of the Shelby contract, which has two and a half more years to run, so that we can negotiate a renewal when that runs out."

Akers, speaking for the committee headed by Charles Vanasdale, said Plymouth has offered the supplier a net increase of \$7,200 annually,

versus the \$14,000 which the company seeks.

Cloyce V. Messenger, manager of Ohio Fuel at Shelby, said he would report the council's views to his principals.

Again with the tie-breaking vote of Mayor William Fazio, the firing of Alden E. Stilson & Associates, Ltd., Columbus, as consulting engineers for the sanitary sewage system was affirmed, 4 to 3. On advice of Solicitor Joseph F. Dush, the council delayed engaging a successor to Stilson, affording Stilson 10 days to make his position known.

A re-shuffling of finances saw the water fund buy four and the electric fund buy 18 of the four per cent councilmanic bonds which were sold to finance the fire house.

The examinations are limited to persons over 18 years of age. The mobile unit will be in the Foodland parking unit from 1 to 4 p.m.

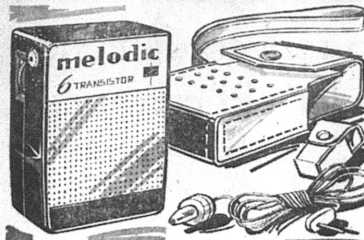

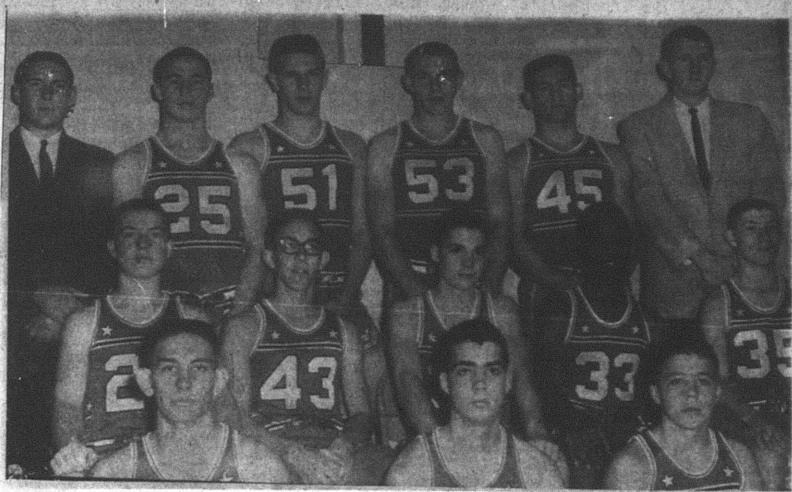
