Punishment

William Obermiller, a city judge in Whiting, Ind., has been handing out old-fashioned punishment to youths convicted of disorderly conduct.

Police spanked three young men on orders of the judge. Others were assigned to beach clean-ups, to have their heads shaved and to copying the Declaration of Independence.

It's questionable whether such punishments would be permitted in Ohio, certainly not that involving corporal punishment. Indeed, it's doubtful if corporal punishment is in itself a deterrent to crimes. In Delaware, for example, where a punishment for wife-beating is the public lash, the number of offenses per capita isn't much less than in neighboring states where the lash is unlawful.

Nevertheless, we remain convinced that if parents would administer more often the fatherly slipper to the rounded portion of the posterior, and prescribe other old-fashioned remedies that were in vogue half a generation ago, the number of cases before our juvenile courts would be reduced.

In the meantime, Judge Obermiller will get some national publicity and, needless to say, hundreds of letters from do-gooders who deem such punishment as he has meted out.

Take heart, Judge. There are many who endorse your action and will support it — and such other action — as will reduce the needless cost of government. No question about it, money spent by society to punish juveniles is needless, because if the family does its job, juveniles won't get into hot water.

Sexton boy, 9, falls from tub, drowns in old reservoir

A nine-year-old former Plymouth boy drowned in Lake Toxice, the former Baltimore & Ohio reservoir at the west end of Willard, when he fell Thursday from a discarded washtub in which he was floating.

Perry Sexton, son of Chester Sexton, Garrett, Ky., and Mrs. Bertha Sexton, did not surface after he fell. His companions and two bystanders, likewise non-swimmers, ran for help but when police arrived the boy had completely disappeared. He was recovered later with the aid of grappling hooks.

The Sextons formerly lived near the gravel pit in Base Line road west of here.

Clark Beal dies; cancer worker was bill collector

Clark L. Beal died at his home in Shelby Sunday of a sudden heart attack. He was recovering from a fractured arm and seemed to be in good health.

Mr. Beal, 73, a native of Richland county, had lived in Shelby 54 years. As a young man, he was in the grocery business and 38 years ago opened the Shelby Credit Bureau, which he and his wife have run since.

He was a director of the Richland county fair board and a member of Hazel Grove Grange and the Knights of Pythias, of which he held the state office of grand chancellor. One of his main interests was the Shelby-Plymouth-Shiloh chapter of the American Cancer society. Through his efforts, the local unit built up a treasury from which financial aid has been given to many families in the three communities. For several years, he helped with money raising activities in Plymouth before the annual Community Chest drives were begun.

He is survived by his wife, Charlotte, with whom he celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last year; two sons, Donald, Shelby, and H. Richard, Mansfield, and a sister, Mrs. Cora Fritz, Redlands, Cal.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. D. B. Young, pastor of First Lutheran church, Shelby, yesterday afternoon. Burial was in Oakland cemetery there.

Principal item of disbursement save for salary payments is \$3,500 for street repair.

Revenues of the electric distribution system for 1963 were estimated in the budget at \$142,034. Expenses were pegged at \$73,116.57, which would leave a surplus of \$68,917.43 at the end of 1963. 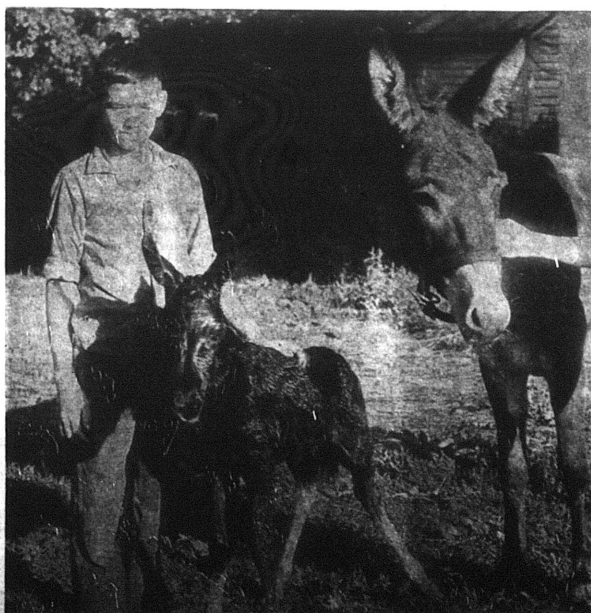
Tracy's sedan received a damaged right rear door and fender.
