

Problems we wish would develop

That the federal government is finding some use, albeit small, of Wilkins Air Force station at Shelby comes as good news.

The most optimistic reports have it that a dozen families may be involved, perhaps 40 persons all told.

The burden on education and municipal services will not be so great that existing facilities can't support them.

If a private industry were to purchase the facility, in entirety — a fact we deplored when the likelihood became evident that no private industry could do so, because the government was allowing the land and buildings to be fractionated by sale or gift to smaller users—the city of Shelby would be able, with the new tax revenue, to cope with the new problems. But nobody else. Certainly not all of the 2,000 employees that such an industry would engage would live in Shelby. It is presumed that a good many of them, with children, would live here.

Hard put as we are to finance our schools, with an enrollment of slightly more than 1,200, where would we be with another 200 or 250 to house and teach?

Especially with no likelihood that additional taxable property would be introduced into the district at the same time that the additional enrollment arrives?

Nevertheless, for our part, we'd certainly like to have the responsibility of trying to cope with that problem. Because it's always easier to raise money in an economy of growth than to do it in an economy of stagnation.

We may get a chance to do just that when in June the federal government puts up for auction that part of the whole ball of wax it chooses not to retain for itself. Let's hope so!

Girl, 14, dies in crash; girl driver, 15, arrested

A 14-year-old Plymouth route 1 girl died in a one-car collision with a utility pole in Rt. 298 at the first curve west of New Pittsburgh about 4 p.m. Thursday.

Three others riding with her were severely injured. The dead girl is Barbara Mullins, daughter of the Delman C. Mullins, Plymouth route 1. Her father is a uniformed guard at Midwest Industries, Inc., Willard.

Her companions were Linda Reed, 15, daughter of the Denver Reeds, 109 Trux street, driver of the car, which belongs to Kermit Barnhouse, Greenwich; Ethel Mullins, 16, sister of the dead girl, and Franklin Patrick, 20, Willard.

Patrick is the most severely injured. State highway patrolmen at the Norwalk post said Barbara Mullins was riding in the rear seat. Her chest was crushed and she was pronounced dead on arrival at Willard Municipal hospital.

The others were treated for bruises and severe shock save for Patrick, who also has internal injuries.

POLICE SAID THE DRIVER originally was Barnhouse, who stopped at a Plymouth house to talk with a girl. Impatient when he did not return promptly to the car, the Reed girl drove off at high speed, police said.

Miss Mullins, an eighth grade pupil in Shiloh Junior High school, is survived by her parents, seven sisters, Ethel, Lucille, Judy, Emogene and Susan, at home, and Mrs. Edna Lasser, Willard, and Mrs. William Mays, Jackson, Mich., and seven brothers, James, Michael, Floyd, Timothy, and Charles, at home, and Alton, Jackson, Mich., and Stoney, Shelby.

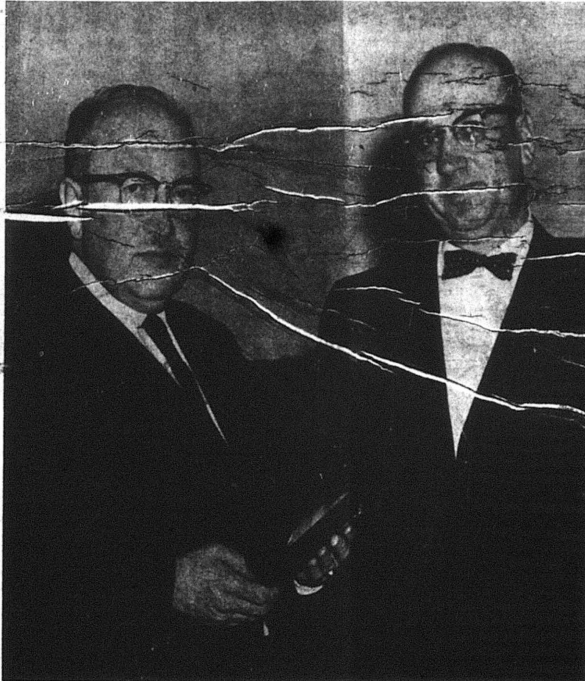

Maynard J. Coon, winner of the plaque last year, made the presentation before the sixth annual banquet of Plymouth Chamber of Commerce in the elementary school.

Native of Lucas, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Faust, the recipient attended Mansfield schools, received the bachelor of arts degree from Ohio university, Athens, and the doctor of medicine degree from Ohio State university. He interned at St. Vincent's hospital, Toledo, in November, 1936, he established his practice.

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Council's gesture comes nearer — OFG to report soon

A major step toward compromise with Ohio Fuel Gas Co. was taken by village council Tuesday night.

With a new rate contract hanging fire since Sept. 16, the council offered to compose its differences with the company on new terms, as follows:

First 1,500 cu. ft. @ 25 cents per 100 cu. ft., with minimum of \$2.50;

Next 98,500 cu. ft. @ 73 cents per 1,000 cu. ft.

Over 100,000 cu. ft. @ 68 cents per 1,000 cu. ft.

A fuel cost clause, to expire when the new contract expires;

A maximum service standby charge of \$2.50 a month for four months;

No tax clause;

Contract to expire Sept. 16, 1965.

OHIO FUEL GAS NEGOTIATORS John Cottrell and Cloyce V. Messenger said they would refer the final offer to their principals and report in two weeks.

The new rates differ from the company's final offer by nine cents at the 20,000 cu. ft. consumption level. Average consumption per household here is 200,000 cu. ft. annually, or 16,666 cu. ft. monthly.

Mayor William Fazio will draft legislation by which the posts of street supervisor and cemetery sexton may be combined. It will be introduced for debate on Mar. 20 by Councilman Donald E. Akers.

If the plan is not accepted, and Fazio made clear his own reservations, he will submit the name of a nominee for the post of street supervisor.

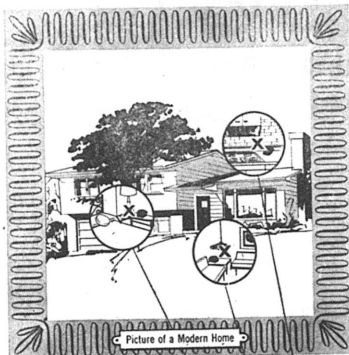

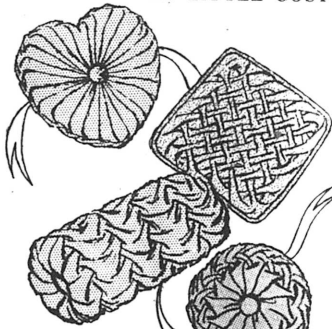
