Succeeding Donald B. Shaver---

Burkett appointed to park job

Omer G. Burkett, for 12 years a councilman until he retired last year, was named Tuesday night to succeed Donald B. Shaver as member

of the park board. He will complete Shaver's unexpired term, which ends Dec. 31. Shaver resigned Aug. 14.

Cost of the second water tower is estimated at \$83,998, the council was told by Floyd G. Browne & Associates, Marion, consulting engineers. The tank proper amounts to \$58,000, foundations, piping and controls to \$11,803, engineering design (for which bill has been received and payment requested) to \$5,235, supervision and inspection to \$3,490, legal and administrative fees to \$700, printing and advertising to \$330, contingencies to \$2,500 and interest on the cost during construction to \$1,920.

Formal acceptance of the specifications by the board of public affairs Monday night will result, the council said, in initiation of steps to obtain approval for the financing of the project by issuance of short-term notes.

The water fund is able to cover the engineering fee now, Clerk Carl V. Ellis told the council. A court order must be obtained to transfer surpluses in the electric fund to the water fund to finance the balance of the cost.

The board of public affairs

has already paid \$4,000 plus closing costs for the land. This brings the total cost of the second water tower to \$88,248.

The Water Pollution Control board has notified Carl H. Gerken, Napoleon, sanitary engineer for the village, that proposals to locate oxidation lagoons within 70 feet of the south property line of the John T. McKown tract in Route 61 cannot be approved. Without such approval, the council's plan to install these lagoons on the Bittering-Sickel site must be discarded. If this occurs, the whole sanitary sewer plan must be revamped.

Gerken advised the council to wait upon special representations he intends to make to the Water Pollution Control board at Columbus before taking further action.

On request of the Rev. William Conces, pastor of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic parish, the village will divide with

the church the cost of stoning Hoffman street, adjoining the church site in Sandusky street.

The council agreed to do not without charge to the village. Parcel Post 447, American Legion, the use of an air compressor and spade to excavate footings in the site in Trux street where the post is erecting a new home.

Although the village rest rooms have been rededicated, Mayor William Fazio reported, there are additional complaints about decorations of another sort, notably in the women's rest room.

He acknowledged there is no method by which the village can clean them regularly. "Hereafter," he said, "when someone is unable to pay a fine in my court, he'll be put to work cleaning the rest rooms and the jail."

A question was raised of whether the street supervisor is working full time. Mayor Fazio replied that he believes

the supervisor serves eight hours daily, but acknowledged he was asked by him to approve an arrangement by which the supervisor can return to the employ of the B&O railroad to preserve his longevity.

A further investigation, on request of Councilman Donald E. Akers and Donald H. Lev-ering, will be undertaken by the mayor, with report Sept. 18.

The mayor's attendance at the 11th annual Ohio Municipal conference at Toledo Sept. 20, at village expense, was approved.

Little Garden club sets flower show in Presbyterian church next weekend

Gardeners in Plymouth, Shiloh and the surrounding area are invited to exhibit in the first flower show of the Little Garden club Sept. 15.

The show will be in the basement of the First Presbyterian church. All entries are to be placed between 9 and 11 a.m.

Mrs. L. M. Gault, Ashland, will judge the entries and make the awards. Blue, red and yellow ribbons will be given in each class.

The public is invited to view the show from 1 until 8:30 p.m. Entries may be removed by exhibitors at that time.

Mrs. Orville Gullett is chairman of the horticultural entries. The 12 classes are: Class 1, chrysanthemum, one large bloom; Class 2, Roses, hybrid tea, one bloom, one color; foribunda, one spray, any color; Class 3, gladioli, one stalk, any color; Class 4, dah-lia, small or pom-pom, three

blossoms; one large bloom; Class 5, zinnias, one large bloom; three blooms, one color; Class 6, Celosia, one stalk; Class 8, Asters, two blooms, one color; Class 9, Bells of Ireland, two sprays; Class 10, Tuberous Begonia, one bloom with leaf; Class 11, Delphinium, one spike; and Class 12, Cannas, two blooms, one color.

Mrs. Paul Koonz and Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., are chairmen of the decorative arrangement section.

