

Juveniles

Now that the kids are out of school, attention is drawn, whether by accident or design, to questions involving their behavior and punishment.

A Zanesville judge is under some fire, mostly from outside the county, because he ordered a sterilization operation for a low mental girl who had produced an illegitimate child. Whether he was justified in doing so seems to be less important than whether he was correct. Does the law countenance such action? There are those who contend it does not. So far as we are informed, they are right.

This week, the Huron county juvenile judge issued his annual report. Some highlights, quoted verbatim:

"Ratio of child delinquency to child population . . . decreased to 13.48 per thousand."

"Percentage of girl's cases dropped . . . to 32.3 per cent but is still far higher than the national average of somewhat under 20 per cent."

"There have been marked increases in the more serious types of delinquency and declines in the lesser offenses."

"Sex offenses, drinking, runaway and burglary showed substantial percentage increases."

"The state has totally ignored its vastly increasing child population and even more rapid increase in juvenile delinquency. Consequently the burden of providing the necessary care and treatment for seriously disturbed children has fallen back upon the counties. To provide the institutional training that is necessary to reform and rehabilitate (them) and to protect the public from them during this process is costly and time consuming."

"The work of juvenile courts in this field is complicated by the fact that almost everyone considers himself an expert in the field of delinquency and has some simple method such as 'getting tough with these young hoodlums' which he is convinced can take care of everything easily and cheaply."

We agree with the judge for the most part. But isn't it time that the judges themselves put down on paper some suggestions for clarifying the juvenile statutes so that every kid and his parent will understand what society expects of him and society will see clearly what's expected of it?

4,000 report, lake Sabin polio dose

Nearly 4,000 persons received Type I of the Sabin vaccine for polio at Shiloh Elementary school Sunday.

Type II, the last of the series of three, will be given July 15. The schedule was so arranged because I and III are for the paralytic forms of polio. Persons who missed the Type III will be able to obtain it this fall when a "make-up" clinic will be held. Or they may go to their own doctor.

All ages from six weeks are urged to take the complete Sabin series to lessen the possibility of acquiring polio or carrying the virus to another person.

Prospect of oppressive legal fees gives rise to fiscal concern by village council

The prospect of oppressive costs for legal defense rose before village council Tuesday night.

Solicitor Joseph F. Dush told the council he ought to have co-counsel in defending the village against a personal injury suit brought by Mrs. Helen Iecman, Mansfield, seeking \$40,000 for injuries allegedly received about three years ago when she fell on snow in West Broadway.

Royal W. Eckstein, Sr., trading as Eckstein's Plymouth Hardware, is a collateral defendant.

Dush said the signs are that the Iecman case will be a "full dress legal fight, with many ramifications, and I urge you to consider whether co-counsel ought not to be appointed."

A second suit facing the village requires more immediate action. Aiden E. Stilson & Associates, Ltd., Columbus, discharged engineers for the sanitary sewer system, seek \$18,300 in redress for damages and loss of profits because they were summarily dismissed, allegedly without proper cause.

The Kamens will teach next year in Clear Fork district, the Bellville-Butler consolidation. Both said their reason for resigning after one year of service is because Clear Fork pay is higher.

Four teachers were hired by Plymouth Board of Education June 13.

Five vacancies remain unfilled.

Instructors of mathematics, industrial arts, English and Latin, Spanish and English and girls' physical education are being sought.

"ALONG THE OLD CANALS"



Motorists of today find the remains of the six locks at the town of Lockington of considerable interest as they follow the paths of history along the Miami-Erie Canal from Toledo to Cincinnati.

Plaques erected by the Ohio Society of Professional Engineers at this park site give some pertinent facts about the Canal Era that opened up the back country in Ohio and connected the Ohio River system with the Great Lakes.

The Lockington site is on the south edge of the Lorain Summit, the height of land dividing the rivers that flow north from those that flow south.

Here the six locks raised or lowered the canal boats 67 feet on their cross state journey. A canal boat starting at Cincinnati had to be raised 512 feet

to this point and lowered 395 feet to Lake Erie on a north-bound trip. Some 400 canal boats hauled freight or passengers along this inland waterway for a total distance of 245.8 miles between Lake Erie and the Ohio River.

Governor DeWitt Clinton of New York State, the father of the Erie Canal connecting the Hudson River and the Great Lakes, dug the first shovel of earth on the Miami-Erie Canal July 21, 1825, two weeks after he had done the same job to start the construction of the Ohio Canal at the Lockington near Newark.

