

R-r-r-a-a-h!

The football season is officially under way.

The Big Red has acquitted itself nobly so far, and is particularly deserving of praise because of the gumption it displayed after a heart-breaking adverse decision of pass interference gave Col. Crawford the opportunity to score. Coach Ramseyer hasn't much in the way of talent or size on his squad, but in the comparatively short time he has been here he has instilled what we have called gumption, but is no more than old-fashioned determination.

Tomorrow's opposition is bigger, faster and more experienced. The likelihood, says an expert, is that Plymouth will be defeated. But footballs bounce peculiarly, as anybody who has thrown or kicked one knows. There is every chance that it may do so tomorrow. We hope that it bounces in our favor.

Upwards of 1,300 fans turned out at Col. Crawford Saturday night, when there was strong competition on the idiot box (Miss America was being crowned) and the radio (Cleveland and Detroit were having at it in another of their renewals) as well as in business districts in Bucyrus and Crestline.

The marvel is that such an attendance was recorded with what was at best a mediocre team (Col. Crawford is in its second full season of play) facing an equally poor one.

The point is that whether one enjoys football or not, he would do well to turn out tomorrow to urge the Big Red on to greater displays of the gumption that has not been so strong in the past.

If a small community such as North Robinson, the only real population center in Col. Crawford district, can produce such a turnout, there is no reason that Plymouth cannot do as well.

Even those who prefer a book or bridge or back-biting their neighbors need to realize the truth of what the Duke of Wellington said of the playing fields of Eton or what Douglas MacArthur said of the athletic program at West Point: "that on these fields are fought and won the battles that will be won on other fields against other foes in other days."

There isn't much at stake save self-respect and determination among, say, 25 boys. They and their fine young coach deserve that encouragement.

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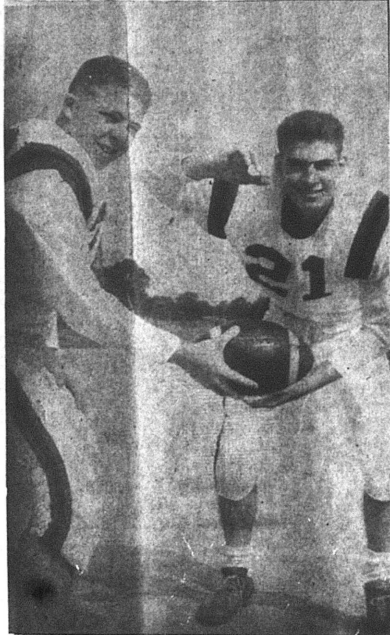

cademy, the NROTC program makes it possible for a young man to earn a regular commission while studying at the civilian college of his choice which has an NROTC unit. High school seniors and graduates who have reached the 17th anniversary of birth and have not reached the 21st anniversary of birth on July 1, 1962, may apply for the NROTC aptitude test. Those who make a qualifying score will be given a rigid physical exam early in 1962. From the number of qualified young men remaining in competition, at least 1,600 will be selected to begin their naval careers next September.

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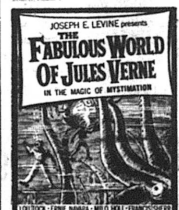

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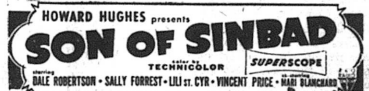
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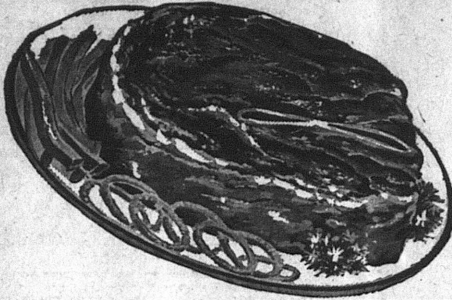

Red surge wins 6-6 tie with Colonels

Clearly outplayed for 42 minutes, Plymouth's Big Red rose up in fury in the final period at North Robinson Saturday night and won a 6 to 6 tie with Col. Crawford.