THE 10 CLASSES FOR adults are: Class 1, "Sunny Side Up", shades of yellow and orange with foliage, for a kitchen or breakfast table; Class 2, "Red Sails in the Sunset", all red flowers with foliage; Class 3, "White Christmas", Christmas plants; Class 4, "Tumbling Tumble Weeds", Fall arrangement using dried materials, vegetables or fruits;

Class 5, "Yankee Doodle Dandy", a luncheon table arrangement with red, white and blue flowers, foliage allowed; Class 6, "Shine on Harvest Moon", Fall arrangement in a basket or reed container; Class 7, "Japanese Sandman", classic Japanese arrangement; Class 8, "Over the Rainbow", mass arrangement; Class 9, "Stairway to the Stars", arrangement using Hogarth curve; and Class 10, "Lovely to Look At", a corsage for the mother of a Fall bride.

There will be two classes in the junior section. They are: Class 1, "Blue Skies", small bouquet for a dressing table, and Class 2, "Lavender's Blue", a table arrangement using only one color and foliage. All school pupils are eligible to enter these classes.

Only one entry in each class may be made by an exhibitor. Accessories are permitted in all arrangement classes.

How come?

Despite the fact that enrollment increases steadily, response to the football program in Plymouth High school diminishes.

Since the entire athletic program is supported from the public purse, in part, in that salaries of coaches are paid from the school tax millage, the public is entitled to inquire whether the response is sufficient to justify the expense.

For many years, baseball here was a joke. Now, in part as a result of youth programs, the number of candidates is almost too large for the facilities.

Basketball has always drawn strong support. Before the merger, Shiloh was a basketball town. That community has continued to support — and supply — the players of the varsity and junior varsity squads.

Cross country, the infant of the family, has flourished. There are signs the squad this year may almost equal the size of the football squad.

What are the reasons why football has such poor response?

When it was organized as an 11-man sport after World War II, the number of candidates was so small that the bench consisted of the coach, the manager, two substitutes and the water bucket.

Maximum turnout was 38, when the Huron Valley consolidation was in force.

The number now working with Coach Carpenter seldom exceeds 26, barely enough for two teams.

As Mr. Justice White, himself a distinguished gridiron star, has said, football has a special value for young men. One would like to say that if only two boys turn out, the expense is justifiable. But one cannot.

What troubles us now is where to put the cutoff figure: at 22, at 12?

For the same cost to the public purse, at least 25 more players can be accommodated. The cost per player for a squad of 45 is wholly justifiable. The question is whether the cost per player for a squad of 25 is within our ability to pay.

Perhaps, in a season or two, the junior high program will produce larger squads. Our experience has been that junior programs don't develop enthusiasms, they develop skills.

What it amounts to is this: unless more boys show interest in the sport, the school district may be compelled to halt the program.

Service academy candidates have short deadline: Mosher

Young men of the 13th Congressional district interested in attending one of the four United States service academies are urged by Rep. Charles A. Mosher to inquire not later than Sept. 20.

All letters should be directed to his office, 410 House Office building, Washington 25, D. C.

The four service academies are U. S. Military Academy, West Point, N. Y., U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md.; U. S. Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colo., and U. S. Merchant Marine Academy, Kings Point, N. Y.

Rep. Mosher will require all potential candidates to participate in the Civil Service examination to be administered in Elyria and Sandusky Nov. 10. The testing locations in Elyria and Sandusky will be announced by him later.

In addition to the Civil

Service test, Mosher will require each candidate to have his high school principal forward his official high school transcript of grades and each must undergo a thorough physical and eye examination.

Mosher emphasizes that all final selections will be made on a competitive basis, and not according to political affiliation.

Mr. Mosher has two vacancies for the 1963 class at Annapolis, one vacancy at West Point in 1963, and one at the Air Force Academy. It will be the Congressman's privilege to name 10 young men to compete for Ohio's 14 vacancies at the Merchant Marine Academy, and six nominees to compete for the 13th District's principal appointment to the Air Force Academy.

The following criteria are

suggested by Mosher for a service academy appointment:

High scholastic standing and a record of other worthwhile accomplishment, ability to meet vision and physical requirements, and a strong desire to attend the academy of his choice. Candidates must be at least 17 years of age and not more than 22 years of age prior to the date of admission to the academy.

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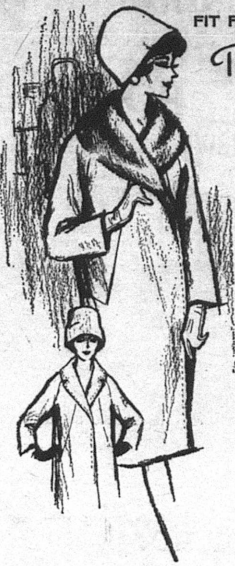
