Some conclusions about the election

Did last week's election settle anything? Probably not. Nevertheless, some conclusions seem valid.

Although his opponent was a man of good reputation, as citizen and vote-getter, with a long record of sound public service, who could be depended upon to make a good showing in any election, the mayor was defeated on his own faults, or that the electorate thought were faults. His religion had nothing to do with his defeat.

Nobody questioned his right to make recommendations for hiring or firing, as allowed by law. It was his method, and that he was so vicious in application of it, that voters objected to.

His unfortunate use of obscene language during a council meeting, which he never sought to mollify or apologize for, did not help him at all. It shocked male voters and disgusted female ones.

He has pushed with vigor some notions of government in which he apparently believes firmly. We share some of those beliefs. But the electorate is simply not ready for them, and the mayor misjudged the temper of the people in this respect. Besides, his whole manner of presentation seemed to reflect a feeling that it is easier to drive people than to lead them.

The people proved otherwise.

And the people showed they believe strongly in the concept of Ohio municipal government laid down in the statutes: that the mayor shall be the principal law officer of the village, that he shall discharge justice in the mayor's court, and that otherwise he shall leave to the village council the formulation and execution of policy and to the board of public affairs the administration of village utilities.

The renewal of the school operating levy was accorded a 65 per cent majority, a lower plurality than accorded any other levy appearing on the ballot.

This should tell the board of education there are many who do not approve of the manner by which the schools are being administered.

We hear much, some of it in high irony, about "vigah" these days

If the school board will proceed with "vigah" to the job of improving education at all levels and see to it that all of its employees concentrate on that objective at the expense of politicking on matters which do not directly concern the district, we predict that future renewals will win stronger support. This is an important consideration. Not so much effort need be expended on "selling" an electorate that is already "sold".

For a starter, the board might undertake to obtain North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools accreditation for the high school.

For the money we're paying, we're entitled to have our diploma mean as much as anybody else's.

Root to get school post as 5th man

Thomas F. Root, a vice-president of the Fate-Root-Heath Co. with direct responsibility for advertising, will succeed Edwin S. Beeching as member of Plymouth Board of Education.

Beeching will resign because he is moving his family to Shelby, where he is employed.

Son of the Percy H. Roots and a product of Plymouth High school, the prospective appointee will serve Beeching's term. Mr. Root majored in industrial engineering at Ohio State university. He is married to the former Joanne Lawrence of New London, before her marriage a teacher in Plymouth High school and since then an occasional substitute teacher. They have four children, Susan, Thomas, Stephen and Todd, the first three pupils in the schools.

Mayor privately in hot water, publicly he's a lame duck

His political fortunes all but nil, Mayor Fazio found himself in economic and financial straits this week.

Ohio Real Estate commission, Department of Commerce, has refused to issue him a license to sell real estate because of failure to obtain a license to sell real estate by Jan. 1, 1963.

He has been formally licensed to sell real estate, says the commission, "since about Oct. 1, 1963."

Transactions which were negotiated by Fazio between Jan. 1, 1963, and the effective date of his new license are under scrutiny.

Investigators said they will submit their evidence to the assistant attorney-general, of Ohio charged with such prosecutions "for action after Dec. 17, when that officer resumes his duties."

Specifically, a property in Riggs avenue which Fazio is alleged to have dealt with is the crux of the state's case.

Ohio law provides that any person who shall deal in the

sale of real estate as agent or broker without a license is liable to a fine of not less than \$25 and not more than \$1,000, six months imprisonment or both.

Prior to Jan. 1, Fazio held a license to deal in real estate which was obtained for him by his principals, State Agency, Inc., Shelby, which terminated its connection with him during 1962.

Testimony of persons in Plymouth having knowledge of Fazio's business dealings in real estate was taken Thursday.

EARLIER, THE MAYOR-elect, Luther R. Fetter, and one colleague of the Board of Public Affairs, D. Guy Cunningham, Sr., required Fazio

to execute an affidavit that he in no way participated in the sale of the Charles Hubach property adjoining the village hall. They refused to execute a warrant upon which funds of the board would be drawn to pay for the property unless such an affidavit was submitted. They said he had previously listed the property for private sale and wished to make certain he had no conflicting interest in any contract entered into by the village.

Whether punitive action eventually be taken against Fazio is uncertain now. The powers of the attorney-general are discretionary. Ohio Real Estate commission investigators, however, said "we're pushing this, because it's not fair to legitimate and licensed realtors not to push. They have to comply with certain regulations and to pay for their licenses."

Gas rates to rise to old figure starting Dec. 1

Ohio Fuel Gas Co. today said portions of rate reductions, in effect since Dec. 1, will terminate Dec. 1 next.

The reductions were brought about by refunds received by the company from gas suppliers. Two and one-half cents per 1,000 cubic feet will be restored to the rate in Plymouth.

