

Walter Hatch is 82, holiday marred by son's accident

His 82nd birthday will be no cherished memory for Walter Hatch, although he celebrated it with a family picnic Saturday night.

His son, Prof. Raymond N. Hatch, assistant dean for continuing education, Michigan State University, East Lansing, Mich., was painfully injured in a two-car crash in Rt. 280 north of Norwalk Saturday. The Hatches' son, David, and a young woman friend also received minor injuries and shock. They were admitted to the Fisher-Titus hospital, Norwalk, and held over the weekend.

Professor Hatch is taking an 18-month leave of absence from his assignment at East Lansing to go to Okinawa as adviser to the president of the American-sponsored university there. His wife, the former Grace Norris, and son will accompany him, effective Aug. 1.

Mrs. Glenn West, Mrs. Hatch's sister, will live in Shelby while they're away. She's been living with them.

School head loses father at Bluffton

Father of Maynard J. Coon, executive head of Plymouth schools, H. Lee Coon died in Bluffton Community hospital, June 21.

Retired police chief in Bluffton, Mr. Coon was 73. He had been seriously ill since January.

His wife, Mary E., died suddenly at their home exactly a year ago.

Two other sons, Dr. Herbert L., principal of University school, Ohio State University, Columbus, and Robert N., industrial arts instructor, Ostrander schools, also survive.

Last rites were conducted Saturday at 2 p.m. from United Church of Christ, Bluffton by the Rev. William von Braucheth. Interment in Maple Grove cemetery.

Bonds sold to Toledo firm

Stranahan-Harris & Co., Toledo, outbid six other bonding houses for the \$150,000 Plymouth sanitary sewer issue Tuesday and won a contract to buy the bonds.

The Toledo firm's bid was at four per cent with a premium of \$2,267.

Three other bidders offered four per cent with lower premiums.

Three bidders offered 4.25 per cent interest.

Use of the new firehouse by other than firemen and civil defense personnel will be prohibited, the council ruled, over the stout objection of Councilman Donald E. Akers.

New rules for use of the village dump have been promulgated. Their enforcement hinges upon hiring of a custodian. Whether the council can afford such an employee is debatable at the very least, the finance committee said, and the matter was tabled. A fee will be charged to users of the

dump who reside outside the village.

Although he did not make a formal statement, Mayor William Fazio said "we have been a good group and I'd like to continue working with the council for another two years." It was construed by the council as a statement of candidacy.

Roger W. Loveless, consulting engineer, Alden E. Stilson & Associates, Columbus, met with the council in special session at 7 p.m. yesterday to discuss additional testing of the Bittering farm for use as a sewer lagoon site. There are fears that land may not be geologically suitable.

School board picks Cook as president

David E. Cook, veteran member of the board of education, was chosen president in a special meeting Tuesday.

Donald P. Markley was elected vice-president.

Cook succeeds Gerald Stanley, who resigned.

C. David Rish, Shiloh, was sworn as Stanley's successor, to serve until Dec. 31.

The whole works

Action of the federal government in disposing of Wilkins Air Force station at Shelby ought to arouse strong feelings in every resident of Ohio.

After closing the 3,000-employee installation, with an annual payroll of over \$9 million, the federal government is now affording other governmental agencies an opportunity to obtain use of parts of it. Some of these are state agencies, some of them local ones, such as school boards.

By doing so, it is undoubtedly true that some programs of a useful nature can be stimulated to serve the public better.

But the real point is that by dissipating the potential of Wilkins Air Force station installation, the federal government is depriving it of its strongest opportunity to the people of Ohio.

When it became clear that no department of the federal government wished to take it over intact, there should have been action to make it available to private industry.

The advertising for bids to lease all or part of the premises was a joke. Only one bidder appeared. He sought use of only one building. Nobody else would bid because the leasehold was for 364 days only, hardly enough time to turn around, let alone get a going business started.

Every citizen in Ohio has a stake in the installation. It was built with public tax money.

What better way to recover that money than to lease, or sell, the whole installation to private industry?

And how can we interest an industry with enough assets to buy or lease the installation in its most economic form if use of the whole works is obstructed?

Vocational agriculture land is useful and desirable. Boys of Shelby and Plymouth schools will doubtless derive considerable benefit from it.

But wouldn't it be better if, at their expense, the installation were to be retained intact and a vigorous search be launched, with federal help, to find an industry which could use it to the best economic profit of its investors, its management and its employees. AND the internal revenue service?

We think so. Write your Congressman (John M. A. H. Brook, Charles A. Mosher or Jaskson Betts) and your Senators (Frank J. Lausche and Stephen M. Young) to this effect if you think so, too.

