New school tax defeated again, 582 to 398

For the second time in five weeks, electors of Plymouth Local School district rejected Tuesday the leadership of their board of education by overwhelming defeat of a new five-mill operating levy.

The score was 398 votes for the levy, 582 against, only slightly less emphatic than the outcome of the Nov. 7 bailoting, when the issue polled 353 votes, with 547 opposed. The difference in result this time was a fraction of a per cent more favorable.

This time the issue carried two precincts — Shiloh and New Haven township, the former by two votes, the other

by three ballots.

The turnout - 995 voters - was the largest in the history of the district for a special election, if for no other reason than that no special election has ever been conducted in it before. About 58 per cent of the eligible voters turned out in generally nasty weather.

By precincts the unofficial vote was:

New Haven township	11	8

Shiloh	76	74
Bloominggrove township	31	63

Only 39.4 per cent of the valid votes cast favored the ssue, which if approved would have raised the tax rate here to \$45.50 for each \$1,000 valuation, probably the chief reason why it was turned down. A 55 per cent majority was required for passage.

The board of education met last night in the high school to consider what and where to cut. Non-curricular activities at the junior high level seem likely prospects for abbreviation or termination.

What to do?

The results of Tuesday's special election are not surprising.

That electors of the school district chose not to support the board of education's request for five mills of additional operating money was, we feel, a foregone conclusion.

What are the reasons for it?

These have been previously postulated and it will do no good to cite them again.

What to do about it? Legislators in the Ohio General Assembly ought to take note this is another expression of sentiment in favor of a drastic alteration in the method of supporting public schools. Electors of Richland county have their own financial worries and they don't cotton much to footing the bills in, say, Vinton or Noble counties, to mention but two of the nearly 30 Ohio counties that don't pay their own


The school foundation program was ingeniously devised. The principle of establishing a unit of 29 pupils and one teacher was well taken. But the state's support of such units is simply insufficient. Whether local sources can carry the remainder of the load is a moot point. What is important is they obviously think they cannot and won't vote otherwise.

Cutbacks at the local level are obviously necessary. It is proper that boards of education should determine what they will be. It would not be proper for any board of education to make cuts along lines that will penalize the better pupils. We can do without athletics, we can do with. out music, we can do (and are doing) without driver education), we can do without some extra-curricular activities such as dramatics, yearbooks and such. We cannot do without physics, foreign languages, mathematics, English and social sciences.

There must be no tampering with the amount and quality of these subjects unless the adjustment be upward.

And if worse comes to worse, we insist we can do without specialized job training. It's nice to be able to offer training with tools. But it's expensive, as the board's proposed budget for next year illustrates. It's much more valuable to train minds, more than hands, and so far as we can see, much less expensive.

If the proponents of expanded courses in vocational training at the high school level see this as a vote against them, we're sorry. But the shoe must be cut to fit the last pending a day when we can afford a new last.
