

Is No. 7 charm?

Red plays Butler for county title after downing Bellville, 56 to 41

Is No. 7 lucky for Plymouth's Big Red? Basketball fans who go to Lexington tomorrow night will find out about 10 p.m.

For the seventh time in the 39-year history of the annual Richland county tournament, a Plymouth team matches skill and luck in the finals.

Only twice has a Plymouth team emerged victorious — in 1931 and again in 1934.

The Big Red won the right to contest for the county title against Butler's Bulldogs, twice defeated by Plymouth during the regular season, by whipping Bellville, 56 to 41, Tuesday night at Lexington.

FOR 16 MINUTES, PLYMOUTH played like a bunch of sissies. The Big Red couldn't do much right and seemed to be able to do much wrong. Bellville went to the dressing room for the halftime recess with a two-point lead at 23 to 21, built in a last-second overheard shot by Erny Eyster.

The Blue Jays jumped off to a commanding lead, first at nine to four, then at 12 to six, then 14 to seven.

At this point, with the first period nearly gone, Plymouth came alive and narrowed the gap to five points, at 16 to 11, after eight minutes of play.

TOMMY BARNARD AND Dave Myers, who was to score 25 this time, combined for buckets and Myers canned a free throw to put it to one point at 18 to 15 before Mike Wade threw in a good one from the corner to widen the lead to three at 18 to 15. Phil Fletcher countered with a jumper and Allen Arnold bag-

ged a set shot with 4:47 on the clock to put Plymouth into the lead for the first time.

Two minutes 24 seconds elapsed before another point was scored and Carl Curtis scored it. Plymouth had four chances to regain the lead before Curtis bagged a free throw at 28 seconds. Dave Myers tied it up at 21 with only eight seconds on the clock and Eyster's last-second shot regained the lead for Bellville.

Plymouth wasted no time in the third period. After Curtis bucketed a long one, Myers scored six successive points and sent the Big Red into a lead it never relinquished. The clock read 6:02 when Myers bagged the last of his trio. The Big Red led, 34 to 29, after three quarters and pulled away steadily in the final period.

Better shooting would have won it earlier for the Big Red, which shot only eight of 30 during the first half. The figure was 14 of 28 in the last half. Bellville shot 10 of 26 in the first half, eight of 27 in the last half.

Myers controlled the defensive boards almost entirely during the last half.

IF THE BIG RED DOWNS Butler, it'll be the third time this season. Plymouth won at home Jan. 14, 62 to 43, with Fletcher bagging 22 and Myers 19. The Big Red fought from behind at Butler Feb. 15 and won by a handful.

The road will be strictly uphill should Plymouth win this tourney.

The Erie county winner — all signs point to Milan — will join the Huron and Crawford county winners in the Mansfield district tournament. The Huron winner is Western Reserve, whose Mike Hyde scored 82 points in two games in the county tourney. He towers six feet eight. The Crawford winner is likely to be undefeated Colonel Crawford, which took Plymouth handily at North Robinson Jan. 11, 60 to 41.

Since there will be a seed, Plymouth will meet either Western Reserve or the Crawford county victor in the first round.

Fearing loss of revenues, mayors move to prevent approval of bill that isn't there

If there were any doubts that most village mayors regard their courts as producers of revenue, first of all, and as tribunals of law enforcement thereafter, they were dispelled last week.

Before any legislation of any kind affecting the permanence of village mayors' courts has been introduced, the village mayors' association has drafted a resolution to oppose "the bill now before the legislature."

ARGUMENTS SUPPORT the resolution:

1. To eliminate mayors' courts would deprive the villages of revenues.

2. To eliminate mayors' courts by transferring jurisdiction to the courts would mean village policemen would need to be replaced for short periods while they go to the court to testify.

Neither argument is sound, say supporters of a move — not yet matured into proposed legislation — to eliminate mayors' courts.

"First of all," they say, "there is no need to deprive the villages of revenues. Fines for convicted violations of village ordinances would naturally be paid to the village treasury. No other course is tenable. Court costs would, of course, be collected and paid to the county court. Perhaps some of them could be shared with the villages to reimburse them for out-of-pocket police expense. The purpose of eliminating mayors' courts is not to deprive villages of revenues. Its purpose is to insure that a qualified judge shall hear every case, which can't be guaranteed in a village mayors' court."

THAT POLICE OFFICERS may need to be relieved temporarily to insure continuing police protection of the village while they are in another community testifying in a county court is not disputed or disputable.

Only where there is one

police officer on duty at a time is this a problem. Some county courts recognize the situation and arrange to sit evenings, so that police officers can be present to testify. To the argument of police that "this is my free time," these courts respond, "In every city of Ohio policemen habitually give their free time to testify in courts. Particularly is this true in the biggest cities, such as Cleveland, Cincinnati, Toledo, Akron and the like."

The Brookings Institution, Washington, D. C., a universally respected impartial study group, concluded in 1959 that administration of justice in the United States needs improvement at the local level, particularly in traffic law enforcement. That each offender should be heard by a qualified judge was its first recommendation.

"Unless an attorney sits in judgment on each case, the rights of the individual may be in jeopardy . . . Because

they are subject to rigid disciplines of both a formal (i.e., legal) and informal (i.e., professional) character, they insure a higher standard of justice to everyone. Where non-attorney judges sit in judgment, it is difficult to overcome the presumption of the court's major reason for existence is to produce revenue rather than justice."

Very little hardship would accrue to villages if mayors' courts were eliminated, supporters of the move say. Ohio cannot long support, they observe, the suspicion that an accused is guilty unless he proves his innocence, a doctrine that prevails in most mayors' courts.

