WWI vet pension resolution moved by Shiloh Legion

A controversial resolution sponsored by Garrett-Riest Post 809, Shiloh, calling for immediate pension benefits for all World War I veterans regardless of need, will be debated during the annual Ohio department convention of the American Legion at Cincinnati July 21-23.

The resolution, reflecting the position of the Shiloh post, was introduced at the district convention at Monroeville and adopted there.

It is in direct opposition to the department and national policy of the Legion, which refuses to single out World War I veterans from those in World War II or the Korean conflict. Backers of the resolution state that World War I veterans are already past 60 and need immediate aid.

A reason for failing

Mr. Kennedy's trip to Paris, Vienna and London was a much greater success for American pulchritude than for our diplomacy.

Although the Kennedy cult thinks poorly of reporters who said the Vienna meeting with Khrushchev was not a success, honesty compels us to say there is no reason to think otherwise.

It is no reflection upon Mr. Kennedy that this is so. How, indeed, could he have succeeded when the principal protagonist in the cold war was absent from the meeting?

We refer to Mao Tse-Tung, leader of the Red Chinese.

It is, of course, unthinkable that our president would confer with the head of a state which we do not recognize, although Franklin Roosevelt did the next thing to it when he met with Litvinov in 1933 to establish diplomatic relations with the Soviets.

But is also apparent, to all who will see, that while Mr. Khrushchev is a pretty big dog by himself, he is in fact only the caudal appendage of an even bigger dog, the Red Chinese republic.

No right-thinking American would hold with the piracy by which Mao and his predecessors seized control of China. But no right-thinking American holds with the piracy by which a dozen or more Latin American juntas have seized control of their countries or by which the Jews have usurped Palestine. Yet we have recognized the de facto governments and undertaken diplomatic dealings with them.

Diplomatic recognition in no way implies approval of the morals of the government recognized, particularly when it is emphasized that recognition is of the de facto, not the de jure, government. It is pretty hard to deny the presence of a yolk after the shell has broken.

It seems to us desirable that Red China be given de facto recognition. We need not accede to its replacing Chiang's China on the UN Security Council.

But having had some experience in diplomatic dealings, even in hostile states, we are convinced that it is far better to have our eyes and ears at the scene of the crime, and the line of communication held open, than to continue as a blind man fighting a windmill with a fly-swatter.

We Americans have always stood upon our pragmatic approach. We see and we hear what is to be seen and heard. We say what is to be said. To continue to ignore the existence of the Red Chinese is, we think, folly. We must come to grips with the problem. There is no place better to do so than where the problem is, in China.

We should have our diplomatic representatives there, where we can keep an eye on what's going on.

And what of the defenseless -- we almost said undefended -- Americans languishing in Chinese prisons? Would de facto recognition imply that we accede to their guilt? Certainly not. More likely it would open their prison doors.

The free will know what happened when these prisoners got home to tell their story. Better now than too late.

All bids must be accompanied by a bond or check drawn on and certified by a solvent bank (which bank must be one other than the bidder, if the bidder is a bank) payable to the municipality, in the amount of one per cent of the par amount of the bonds bid for, upon condition that if the bids are accepted, the bonds will receive and pay for such bonds in accordance with the terms and provisions of this notice, or forfeit the same as liquidated damages in the event said condition is not fulfilled.

Such bidder shall thereupon be entitled to the return of the deposit which accompanied his bid and it shall be returned to him immediately. The right is reserved to reject bids.
