Auction sale set Saturday night

'Dollar' days planned

Third annual Sidewalk sales event will begin tomorrow at 8 a.m. and terminate late Saturday night.

Climax of the two-day out-on-the-street promotion will be an auction at 8 p.m. Saturday in the Public Square.

Auctioneer Richard A. Fox will knock down to the highest bidder — in terms of Plymouth dollars — a collection of merchandise bought by merchants and guaranteed to be brand new.

PLYMOUTH DOLLARS, which have been issued in exchange for paid-for purchases in U.S. currency for the past eight weeks, will be the only tender recognized during the sale.

Items to be sold include a

pony with bridle and saddle, an Eclipse power mower, a "Berliner" recliner chair, a Frigidaire portable dishwasher, a giggle women's outfit, a complete teen-age outfit, a complete man's or woman's bicycle, a wrist watch, a Polaroid Land camera, a 35-mm. camera, a Hoover sweeper with attachments, a 1950 auto tire, a transistor radio, three pieces of Samsonite luggage, two regulation footballs, two regulation basketballs, two Little League mitts with baseballs, two five-year subscriptions to The Advertiser, a large ham, four large steaks, and three jumbo boxes of Tide.

Thirty-eight merchants and business houses are participating in the Plymouth Dollars event.

All downtown merchants will participate in the Sidewalk sales event.

PLYMOUTH MIDGET league parents will stage a bake sale in front of Peoples National bank on both days.

Mrs. G. Thomas Moore and Mrs. Chesley Goodman will conduct the sale.

Mrs. George Lesko and Mrs. William C. Enderby will operate a cotton candy machine in front of The Advertiser, with proceeds to be applied to PML accounts.

Little Garden club will sell potted house plants in front of the Advertiser beginning at 1 p.m. tomorrow. Mrs. Joseph A. Lash and Mrs. Nevin Border will direct the sale.

Political pot bubbles, no sign of positive opposition so far

Nine filing days remain for candidates for Plymouth's 12 elective offices.

So far, despite rumors, there is no evidence of opposition for any office.

Mayor William Fazio will seek re-election for a second term, having engineered a 55 per cent pay raise to \$1,200.

Clerk Carl V. Ellis seeks a fourth term. Mrs. James Reynolds, treasurer, will seek re-election to a second term.

Councilman Elmer E. Markley has decided to quit after 12 years service. His colleagues, Donald E. Akers, Ormer G. Burkett, John T. Dick, Donald H. Levering and Charles Vandasale, will file their nominations on a common petition.

Lowell E. Keith is understood to be their choice for turning mate.

Incumbent trustees of the Board of Public Affairs, Luther R. Fetters, George W. Cheesman and D. Guy Cunningham, Sr., will seek re-election.

A SELF-APPOINTED AND wholly informal citizens committee has sought to induce candidates to oppose Fazio, some of the council and the Board of Public Affairs.

And although names were bruited about with some readiness, none of the candidates has signed a nominating petition yet, and none has said he will run.

The prospective candidate for mayor is a reputed sexagenarian property owner. He promised the committee an answer this week.

Prospective candidates for council include W. Willard Wirth, a former mayor; Clarence O. Cramer, who's already turned down a request to run for mayor; and William C. Enderby.

A fourth prospect for whom petitions were obtained hadn't decided whether to run by press time yesterday.

Karl S. Lindauer has been spoken of as a candidate for Board of Public Affairs.

A contest has developed for the office of trustee of Plymouth township. Incumbents Floyd Steele and Virgil Baird seek re-election. Haldon W. Cheesman seeks to unseat one

of them. Trustees in New Haven township are unopposed. They are William Link and Walter Noble.

Two of the three Board of Education members whose terms expire have announced they'll seek re-election. They are C. David Rush and David E. Cook. Judson A. Morrison hasn't said what his plans are.

A graduate of Ashland college in 1955, Petit will continue graduate studies in Bowling Green State university.

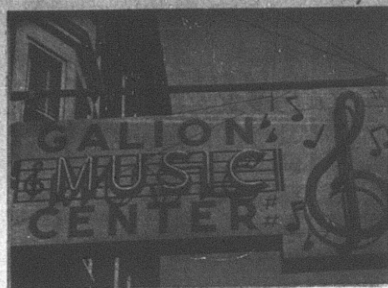
Petit had said he would enter private business, when he quit here.

the bridegroom is also a graduate of Plymouth High school. He is employed by Bachrach Cattle Co.

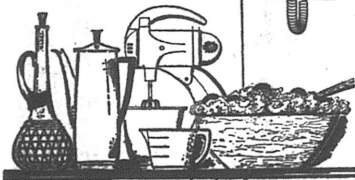
