After closing the 3,000-employee installation, with an annual payroll of over \$9 million, the federal government is now affording other governmental agencies an opportunity to obtain use of parts of it. Some of these are state agenccies, some of them local ones, such as school boards.

b' doing so, it is undoubtedly true that some progra, 'ns of a useful nature can be stimulated to serve the public better.

But the real point is that by dissipating the potential of Wilkn's Air Force station installation, the federal government is depriving it of its strongest opportunity to the people of Ohio.

When it became clear that no department of the federal governmnt wished to take it over intact, there should have been action to make it available to private industry.

The advertising for bids to lease all or part of the premises was a joke. Only one bidder appeared. He sought use of only one building. Nobody else would bid because the leasehold was for 364 days only, hardly enough time to turn around, let alone get a going business started.

Every citizen in Ohio has a stake in the installation. It was built with public tax money.

What better way to recover that money than to lease, or sell, the whole installation to private

And how can we interest an industry with enough assets to buy or lease the installation in its most economic form if use of the whole works is obstructed?

Speational agriculture land is useful and desirable. Boys of Shelby and Plymouth schools will doubtless derive considerable benefit from

But wouldn't it be better if, at their expense, the installation were to be retained intact and a vigorous search be launched, with federal help, to find an industry which could use it to the best economic profit of its investors, its management and its employees, AND the internal rev-