Public announcement of the expected rate change was made July 30.

Refunds received by Ohio Fuel from gas suppliers, on orders of the Federal Power Commission, are passed back to our customers through the operation of the fuel cost provisions of the cities' rate ordinances," said Walter D. Belsch, Columbus, vice president in charge of rates.

"When a refund has been completely passed back to our customers, the rate returns to the level it would have been without the refund.

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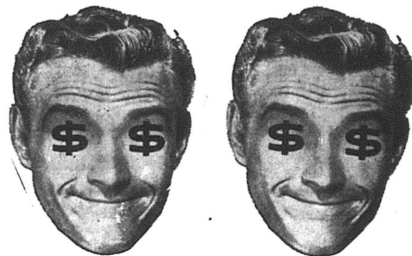
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Five new TB cases discovered in county

Five new cases of tuberculosis have been diagnosed in Huron county children since school opened in September, Dr. James M. Hindley reports.

The children, ranging from three to 12 years, are now hospitalized at St. Francis of Oak Ridge hospital in Green Springs.

Three adults were hospitalized with tuberculosis during this period. There are 13 patients from Huron county hospitalized with tuberculosis at this time, 11 of them from Willard.

There have been 36 X-rays taken and 47 skin tests made on contacts of the new cases.

No certain source of infection has been found. "It is almost certain there is at least one active case of tuberculosis, which is unknown at this time, to have infected the children," he says.

The Ohio Department of Health Chest X-ray cruiser is scheduled for a three-week visit to Huron county in November-December. "This program, along with skin testing in the schools and constant follow-up of contacts, is the only means we have at hand to discover and place under treatment all infected persons," Dr. Hindley says.

Cost of treatment is paid for by the tuberculosis tax levy in Huron county.

The X-ray cruiser is jointly sponsored by the Huron county and Ohio Departments of Health and the Huron County Tuberculosis and Health association, the local Christmas Seal agency.

Chest X-rays free to all persons over 18 or to young persons on orders from the health department or family

physician will be made by The cruiser in Greenwich Wednesday, Nov. 27, at the village building 9 to 12 a. m.

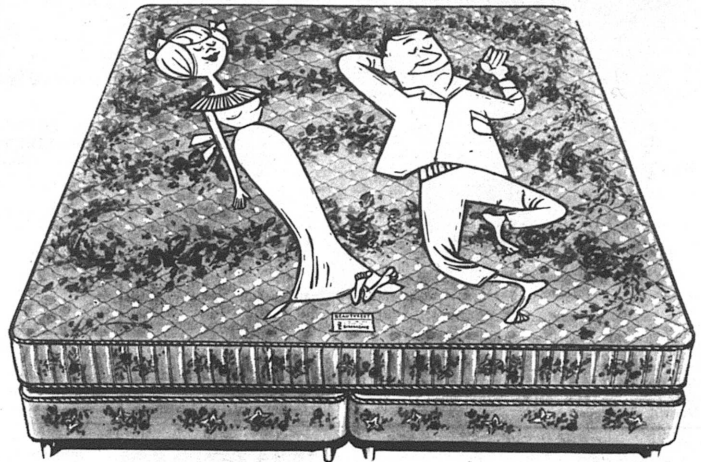

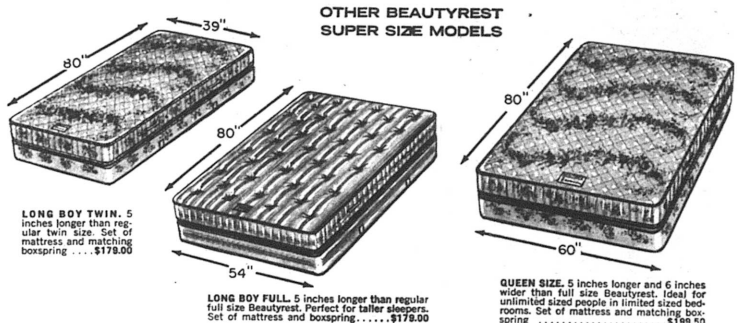

Stung by two quick Adrian scores, the Beavers rallied to win, 28 to 14. Reed sped 43 yards for a third period score to bring the Beavers to within a point of Adrian and then ran eight yards to establish the lead.

**Hunters to seek
upland game
tomorrow morning**

Tomorrow is "H" day to an estimated half million Ohio hunters.

Upland game season opens at 9 a. m.

Hunters seek rabbits, ring-necked pheasants and quail.

The hunting day opens at 9 a. m. and closes at 5 p. m. daily. Legal daily bag is four rabbits, six quail, two cock pheasants (or hens on special areas) and two Hungarian partridges, with a possession limit after the first day not to exceed two days legal limit. In addition, there are other game species already in season, so the opening day hunter can legally take a sizeable mix ed bag.