Red surprises Union in tourney

Eighteen days and 29 points! Plymouth's Big Red quintet played its ball game against Union at Lexington Friday night and won a close 51 to 49 decision in the first round of the 39th annual Richland county tourney. This avenged an earlier 69 to 37 humiliation. It was the fourth straight victory for Plymouth.

The winners took advantage of the Indians' mistakes and led all the way, although outscored narrowly in each of the last three periods.

UNION WAS WITHOUT Tim Clingan, one of the three big men who make the Indian offense go. Clingan was bedded with flu.

But with or without Clingan, Union can't blame anybody for losing this one. Ten turnovers in the first half, seven of them on bad passes, killed the Indians.

Five times the losers creaked to within one point of Plymouth and each time Jimmy Hamman, in certainly the most outstanding game of his career, steamed through the

middle of the Union defense for lay-up shots fired from every conceivable angle.

Neither team played well, although the shooting record of each was good. Plymouth missed only three of 10 free throws. Union four of 15. Plymouth shot 41 per cent of its field goal tries in the first half, Union 39 per cent. Plymouth bagged 52 per cent of its second half tries, Union 56 per cent.

The Big Red went into the final period with a five point lead at 36 to 31. Larry Farmer, leader of all scorers with 20 points, narrowed the lead to a single point with 2:27 on the clock.

Phil Fletcher on an assist by Tommy Barnard reestablished the Plymouth lead at 48 to 45. **DAVE GROFF BAGGED** two free throws, being fouled by Dave Myers. Then Fletcher scored again. Union stormed back and a lay-up teetered off the rim.

Plymouth had possession and came up the floor with 1:19 on the clock. Fletcher, the hero up to now, all but became the goat. He foolishly gambled on a shot and missed. Farmer recovered and Union raced back down the floor. Hamman snatched a pass and then threw one away. With

five seconds left, Dennis Stimma, senior guard who's the Union playmaker, fouled out. He had been in foul trouble since the middle of the third period.

WITH ONLY A SECOND on the clock, Union put the ball in play in its back court. Coach Bill Hartnett set up a tip-in play on a long pass to Farmer, since the clock would not start until the ball was touched.

With the score 50 to 49, Farmer fouled Fletcher at the final horn.

The Plymouth squad leaped with glee and mobbed its coach while Fletcher stepped to the foul line and shot the last free throw.

Bob Hoyt scores 30 as Butler slips past league champions

"We don't have much," Coach Gordon Shipley said at the start of the season. "But maybe our boys will learn something before the season is over."

How prophetic he was went on the record books at Lexington Saturday night.

Butler's Bulldogs, with only three wins in an 18-game schedule to show for their pains, played heads-up basketball and ousted league-champion Lucas from the county tourney, 65 to 64.

BUTLER FORCED LUCAS to foul heavily — three of the Cubs' biggest guns were on the bench early in the fourth period — and rallied in the last eight minutes to win the victory that guarantees the Bulldogs a place in the finals for the second straight year.

Bob Hoyt, the 14-year-old freshman who has matured so well during the season, scored 30 points to lead the Bulldogs. He tied the score at 64 with a free throw and Kenny Swank bagged a free throw with 16 seconds left to win it.

Lucas was ahead by 10 midway in the third quarter and

opened the final period with a five-point lead. Tom Sheidler, Dave Harvey and Joe Huffman were ejected for five persons during the last eight minutes, when the Bulldogs scored 20, six more than Lucas.

Butler held a two-point lead at the halfway point, 30 to 28, but Lucas came back strongly in the second half, only to fade as time ran out.

Burr Knaus, cattle feeder at Plymouth, and Robert Bachrach, Bachrach Cattle Co., served on a panel as part of the afternoon program.

Knaus, recently returned from a trip in the midwest, said the source of feeder cattle has shifted to the southern states. This is because more of the feeder cattle in Oklahoma, Kansas and Arkansas are going to feed lots in the west. Bachrach reported on his experiences with his feed lots, where from 1,200 to 1,500 cattle are on feed. He discussed the pros and cons of feeding Holstein steers as compared with choice cattle.

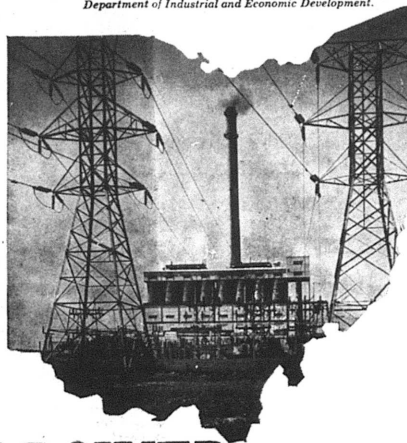

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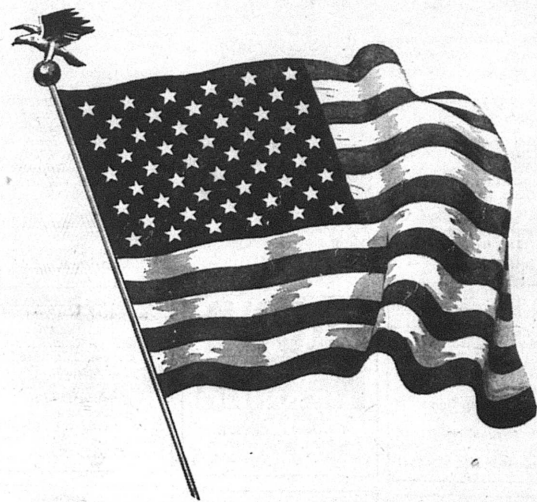
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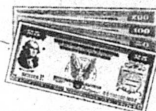
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
