The point is that whether one enjoys football or not, he would do well to turn out tomorrow to urge the Big Red on to greater displays of the gumption that has not been so strong in the

If a small community such as North Robinson, the only real population center in Col. Crawford district, can produce such a turnout, there is no reason that Plymouth cannot do as well.

Even those who prefer a book or bridge or back-biting their neighbors need to realize the truth of what the Duke of Wellington said of the playing fields of Eton or what Douglas Mc-Arthur said of the athletic program at West Point: "that on these fields are fought and won the battles that will be won on other fields against other foes in other days."

There isn't much at stake save self-respect and determination among, say, 25 boys. They and their fine young coach deserve that encouragement.