ORDINANCE NO. 12-61
Date of Enactment June 29, 61
Name of street Trux and Broadway, Route No. S.R. 603.

An emergency ordinance enacted by the Village of Plymouth, Richland, Huron County, Ohio, in the matter of the hereinafter described improvement, under the supervision of the Director of Highways.

WHEREAS, the Director of Highways is considering improving a portion of the public highway which is described as follows:

(Location and general nature of work)

Applying asphaltic concrete resurfacing of approximately 2 inches on State Route 603 from the south-east corner limit north-west to the intersection of State Route 61 a distance of 0.64 mi. or 3379 lin. ft.

NOW THEREFORE, Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio:

SECTION I (Consent)

That it is declared to be in the public interest that the consent of said Village be and such consent is hereby given to the Director of Highways to construct the above described work with plans, specifications estimates as prepared by said Director.

SECTION II (Cooperation)

That said Village, hereby proposes to cooperate with the State of Ohio, in the cost of the above described improvement, by assuming and contributing the sum of \$600.00 inclusive of the cost of engineering, contingencies and other incidental expenses.

SECTION III (Authority to Sign)

That the Street Supervisor of said Village, is hereby authorized to enter into maintenance and parking agreements and special contractual obligations.

SECTION IV (Maintenance)

That it is hereby agreed that said Village will, after completion of the aforementioned project, maintain the improvement herein contemplated in accordance with the provisions of the statutes relating thereto and will make ample financial and other provisions for such maintenance, and maintain the right of way and keep it free of obstructions in a manner satisfactory to the State of Ohio.

SECTION V (Parking Regulations)

That upon completion of said improvement, said Village, will thereafter:

(a) Keep said highway open to traffic at all times; and

(b) Regulate parking in the following manner:

On Trux Street from the southeast corner limit northeast to Broadway Street - no parking. On Broadway Street from Trux to State Route 61 - angle parking on both sides plus double angle parking in the zone sum between one-way traffic lanes.

SECTION VI That traffic control lights will not be installed on the project without prior approval by the State.

SECTION VII That the rights-of-way provided for said improvement shall be held inviolate for public highway purposes and no signs, posters, billboards, roadside stands or

other private installations shall be permitted within the right-of-way limits.

SECTION VIII (CERTIFICATION OF AVAILABILITY OF RIGHT OF WAY, UTILITY REARRANGEMENT AND SAVING THE STATE OF OHIO HARMLESS OF DAMAGE TO ADJACENT PROPERTY)

(a) That all existing right of way within the Village, which is necessary for the aforesaid improvement, shall be made available thereto.

(b) That the Municipality will acquire any additional right of way required for the construction of the aforesaid improvement.

(c) That arrangements have been of will be made with and agreements obtained from all public utility companies whose lines or structures will be affected by the said improvement and said companies have agreed to make any and all necessary plant removals or rearrangements in such manner as to be clear of any construction called for by the plans of said improvement and said companies have agreed to make such necessary rearrangements immediately after notification by said village or the Department of Highways.

(d) That it is hereby agreed that the village shall at its own expense, make rearrangements of water mains, service lines, fire hydrants, valve boxes, sanitary sewers or other municipally owned utilities and or any appearances thereto, whether inside or outside the corporate limits, as may be necessary to conform to the said improvement and said rearrangements shall be done at such time as requested by the Department of Highways Engineer.

(e) That the construction, reconstruction, and/or rearrangement of both publicly and privately owned utilities, and (d) above, shall be done in such a manner as not to interfere unduly with the operation of the contractor constructing the improvement and all back-filling of trenches made necessary by such utility rearrangements shall be performed in accordance with the provisions of Section I-2.06 of the Ohio Department of Highways Construction and Material Specifications and shall be subject to approval by the State.

That said village hereby agrees that the said department of highways of the State of Ohio, shall be and is hereby saved harmless from any and all damages or claims thereof arising from or growing out of the certification or obligations made or agreed to in Sections (a), (b), (c), (d) and (e) hereinabove.

SECTION IX (Emergency Clause)

This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure by reason of the need for expediting construction of project (a) to promote highway safety, and provided it receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

together with several new trucks.

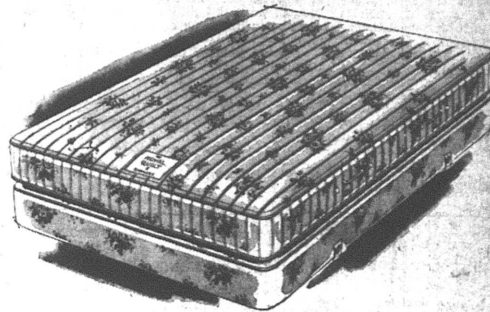