Cottontail rabbits are estimated to be 15 per cent below last year's population. The rabbit season extends through Jan. 31.

Season on ringneck cocks extends through Dec. 14 on private lands and Jan. 31 on public lands.

In the south hunting zone, the boundaries of which are shown on the hunting and trapping digest issued with each hunting license, and on special wildlife areas, either cock or hen pheasants may be taken through Jan. 31. The special wildlife areas include Auburn Marsh and Hamblen Orchard, Geauga county; Pleasant Valley, Ross county; and Spring Valley, Greene and Warren counties. The pheasant population has been estimated to be 30 per cent below last year's numbers. Hungarian partridges have the same season and bag limit as ringnecks.

Quail hunting runs through Dec. 14 on state-owned or controlled land. In addition, an extended quail season to Jan. 11 has been set for the Delaware Reservoir, Cooper Hollow, Indian Creek, Pleasant Valley, Ross, Rush Run, Spring Valley, Tranquility and Wolf Creek Wildlife areas only. Quail are also about 30 per cent below last year's population.

TRAPPING SEASON BEGINS at 9 a. m. tomorrow for minks, muskrats, raccoons and opossums. The season extends through Feb. 15, 1964, for raccoons and opossums and through Feb. 28 for muskrats and minks. All traps must have attached a tag bearing the name and address of the owner.

Hunting for raccoons and opossums begins at 12:01 a. m. tomorrow and thereafter the hours are 6 p. m. to 6 a. m. There is a daily bag limit of four raccoons a hunter.

There is no closed season on skunk and weasel and there is no open season on Reeve's pheasant, snowshoe hare or wild turkey.

"Don't forget to buy and wear hunting license," Dale E. Whitesell, chief, Division of Wildlife, reminds hunters. If you hunt on private land, be sure to get permission from the landowner. For those who do not have a place to hunt, there are about a million acres of public lands on which hunters are welcome."

Mighty Clear Fork showed here Friday night what a champion's made of.

The 1963 Johnny Appleseed conference title was locked up by the visiting Colts with a 50 to 0 victory over out-classed but game Plymouth.

The Colts stomped to a 22-point lead after the first period and had an easy time of winning, as predicted.

PLYMOUTH PENETRATED Clear Fork territory only once, never got inside the Colt 30 and was generally unable to contain the slashing green-and-white offense.

As it was, the Colts employed a weapon seldom used against the Big Red — the long bomb.

Clear Fork's quarterback, Carl Curtiss, pitched just twice and gained 112 yards in

doing so.

His tosses scored the first and last touchdowns of this chilly night.

With 9:56 on the clock in the first period, Curtiss threw 29 yards to Errol Eyster for the opening score. Clear Fork had recovered a Plymouth fumble at the Red 24. The snap from center flew over Phil Fletcher's head and Plymouth sustained a 12-yard loss on the play. John Hollar rammed tackle for the PATs.

EIGHT PLAYS LATER, Clear Fork scored again. Eyster intercepted Chip Paddock's pass and ran it in to the Plymouth 34. Dave Meeks hit center for 16, then Roy Kehl belted tackle for 13 and the TD. Meeks rounded end for the PATs.

Plymouth was unable to

gain in the next series. Fletcher punted to Hollar at the Red 49. In six plays the Colts had a third touchdown, although Plymouth recovered a Clear Fork fumble at its seven. But the Red was offside and after a four-yard penalty Hollar smacked off tackle for the six-pointer. He failed to convert the PATs.

On the first play of the second half, after the Colts' kickoff return had incurred a 15-yard clipping penalty to the Clear Fork 17, Curtiss dropped into the pocket and bombed the Red defense. Bill Frey was clearly 20 yards behind the Red secondary and took a toss that went 32 yards in the air for an 83-yard touchdown play. Curtiss ran into Paddock at the goal line and was bounced out-of-bounds, failing to

make the PATs.

THE CONTEST DEGENERATED into a lifeless defensive battle thereafter. Coach Bill Frazier inserted reserves wherever possible and Plymouth was able to advance somewhat in the late moments of the third period. The Red racked up three first downs before bogging down at the Colt 33.

Clear Fork was storming the Plymouth goal when time ran out.

Be it said for the Plymouth club, it fought hard and laid all it had on the line. But what it had, as was the case most of the season, was "a dollar short and a day late," as the field announcer put it.

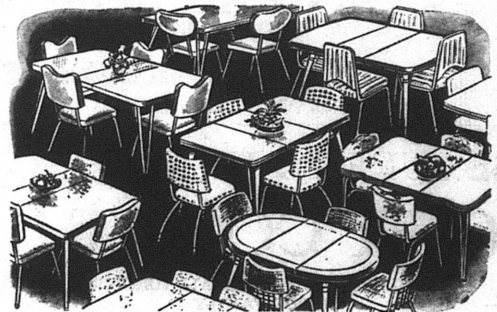
