

Second polio dose set for Sunday at Shiloh

Type I of the Sabin vaccine for polio will be administered in Shiloh Elementary school Sunday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

This is the second dose of the series of three. Persons receiving the vaccine are requested to complete pink slips

for this dosage. To facilitate service, the slips may be completed beforehand for each person receiving the vaccine. Slips for those under 21 years of age must be signed by a parent or a guardian. The slips will become a permanent

record in the Richland County Health department.

Slips have been placed in the Shiloh Post Office for convenience of residents there. In Plymouth they are

available at Karnes Drug Store, Mack's Foodland and The Advertiser.

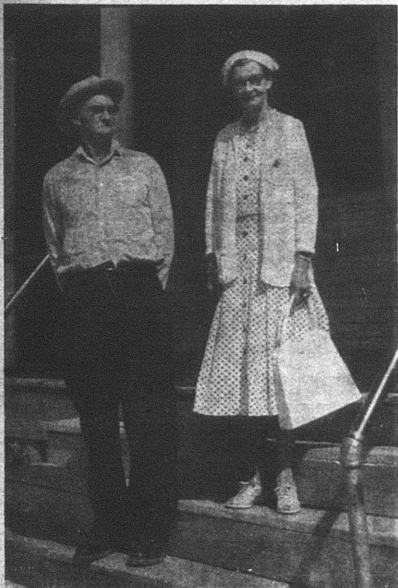

The pre-fabricated structure will be roofed with standard timber-a n-d-o-ingle construction and will be set upon a concrete footer.

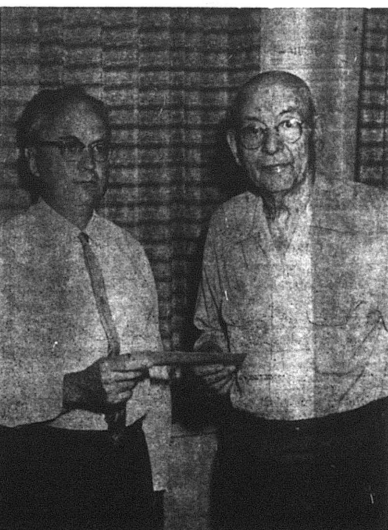
Heifners celebrate at 46th reunion
