Vo ag class surveyed by OSU

Vocational agriculture program in Plymouth High school has been evaluated by Ronald Foreman, vocational agriculture instructor at Margaretta High school.

The evaluation was part of a state-wide survey to determine the effectiveness of vocational agriculture training.

Foreman consulted with David E. Cook, member of the board of education; Wayne H. Strine, high school principal; Woodrow Huston, Shiloh route 2, a prominent Richland county farmer and member of the adult farmer class at Plymouth and W. Wayne Kies, a vocational agriculture pupil who belongs to the FFA chapter.

AS SCHOOL DISTRICTS become larger, Foreman pointed out, the value of vocational agriculture training increases.

Cook observed that a new department in the schools should have a more intensified public relations program. Strine said teacher, parents and pupils must work closely to obtain best results from the program.

Huston said he thinks the vocational agriculture teacher is vital to the dissemination of information among the farming community, and found agreement from Harvey Yost, instructor, that a better understanding of the program could be achieved if more parents of boys enrolled in the program were to enroll in the adult group.

Young Kies said instruction received in class and laboratory work is useful to him in production of swine and in farm mechanics.

Pupil overcome by chemistry gas

A 17-year-old Plymouth High school pupil was rushed to Willard Municipal hospital Tuesday afternoon after being overcome by noxious gases deriving from a chemistry experiment in the school.

Robert Bushey, Jr., son of the Robert Busheys, Sr., was



affected by gases escaping from chemical apparatus. He was removed from the school by Principal Wayne H. Strine, who brought him to the office of Dr. D. B. Faust in a stretcher. The boy was given emergency treatment and sent by ambulance to Willard, where his condition was reported yesterday to be "very good indeed."

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, MAKING TRANSFERS AND SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:
