

Dininger organizing unit to curb, possibly oust, Fazio

Ray E. Dininger, 46 Sansu street, announced yesterday morning he and others will form at once a citizens' committee "to defend Fazio and to see the county prosecutor to stop Fazio and if we can, to dispose him."

He charged "the obscene language he used in front of lady during Tuesday night's meeting completely shocked everybody who was there. I

am surprised she did not slap his face. But she is too much of a lady for that. He was no gentleman and we don't like that kind of talk from anybody."

Dininger, William C. Enderby, Charles Hockenberry, William Moore, Joseph H. McCurdy and Donald Shaver were the other spectators, outside the village family.

The first public exchange between the candidates for

the highest elective office of this village occurred Tuesday night and wound up a draw.

But not until one of them had made some fiery statements, some of them unsuitable for a family newspaper.

Mayor William Fazio told the council he wants action on his recommendation that Russell J. Moser, superintendent of light and water, be dismissed. He repeated a reference to the Revised Code of Ohio which empowers a village mayor to make such recommendations.

Fazio's opponent, Luther R. Fetters, president of the trustees of public affairs, immediately asked to have Fazio's charges read aloud.

Fazio obliged. "THE FIRST, WHICH barely got off the ground, was 'long coffee breaks'."

Fetters broke in with a claim that he himself had watched the mayor and Street Supervisor William Forquer

spend 30 minutes over coffee.

"We were discussing business," Fazio retorted, "and besides, we're not the ones being charged."

Fazio resumed his charges. He said complaints had been made that Moser failed to do work requested of him.

The discussion erupted when Fazio referred to a water tap requested by Salvatore J. Glorioso. He alleged Moser did not do the work because he has ill feeling toward Glorioso.

This Fetters vigorously denied. He said that when Moser declined to install the water tap, no deposit to cover it had been made by Glorioso. What's more, he added, the village did not have then the equipment necessary to perform the work.

Here Councilman Donald E. Akers interrupted the barrage

of charge and countercharge and observed it was hardly proper to make such accusations when the accused was not present.

He drew support from two colleagues and on his motion the council tabled action until Moser or his counsel can attend. Councilman Charles Vansdale sought an amendment to the motion, saying Moser is aware of Fazio's letter and knew the council would discuss it Tuesday night.

MOSER WILL BE FORMALLY notified to respond to the charges by attending the next council meeting Oct. 15.

Fetters agreed to the procedure, adding "I'm going to stick by Moser."

The colloquy closed when Akers suggested both Fazio and Fetters produce witnesses and documentary evidence

to support their claims. Forquer told the council he prefers to leave his salary of 4,000 annually unchanged, and to apply the \$500 raise proffered by the council to the pay of extra help in periods of emergency. He assured the council "the streets are in good shape and I foresee no need for great expense between now and the end of the year". He was told by all councilmen they consider his performance of duty to have been outstanding.

Fetters told the council sub-soil tests of land in the rear of the Vincent Cole property in West Broadway are satisfactory. But until Floyd G. Browne & Associates, Marion, water engineers, say so in writing, he won't take any action.

HE RETORTED THIS SITE to be an alternate selection

made by Browne because the preferred site does not meet sub-soil requirements. The new water tower cannot be placed closer to the treatment plant, he said, because there is insufficient elevation to insure adequate pressure by gravity flow.

Fetters was asked whether contracts signed with the engineers and a contractor to erect the tower would be altered because of change of site. He said he feels there will be no alterations necessary.

If there is additional expense involved in use of the alternate site, the council said, it will look to Browne for liability because of failure to test the sub-soil before letting contracts.

The school levy

We have spoken before about the disturbing tendency of some electors to express their dissatisfaction with the management of the public schools by shutting off their economic water at the ballot box.

That this is a fact nobody disputes. That it should not be a fact is equally indisputable.

The place to express dissatisfaction with the public schools is before the board of education. If board members, individually or collectively, do not conduct themselves or their public business to satisfy the elector, he should not support any bid for re-election. This is the right way, the only way, to express dissatisfaction.

Education costs money. It is a public duty to pay for it. If there is waste the wastrel should be singled out and disciplined, whether by defeat or dismissal.

To deprive the public schools of operating funds because of dissatisfaction with the conduct of other facets of the public education program is short-sighted, foolish and unpatriotic.

If an elector has reason to believe the funds are not needed, he has an obligation to express this belief to the school board.

We have thrown stones at public education on many occasions, stones which we sincerely believed to have been justly and fairly launched.

But we cannot bring ourselves to cut off our nose to spite our face.

Which is just what would happen if the operating levy which is submitted for renewal in November were to be defeated.

Wide support of the operating levy is the mark of good citizenship.

Drivers to get raises Jan. 1 -- IF!

Bus drivers of Plymouth school district will receive a \$300 salary boost effective Jan. 1, 1964.

The raise will give them \$18,000 for driving the newly instituted dual routes.

The raise hinges on approval of the renewal of the three mill operating levy.

A delegation of drivers appeared at the board meeting Sept. 25 for the second time to request a raise. Drivers are driving more hours and miles than previously. The board was in full agreement they deserve consideration. The catch is there simply isn't enough money allotted this year to cover any additional expenditures.

