## Gun laws

The tragedy at Greenwich, where an eightyear-old boy who was sledding was struck by a bullet fired by a juvenile out of the line of sight almost 800 yards away, suggests that we're all delinquent in even tolerating the circumstances by which such an incident could occur.

Whether the weapon fired by the juvenile was purchased by an adult or by him is not material just now. W ounts is that an eight-year-old boy is dead, and that a 15-yearold has this terrible thing to live with.

What was acceptable a generation ago, when Ohio's population was half of what it is now, seems to us to require change. We're simply too populous to allow weapons to be discharged within urban or built-up areas. Up to now, the matter has been regulated by local ordinance. Some towns have one, some don't. It's time we had a state law prohibiting the discharge of any firearms within urban or built-up areas save on authorized and supervised rifle ranges.

And we wonder if it isn't time to crack down on handling of firearms by juveniles. We don't have an accurate record of how many tragedies occurred last year because some youngster "didn't know it was loaded". But we're willing to bet it was high.

The steady inroads made by big government haven't made us very happy. Individual \*freedoms are encroached upon more and more as government grows bigger. That part of the Constitution which reserves to the citizen guaranties to bear arms has our endorsement. Nevertheless, we think it's high time stiff penalties are applied against any adult who permits, whether knowingly or unknowingly, a child to discharge a weapon so that it endangers others.




