

Fair penalty

The penalty for conviction of driving a motor vthicle while intoxicated is not severe enough

Generally, the driver who's convicted is made to pay a fine of \$200, endure three days of jail. and suffer a six-point reversal of his driving record. A total of 12 points within a year is cause for revocation of his license.

It'd be easy to cite a hundred examples of abuses of the judicial privilege. We think offhand of the automobile salesman in a nearby town who's been convicted at least three times, has even suffered revocation, yet he still drives, more often than not swacked to the ears. We think of the man who recently was convicted a second time of DWI, after having collided with a prominent and useful citizen, putting him in the hospital possibly for the rest of his life. His fine? Total of \$300, \$100 suspended, six days in the clink, and a brief suspension of the license.

A more severe punishment seems called for if we're going to get these habitual drunks off the road. Please don't give us any argument that if his license is taken away, he can't drive to work. He should have thought of that before he got tanked up. If his kids suffer for it, then perhaps their plaintive wails will make him think the next time.

Our suggestion: fine every person convicted of DWI the sum of \$300, no excuses or suspentions; sentence him to 90 days in jail at hard labor, no excuses or suspensions; revoke his license for two years, no excuses or suspensions: pay the money to a separate fund to be disbursed to assist wives and families rendered destitute by any such convictions, upon demonstration of need.

All such cases should be tried in courts of record where the presiding judge is a lawyer. Convictions should be had only on presentation of the strongest evidence. The balloon test is not reliable. When the alcohol percentage in the blood reaches a certain figure, the drinker is drunk, period. Not before. And no excuses.






