Latin teacher signs contract, Spanish teacher given offer

Half of the foreign language problem in Plymouth High school was solved by the Board of Education in special session Monday night.

Miss Donna Sue Harrison, Ashland, Ky., was engaged to teach Latin.

She will be paid \$4,100 a year to teach that subject, English and biology. A graduate of Morehead State college, Morehead, Ky., she has 1.3 years of experience in the school of Louisiana, Ky.

A contract was authorized for Billy Tuttle, County Line road, now attending Morehead State college. He will teach industrial arts on a temporary certificate at \$3,450 a year.

Glenn L. Nagy, Ashland, a graduate of Mt. Union college, Alliance, in 1933, was offered a contract to teach Spanish. Married but childless, he has taught in Buenos Aires, Argentina, and in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. He served 4½ years in the U.S. Navy and will be paid \$4,900 annually.

A contract to supply bulk gasoline and other petroleum products was awarded Joseph L. Lasch, local dealer for Marathon Oil Co., Findlay. His bid of 22.4 cents a gallon was half a cent higher than that of the Farm Bureau. His offer was accepted, however, because Lasch is domiciled in the Plymouth school district, his place of business is in the district, and since he is a private entrepreneur it is likely he will give more attentive service to the needs of the school than an outsider.

Thor E. Woodworth, agent for Motorists Mutual Insurance Co., submitted a routine bid for renewed coverage on school buses in the amount of \$396.18. Henry Wiers, Celeryville, agent for Nationwide Insurance Co., submitted a

lower offer of \$329.40, which the board said provides for better coverage.

This touched off a discussion of whether to renew with Woodworth, who resides in the district. Although C. Todd Strohmeier, new executive head, recommended renewal of the current policy, which expires Aug. 30, the board assigned the transportation committee, consisting of Edwin S. Beeching and Donald Dawson, to study the matter and to solicit competing bids. The clerk, Mrs. Kenneth Myers, will receive bids until 4 p.m. Monday, Aug. 27.

A special meeting of the board on Tuesday, Aug. 28, at 7 p.m. will be for the purpose of assigning the insurance contract.

Because there is a shortage of teachers for assignment to study hall duty, Mrs. Roscoe Hamman and Mrs. Wilbur Shields, part-time secretaries to Wayne H. Strine, high school principal, will serve these duties. They will be paid \$150 an hour, their current salary level.

To avoid confusion such as prevailed last year, when for economy reasons pupils were required to purchase their own supplies, all elementary pupils will be assessed 35 cents each for supplies.

Shortage of funds will prevent refurbishing of the playground area in the rear of the Shiloh school.

Storm sewer relief to be made by assessment, council says

An engineering survey to ascertain costs of rectifying two troublesome storm sewer problems was ordered by village council Tuesday night, first step toward resolution of storm sewer difficulties by assessment.

It was the council's consensus that since there are insufficient public funds with which to pay for rectifying long-standing drainage problems, property holders who benefit from such improvements should be assessed in proportion to the benefits received. This cannot be done without technical advice. Carl H. Gerken, Napoleon, the village's sanitary engineer, will be engaged to survey elevations and land uses and to prepare cost estimates for the East Main street and the Sandusky street drainage areas. No action will be taken on the long troublesome Trux street problem, the council said.

"We have looked into that and we explained to those people there how they could go about getting relief. We don't owe them any more," said Mayor William Fazio.

Street Supervisor William Forquer was wrong in agreeing to resurface Spring street at public expense, half of the cost to be borne by an abutting property owner, the council said, but now that the village is done, there is no point

in refusing to take the owner's money. Nevertheless, Solicitor Joseph F. Dush will be asked for an opinion on the legality of such action, as soon as he is released from Willard Municipal hospital.

A patented nozzle for use in coping with roof fires was ordered for the fire department at a cost of \$87.50. Billy Vanderpool and LaVerne Moore have resigned as firemen.

Chief J. A. Morrison said. His replacement will be nominated by Mayor Fazio when he has had a chance to canvass candidates.

Henry Nichols, New Washington, attorney for the Matthews interests in the Bittinger sewer lagoon site case, asked the village to deal with a bill for \$1,511 submitted by Gilbert Matthews as a claim for damages allegedly caused by the village when test borings were made. He will be asked to itemize the bill.

THE VILLAGE WILL REMOVE a large elm tree in Mills avenue in front of the H. H. Fackler residence, since it is on village ground. Trees in front of the Donnemiller properties in East Main street will be removed by the village at his expense unless he

removes them within a reasonable period of time.

Police Chief Robert L. Meiser was authorized to attend a special clinic for police officers to be conducted Aug. 31 at Mansfield under the auspices of the Richland county sheriff and an academy for combat shooting at Mansfield Sept. 25 through 27. Total cost is \$22, \$19 of which is for 200 rounds of ammunition.

Whether a punitive action will be taken against Meiser for his part in a collision which damaged the police cruiser will be left to the state highway patrol, which investigated the collision, Mayor Fazio said. "Although this is a matter for the patrol, I don't see how his wife could be held responsible in any way, because her car was already turned south and not obstructing the path of the police cruiser," he said. The cruiser has been repaired.

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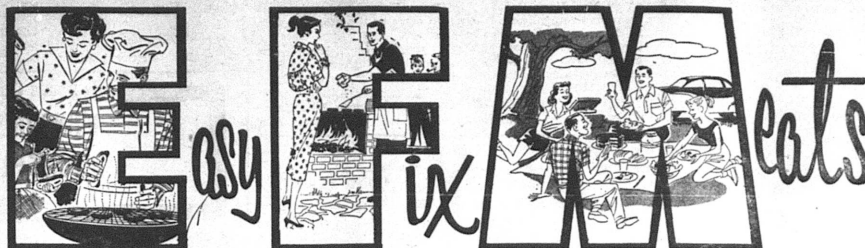

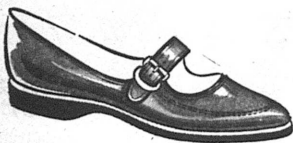

The Cashmans hope their many friends will call on Sunday without gifts.

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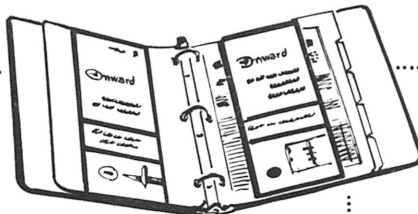
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
