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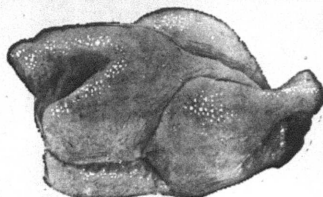

When the library was organized Apr. 1, 1923, it was the project of Plymouth's only Girl Scout troop. The Scouts sponsored a tea and style show to raise funds and the reading room opened with 26 books they donated plus 50 sent by the Mansfield Public Library.

Scout leaders, Mrs. George Hershiser, who is still secretary of the board, Mrs. Harold Jeffrey and Mrs. C. A. Seiler, obtained approval of the village council to use space in the village restroom to house the few books. Gradually the collection outgrew its quarters. It was then moved to a room provided by Mrs. William Johns in her home in Plymouth street. In February, 1928, it moved to the Clark building on the south side of the Square, in the former Hatch Shoe store, where it remained until 1948, when it was moved to its present quarters in the home of Mrs. P. W. Thomas on the Square. It now houses about 9,000 volumes.

Money raising projects of all kinds from card parties to dances and musicals were staged to finance the project.

In 1927 a group of women founded the Creative Reading circle. They were Mrs. Root, Mrs. Bachrach, Mrs. Hershiser, Mrs. Jeffrey, Mrs. Victor Munn, Miss Pearl Elder, Mrs. Bert Anderson and Mrs. Edith Kappenberg. Because of their deep interest in providing a library for the village, members gradually began systematically to take care of library needs. For the most part, they bought new books themselves and provided funds for operating the library.

IN THE SPRING OF 1937, arrangements were completed for the library to become a branch of the county library in Mansfield. This enabled it to receive part of the intangible tax money which is set aside in Ohio for the running of public libraries. Miss Jessie Trauger became the librarian in March and continued until she retired in July, 1949. The present librarian, Mrs. Harold H. Shaffer, who had received six months of professional training in Mansfield, took over on July 1, 1949.

The board was officially organized then. Its members were Mrs. John Fleming, Mrs. George Eastman, Mrs. Root, Mrs. Hershiser, Mrs. Kappenberg, Mrs. Anderson, Miss Elder and Mrs. Bachrach.

Mrs. Root, who had been the treasurer of the reading circle, continued in her office. "She was our watchdog", one present member has said. "She counted pennies and if she did not think the library was receiving the proper discount, she changed publishing houses. Her care of library finances helped us to do more."

In 1950 Mrs. Bachrach became head of the board. Two years later she instituted the memorial fund, which made it possible for the library to purchase books given each year to pupils who have completed the summer reading program. The Mansfield library was also awarding books to young readers, but after they were selected, they were added to the library collection. "I thought that if we gave the books to the children," Mrs. Bachrach has said, "it would be an incentive for them to begin a library of their own, which they would build over the years." Mrs. Bachrach always has believed that once a young person tastes the joys of reading, he will continue to read the rest of his life. "That is why we have built up our collection of juvenile books, to get them started", she concludes.