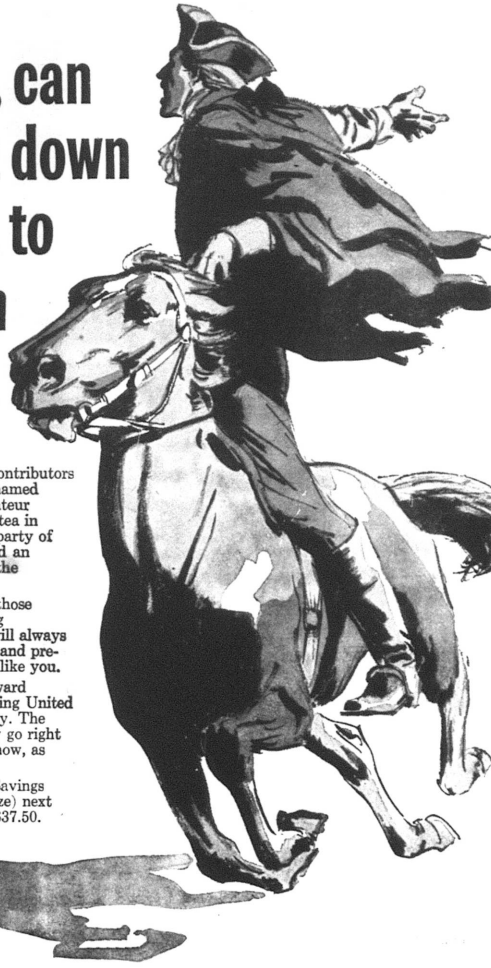

Jap beetle traps to be installed

Ohio Department of Agriculture, cooperating with local officials and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, plant pest control division, will place a number of metal insect traps in Plymouth, Shiloh and Olivesburg during the next few days to obtain information on the occurrence and status of the Japanese beetle.

Most of the traps will be placed in residential sections and Harold L. Porter, chief of the division of plant industry, asks residents to cooperate by allowing the traps to be placed on their properties for a period of about six weeks. Traps function best when placed in sunny locations at least 15 ft. away from host plants and residents are asked not to move the traps without first consulting the inspector.

The inspectors carry credentials which will be produced on request. Local police have been notified about the work.

The Japanese beetle is an introduced plant pest. In the vicinity of New Jersey it appears as an adult beetle about

the middle of June and is most abundant and active during July and August. Farther south it may appear earlier. The adult beetle is about one-half inch long, colored

green and brown with rows of white spots down each side of the body. It is a voracious feeder, causing great damage to blossoms, fruit and foliage of many plants, including ap-

ple, peach, cherry, grape, corn, soy beans, elm, lindens, rose, and hollyhock. Soon after emergence, female beetles begin depositing eggs in the soil. After the eggs hatch,

the grubs feed on roots of grasses and other vegetation, causing considerable damage to turf in lawns and golf greens. The beetles overwinter as grubs in the ground.

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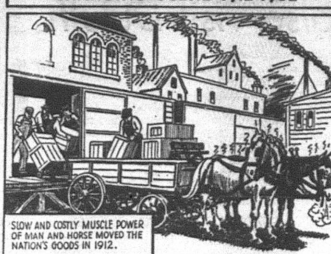

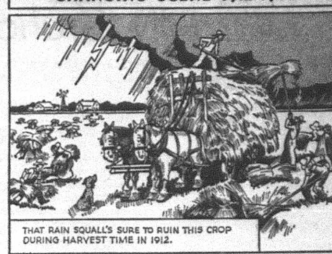

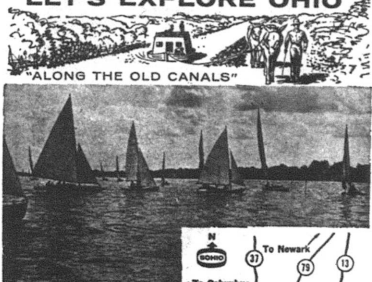

"ALONG THE OLD CANALS"
Sailing enthusiasts spend ex-
citing days racing their trim
crafts on Buckeye Lake in cen-
tral Ohio. Fishermen likewise
and exciting enjoyment in
pursuing their sport in these
same blue waters.

Few of these outdoor fans
ever give thought, however,
to another day of excitement 187
years ago when a small crowd
gathered only a few miles from
present day Buckeye Lake for
an event of great importance
to the entire nation.
It was a hot July 4, 1825,
when Governor DeWitt Clinton
of the State of New York dug
the first shovel of dirt to
start construction of the Ohio
Canal that was to connect Lake
Erie and the Ohio River with
terminals at Cleveland and
Portsmouth.

In the years between 1825
and 1848 freight-hauling canals

were dug across New York
State to connect the Atlantic
and the Great Lakes; and
across Ohio to connect the
Great Lakes and the Ohio and
Mississippi River system, to
open up the back country and
bring prosperity to farmers
and cities of the mid-continent
area.

Buckeye Lake, built to sup-
ply lockage water for the Ohio
Canal across the Licking Sum-
mit, is one of Ohio's present
day heritages from the "roar-
ing canal era."
