Fifth teacher quits

A fifth teacher resigned from Plymouth school system May 23.

Mrs. Shirley Bowers, instructor of commercial and business subjects, told the board of education she will take another post at higher salary closer to her home in Ashland.

Will the curriculum be changed if the board cannot find teachers to fill the vacancies in foreign languages? President Donald P. Markley said he has been asked the question many times since the resignations of John Stansberry, Spanish instructor, and Mrs. Robert Beatty, Latin teacher, were accepted. Supt. Maynard J. Coon replied he anticipates a "difficult situation" but that no changes will be made unless they are forced.

The recommended plan of double runs for school buses is an excellent one, the board said, but its resources are too thin to execute it now. The plan was tabled. Although the proposed plan will cost more in cash outlay per month, state contributions are proportionately higher so that the net expense to the board is lower. But the age of present buses is so high the board cannot operate them 90 miles a day, as the new plan requires.

schools, told the board it ought to hire a trained mechanic and install bulk gasoline facilities.

The board instructed Coon to investigate the merits of bulk gasoline facilities. Trees on the south lawn of Plymouth Elementary school need to be removed, Coon reported. Further estimates of cost of removing trunks and stumps will be sought. Only estimate so far is \$400 for two trees and two stumps.

If state foundation fund

payments do not arrive by May 30, the board will borrow \$20,000 from Peoples National Bank to meet its immediate cash needs.

The five-mill new operating levy which has twice been defeated will appear on the general election ballot.

Should the levy be defeated, the board was told, it might consider eliminating transportation for high school pupils, which is not required under state law, as a means of cutting costs.

Henry to leave post as GOP sagem

Longtime 13th district GOP central committeeman, Arthur Henry, Monroeville, will resign that post, he said this week.

"I've served my party for about 30 years," he said, "and I think it's high time some younger person took over."

Henry is understood to be contemplating surgery on an eye, but he did not say whether the resignation is prompted by this fact.

Biggest task for his successor: to cooperate with the female counterpart at the district level, Mrs. Leila Black, Lorain, and the party organization to elect Rep. Charles A. Mosher, Oberlin, completing his freshman term in the Congress.

Mosher soundly defeated J. William McCrae, former assistant prosecutor of Lorain county, in 1960, despite the fact he lost Lorain county to

his Democratic opponent. McCrae said after the election that "Jesus Christ couldn't get elected on the Democratic ticket in the 13th district."

Mosher's opponent this time will be J. Grant Keyes, state public safety director, Gov. Michael V. DiSalle's hand-picked man. The Democrats promise an all-out fight to unseat Mosher.

The 13th district includes Lorain, Erie, Huron and Sandusky counties.

HURON COUNTY DEMOCRATS have re-named Harlow A. Stapf, Willard, their county central and executive committee chairman.

J. Raymond Willet and William Fazio, the latter his party's nomination to oppose incumbent Rep. Harry V. Jump for assemblyman, are local members of the county executive committee.

Engineer tells Shiloh to float general bond issue

How to lessen the burden on property holders was suggested to village council by Shiloh's village engineer, James Cuning, Mansfield, May 23.

His solution to avoid such high assessments for sanitary sewers (they may exceed \$2 per front foot) sell \$14,000 in general obligation bonds to raise funds to pay part of the expense, thus forcing the five utilities in the village — Western Union Telegraph Co., Ohio Fuel Gas Co., Mansfield Telephone Co., Ohio Power Co., and New York Central railroad — to share part of the load. The utilities have a combined valuation of \$90,710.

If a \$2 a front foot assessment is applied, the gross return will be \$93,000, since there are 34,652 feet of frontage. Whether this amount would be sufficient to settle all obligations is uncertain now, since all bills are not on hand.

BOARD OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS has bought \$1,000 worth of new street light for Main street, calculated to treble the illumination in that area.

Jack Hamman, Shiloh, has been hired to repair the roof of the fire station. Six pairs of boots, at \$18.50 each, and 12 fire brooms, at \$3 each, were ordered for the fire department.

A conference at the pond adjoining the sewage disposal plant will convene at 1 p.m. tomorrow to decide how the property may be improved to allow recreation and to overcome objections of the federal government so as to release loan funds for housing in Euclid street.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Sir:

As your senator and a member of the state finance committee, I have found it most difficult in the last year and a half to follow the reports and the thinking of the Honorable Michael DiSalle, Governor of Ohio. The statements that he makes throughout the state would lead you to believe that the 104th General Assembly, which was controlled by the Republican party, was woefully short in the appropriation that was made to maintain the various welfare departments. He failed to report that the 104th General Assembly gave him approximately \$175 million more to spend than he had under the 103rd General Assembly.

This week I received two reports which will show you

how confusing it is to try to follow the Governor in his line of reasoning. On May 19th, an official report came from Roger Cloud, the speaker of the House of Representatives, and on Table "B" of 104th General Assembly, it shows that under the heading of mental hygiene and correction they were appropriated \$180 million plus for '61 and '62, and they were appropriated \$185 million plus for '61 and '62 — or in other words the budget was increased by \$8,819,000.

At a meeting of the control board on Thursday, May 10, a most interesting situation developed as reported by Senator William H. Deddens, a member of that committee and chairman of the finance committee. The Department of Mental Hygiene and Correction filed a request to transfer

funds totaling \$39,337 from the lapsed funds in this quarter of the fiscal year to the fourth quarter in order that they could hire 97 additional employees in the various hospitals in the state. The department was represented at the hearing by Mr. Cochran and Dr. Henry Luidens, mental health commissioner under Dr. Haines.

At the control board meeting when Dr. Luidens was ques-

tioned by Senator William Deddens, he finally admitted that the Department of Mental Hygiene and Correction would have \$1,800,000 more than necessary to maintain the existing level of operation during the year July 1, 1962 and ending on June 30, 1963 — give or take a hundred thousand or two hundred thousand.

It is hard to believe after the statements that have been

head of the department, and by the governor, that here would come an unqualified admission by Dr. Robert Haines' first assistant, publicly stating that the next fiscal year they would have practically \$1,800,000 more than they will need. I believe that the people in my senatorial district should know these facts.
