

It is my intent and I am sure iso the intent of the board of commissioners to be guided by the laws of the State of Ohio the laws of the State of Ohio with regard to expenditure of public funds. Any criticism of this procedure should be directed to the state legislature with recommendations as to revising the laws rather than directing to us for carrying out the intent of the law.




