



Ever try making Yule candles? Here're easy how-to-do-it data

Would you like to make can-

Delightful Christmas can-

Candles in the shape of wreaths, bells, balls, Christmas trees and such?

Candles that look tempting enough to eat?

Mrs. Howard Underwood makes them and here tells you how you can do it, too.

"For at least two years I've had the urge to try making candles for Christmas," she explained.

"In fact, I even bought some wax two years ago, but somehow couldn't find the time. This year I decided to take the time."

That wasn't easy. In addition to taking care of the big home, she works eight hours a day. "I had heard of people melting the wax," she continued, "cooling it and then beating it with an egg beater. One Sunday afternoon about three weeks ago a friend from Barberton, Mrs. William Swartz, came over and I told her my ideas and suggested we try making some candles."

"She was all for it. We melted some wax and poured it in plastic cups and paper cups with wicks through the middle and fastened to the top of the cups with a wire and let them cool."

"About this time two more of my friends, Ollie Findley and Pat Wood, arrived. They,

too, were interested in our candle making. When our wax cooled enough to form a film over the top we whipped it with an egg beater until it was fluffy, took the candles from the molds and started covering the candles with the whipped wax, using a fork. We all had our fingers in the wax, though, before we were through. After the whipped wax was applied, we sprinkled different colored glitter on them. We were all very pleased with the results."

THEY SHOULD HAVE been. The finished product resembles frosted cakes or candies. Arranged on the dining room table to be photographed, they seemed like beauties of the pastry department, tempting enough to eat.

"There is one important factor to remember," she cautioned, "and that is always melt the wax over the hot water, in a double boiler or a tin can set in a pan of water. Otherwise, if it is melted directly over the flame it may catch on fire."

"Several days later," she resumed, "I decided to try making some larger candles. This time I used pint and quart milk cartons for molds. I got some green holly and red berries and decorated some of my candles with these. I had a great urge to decorate some with gold and silver leaves so I got gold and silver spray and sprayed my holly leaves. Then using these leaves and some little silver and gold Christmas balls, the candles became very attractive."

Not yet satisfied with what she had done, she decided to experiment farther. She wanted to make a round candle, but could not think of what to use for a mold. Her husband, Howard, solved that for her.

her. "One day when I came home from work, I found that Howard had bought a rubber ball, cut it in half, had each part sitting on a Kerr ring to keep from upsetting and had instructions written out how to make a ball candle. I followed his suggestions. When the candle was set up, I melted a little wax and stuck the two halves together. Then I took an ice pick, heated it over the flame, inserted it through the middle of the candle and pulled through the wick (which had previously been dipped in wax and laid aside to cool.)"

NEXT SHE DECIDED TO make a Christmas bell, but what to use for a mold?

"I solved that," she said, "by getting a fancy flower pot. I shaved some red crayon in it, then poured my hot wax in, cooled it quickly in the deep freeze, took the wax out of the mold by inserting a knife around the edges, turned it upside down, and, lo, I had my Christmas bell."

The same imagination and ingenuity solved her problem for a Christmas wreath mold. "I used a gelatine mold and a small glass for the bell mold. After making the molds and trying the little bell mold inside the round mold, I covered it with whipped wax and added little holly leaves and berries along with the glitter."

Her success with the wreath inspired her to continue and make a Christmas tree.

"Using a cone shaped vase for my mold," she explained, "I was able to make the tree. Then I decorated it with miniature candles, wreaths and colored balls with a miniature package under the tree."

All the candles have attached bases except the Christmas bells.

New council to receive oath Sunday; Stilson's bill \$18,345

Oath of office to Plymouth's new council will be administered Dec. 31 at 1 p.m.

Incumbents Donald E. Akers, Charles Vanasdale, Donald H. Levering and John T. Dick will be joined by newcomers Clarence O. Cramer and W. Willard Wirth. Clerk Carl V. Ellis will administer the oath to Mayor William Fazio at 10 a.m. Dec. 30.

Carl H. Gerken, Napoleon engineer, submitted two proposals governing payment of his fees should be engaged to supervise the sanitary sewer system. The proposals call for five percent of the contract price for plans, the same for construction engineering, and one and two-thirds per cent for inspection. Since they vary only slightly, they were referred until the new council is seated.

Council members skirted without formally mentioning the bill of \$18,345 submitted by Alden E. Stilson & Associate, Ltd., Columbus, the engineering firm which the council dismissed four weeks ago. Sources inside the Stilson firm confirmed last week that the bill has been forwarded in this amount. What the council intends to do about it hasn't been decided.

Mayor Fazio will probably appoint Charles Lookabough to a new six-year term as cemetery trustee. He is seeking through Robert Lewis, park board member, a candidate to succeed Luther R. Fetters as member of that board. Fetters is also trustee of public affairs and is ineligible.

A total of \$5,000 in fire apparatus funds was invested in a six-month savings certifi-

cate in People National bank at interest of three per cent. A total of \$14,000 of the sewer service fund was invested in a 90-day certificate at 2 1/2 per cent.

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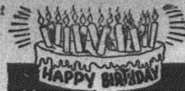

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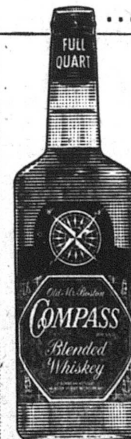

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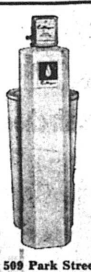
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
