Council divides, 5-1, to engage Gerken

By 5 to 1 vote, village council Tuesday night entered negotiations to hire Carl H. Gerken, Napoleon, as consulting and designing engineer for the sanitary sewer system.

He succeeds Alden E. Stillson & Associates, Ltd., Columbus, who were fired by the council two weeks ago.

Only Councilman Charles Vanasdale opposed the motion offered by Councilman Don-

ald E. Akers. Vanasdale said he thought the motion was too narrowly drawn and bound the council to discharge a second engineer if he, too, should determine it will cost \$200,000 to install satisfactory sewer oxidation lagoons.

After wrangling for an hour, the council broke off discussions with Cloyce V. Messenger, Shelby manager for Ohio Fuel Gas Co., who said his principals would not depart

from their demand for a rate of 75½ cents per 1,000 cu. ft. of natural gas.

Messenger was told firmly the council has made its last offer and will wait upon "any shoveling by the company that it really intends to negotiate."

John Burger, Crestline, solicitor for the village of Ontario, will convene a meeting of Ohio Municipal League members of the Lake Erie basin at Bucyrus tomorrow at

1:30 p.m. to discuss whether it is desirable for four communities to converge their negotiations with Ohio Fuel Gas Co. in an effort to obtain a more favorable rate. The communities are Plymouth, Bucyrus, Crestline and Tiro.

Councilman-elect C. O. Cramer and Councilman Elmer E. Markley will represent this village.

Informal adoption of a 10-year-old American Indian girl by Plymouth Chapter, Future Homemakers of America, will assure the child of a happier Christmas, the chapter said this week.

Seraphine Hudson, who lives in a mission school at San Carlos, Ariz., will receive a Yuletide gift from the chapter.

The child sent her friends here a Christmas card which she constructed and decorated

herself. And she wrote, "I wish you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. With your help I am in good health. Thank you for your kindness to me. At school I play with top and do my subjects. At home I help my mother. I help carry water for her. I go to church at American Indian church."

Xmas tree champion? 202 ft. of it!

Plymouth claims the Christmas tree championship of Ohio.

It has 202 feet of decorated Yuletide tree on display in the Public Square.

Not all of those 202 feet are in one tree, however. Thirty of them are in a behemoth donated by LeRoy Lofland, Plymouth route-1. Twenty are in a tree given by Floyd Steele, 79 Plymouth street. The larger one stands at the east side of the Square, the smaller one at the west side. They're aglow with more than 350 lamps, paid for by the Chamber of Commerce.

And 202 feet of tree are in 38 smaller trees placed at the edge of the Square by the Chamber of Commerce.

This is the fifth season that the Chamber has engaged in large-scale decorations of the Square. It all started in 1957, when a 40-foot stork built by Elton A. Robertson rose above the west side of the Square.

Fair penalty

The penalty for conviction of driving a motor vehicle while intoxicated is not severe enough.

Generally, the driver who's convicted is made to pay a fine of \$200, endure three days of jail, and suffer a six-point reversal of his driving record. A total of 12 points within a year is cause for revocation of his license.

It'd be easy to cite a hundred examples of abuses of the judicial privilege. We think off-hand of the automobile salesman in a nearby town who's been convicted at least three times, has even suffered revocation, yet he still drives, more often than not swacked to the ears. We think of the man who recently was convicted a second time of DWI, after having collided with a prominent and useful citizen, putting him in the hospital possibly for the rest of his life. His fine? Total of \$300, \$100 suspended, six days in the clink, and a brief suspension of the license.

A more severe punishment seems called for if we're going to get these habitual drunks off the road. Please don't give us any argument that if his license is taken away, he can't drive to work. He should have thought of that before he got tanked up. If his kids suffer for it, then perhaps their plaintive wails will make him think the next time.

Our suggestion: fine every person convicted of DWI the sum of \$300, no excuses or suspensions; sentence him to 90 days in jail at hard labor, no excuses or suspensions; revoke his license for two years, no excuses or suspensions; pay the money to a separate fund to be disbursed to assist wives and families rendered destitute by any such convictions, upon demonstration of need.

All such cases should be tried in courts of record where the presiding judge is a lawyer. Convictions should be had only on presentation of the strongest evidence. The balloon test is not reliable. When the alcohol percentage in the blood reaches a certain figure, the drinker is drunk, period. Not before. And no excuses.

An automobile is a dangerous weapon, not to be trifled with at any time. In the hands of a drunk, it's worse than an atomic bomb.