The board carefully pointed out to the drivers that Plymouth district has the lowest teacher salary scale in this area. Drivers should understand, it said, why they are paid less than in neighboring districts.

The board is already \$752.38

in the red for bus repairs for the current year.

Executive head C. Todd Strommenger told the drivers next year state reimbursement for dual routes will be forthcoming and the board may be able to pay more. Until this money is available, the board has to assume additional costs from general revenues.

THE PROMISE OF THE raise was apparently accepted by the drivers.

A representative of Deb Vending Co., Mansfield, described foods available from vending machines contemplated for the high school to relieve pressure in the elementary cafeteria. No action was taken.

Approval was given to bond the high school secretary for \$2,000 if it is legally possible to do so. She handles approximately \$27,000 each year in school funds.

Strommenger outlined the proposed Plymouth Athletic Control board.

Purpose of the board is for long-range planning of the development of the athletic program in the schools. The board would budget the program and be responsible for all funds received in gate receipts and donations.

He feels this would lift a burden off the athletic director, who would then be able to direct his energies to the sports themselves, rather than business affairs.

The plan, however, clearly states that the board will hire, fire and assign coaches and stipulates what funds they may use for its activities.

Proposed membership of the board would include two board members, the executive head of the school, high school principal, athletic director, a member of the coaching staff chosen by the staff, two Booster club members and two citizens of the community.

Final decision of the board will be made at the next regular meeting.

Loudonville hangs on to trip Plymouth, 8-6

Plymouth died on the 26-yard line.

Driving toward a last-minute, come-from-behind score at Loudonville Saturday afternoon, the Big Red executed a play from the bench that failed to work, netted only half of the required yardage for first down and surrendered possession and the ball game to the Redbirds, 8 to 6.

It was the first victory of the season for Loudonville, which outplayed Plymouth in the first half, and the third defeat of the year for Plymouth, which outplayed the Redbirds in the last half.

LOUDONVILLE MOVED 60 yards in 13 plays after the opening kickoff to send Ken Stumbaugh into the end zone from 11 yards out. He took a pitchout from Arnholt for the score. Loudonville rolled up five first downs in this drive. Ron Harbour converted for the PAT.

The Redbirds threatened twice more in the first half, losing possession by fumble at the Plymouth 19 and on downs at the Plymouth 34.

The Big Red came out of the dressing room at the half determined to make a game of it and showed substantial improvement over the last two quarters.

Plymouth took over after a poor punt by Smith that carried only four yards from scrimmage and in 11 plays punched to the Loudonville

seven, where Phil Fletcher's pass for Billy Goth was intercepted in the end zone for a touchback.

Bob Forsythe recovered a Redbird fumble at the Loudonville 25 and Plymouth had the matching touchdown in eight plays.

THE FINAL PERIOD WAS only two minutes old when Fletcher got in on fourth down from two yards out. His pass for Norman Howard was intercepted by Harbour.

Loudonville was unable to gain and the teams exchanged fumbles midway in the period. Smith punted to Fletcher at the Big Red 25 with four minutes left. Fletcher got eight yards on the run back and Plymouth was back in business.

On third down, Eric Akers threw in the right flat to Fletcher for 33 yards and first down at the Loudonville 34. Gene Crouse got four, Fletcher hit for two, Plymouth paid five yards for being offside, then Fletcher got 8 after he faded to pass and found his receivers covered.

On fourth down, with four to go, the Big Red called time. There was 2:14 on the clock. The bench called for a pass. Fletcher took the ball on direct snap, couldn't find a receiver, ran it up but not far enough.

Loudonville was able to kill the clock.

The Redbirds outstutsticked

Plymouth by a considerable margin. But Plymouth would have won this one with a break or two. Fletcher's passing was much improved and although Loudonville keyed on him offensively — "he's the only one Plymouth's got who can run the ball", said Redbird coach Jack Augenstein — Plymouth gained 75 yards running the ball and 79 yards throwing it.

It is sad to recount that the great Musial has hung 'em up without chance to perform in the Series.

His beloved Cardinals simply didn't have the stuff of a champion when the chips were down and folded before the Los Angeles onslaught.

Nonetheless, he would be the first — great 'pro that he is — to say that two very fine teams are meeting in the Series this season.

If the National league is indeed superior to the American, this is the year to show it.

For the Yankees can be taken this time out.

Jim Bouton and Al Downing have carried the champions a great distance, farther than anybody had any reason to expect, and if by reason of youth and relative inexperience they can't cut the mustard in the short series, a long-time Yankee fan can understand.

What he cannot, however, understand is the emphasis upon the New Yorkers' power at the expense of detriment of their pitching. Where in heck in any league can one find the likes of Whitey Ford, Bouton and Downing as a Big Three?

Koufax, Podres and Drysdale? Perhaps, but not in the statistics we saw this week.

When it's all over, doubtless the Yankee power will have told its tale. But let no one forget that remarkable New York infield — man for man, as good as they come, perhaps in a short series the equivalent of White, Javier, Groat and

Boyer of the Cardinals — and those pitchers plus that splendid bench have done as much to get the Yankees' home in first place without much strain as that power did.

We pick the New Yorkers in five or six.

THE FILBERTS AT HIGH and Broad aren't so sanguine about Ohio State's chances this season.