Gary Utiss, a fast copy of his illustrious brother, and running in exactly the style, burst into the end zone with 26 seconds to play to knot the score.

Jimmy Hamman circled left and a rollout for the two-point conversion, but an illegal procedure penalty set, the Red back to the Colonel eight, whereupon a second effort was fruitless.

The Colonels, thwarted from scoring twice during the second half, went on the scoreboard with 6:03 remaining in the fourth quarter. Sam Eichhorn, easily the outstanding player on the field, broke over Plymouth's right end and swept 15 yards for the score. His try for conversion failed. A pass interference penalty against Plymouth set up the touchdown play.

On the ensuing kickoff by Culbertson, the Colonels' frosh quarterback, Phil Fletcher returned 18 yards to the 38. Hamman sneaked three to the 38, Utiss bucked over guard for nine and then for three to the midfield stripe. Roger McQuown added five, Utiss three, McQuown another seven in two plays and Utiss got another two to the Colonels' 33. With 1:26 on the clock, Fletcher cracked right guard for the first down on the 30 and then got five more. Here Utiss hit his left tackle, swung outside and pounded to the two before he was thrown out of bounds. On the next play he squirmed into pay dirt.

PLYMOUTH WAS CLEARLY outplayed until the final six minutes. The statistics were highly in favor of the Colonels. Only fortuitous circumstance prevented two Colonels' scores. The home eleven showed strength up the middle, where Plymouth showed its greatest weakness, and consistently made great yardage on plays through guard.

Fumbles cost both teams dearly. The Colonels bobbled and lost possession on the first play after the opening kickoff. Plymouth won the toss and chose to kick. The Red recovered on the first play and tore off nine yards in three plays, separated by a five-yard penalty for backs in motion. Hamman's rollout was smeared for

seven yards and Fletcher, whose performance overall stamps him as a comer, punted poorly for 17 yards to the Colonel 28. The Colonels pushed for four first downs to the Red 19 before Fletcher nailed a Colonel aerial on the Red 10.

Fletcher had to punt out on fourth down. His 40-yard boot rolled dead on the home 37 and the Colonels geared up again. Big play in the next series was a 34-yard pass from Culbertson to Jack Fisher that carried to the Plymouth 29.

Six plays later Robin Linn cracked right guard to make the first down but Dick Lewis

Lewis, Hamman and Fetters, was there to deny it.

Fletcher punted out on third down and the Red held successfully as the first half gun sounded.

DURING THE FIRST 24 minutes of action, the Colonels were clearly superior. They rolled up eight first downs to Plymouth's one. They gained 116 yards net, on the ground over only 14 for the Red, and had 29 yards through the air.

Plymouth was slightly better in the second half. The Colonels were never able to penetrate the Plymouth defense beyond midfield in the third period. John Seif's pass to Eichhorn carried to the Colonel 44 but Eichhorn fumbled and Fletcher recovered.

Fletcher was forced to punt from the Red 38 and Lewis recovered a Colonel fumble on the next play. Starting from the home 30, Plymouth was unable to capitalize on this break. Hamman sought to pass on fourth down but fumbled, lost nine yards and that was it until Culbertson punted to the Red 48 after the next series.

Fletcher got 15 yards around his left end and the Red stormed to the Colonel 27, whereupon Fletcher bobbled a handoff on fourth down and the Red surrendered possession on the first play of the final canto.

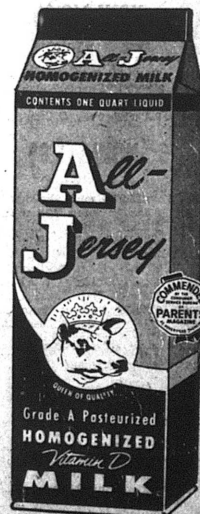

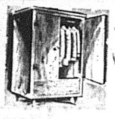

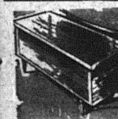
