Top man at parachute school, McQuate wins spot promotion

A young Plymouth marine has won merit promotion to corporal for placing first among 500 students in an Army parachute school at Ft. Benning, Ga.

Douglas E. McQuate was top graduate in the class which was graduated Mar. 30. His merit promotion came from the hands of Lieut. Gen. Robert B. Luckey on the 11th anniversary of Force Troops, the general headquarters unit to which McQuate is assigned as a radioman.

"Tipped off in advance of his forthcoming award, the young Marine refused to believe it. 'Things like this just don't happen to me,'" he exclaimed. "IT TOOK A BIT OF DOING to convince him. Finally a believer, he notified his parents, the R. Earl McQuates, who went to Camp Lejeune, N. C., to witness the presentation.

They got a tour of the huge base in the personal car of the commanding general, Gen. W. B. Kyle.

And what's paratrooping like?

Like anything else, says the young Marine. "The roughest part of the day is the beginning, that physical training bit. Once I got through that, I knew I had it made."

Lest the proud Marines lose prestige, it should be mentioned that by order of the joint chiefs of staff Marine paratroop personnel receive training from Army instructors to avoid duplication of staffs.

Lieut. Col. Richard W. Johnson, commanding officer, 2nd Air-Naval Liaison Co. in Thailand in 1961, who is McQuate's immediate commander, received the Navy commendation medal.

The two Marines reviewed the troops on the parade grounds.
