

Rep. Ashbrook to address Chamber dinner tomorrow

Rep. John M. Ashbrook, the young 17th District Congressman whose casting of his colleague Adam Clayton Powell won him the plaudits of the House and of Time magazine, will address the seventh annual banquet of Plymouth Chamber of Commerce tomorrow.

A Johnstown weekly newspaper publisher and attorney,

Ashbrook is serving his second term. He unseated Robert W. Levering (D-Fredricktown), a previous Chamber speaker, in 1960.

Presentation of the Carl M. Lofland Memorial plaque will be made during the dinner to the citizen adjudged to have made the outstanding contribution to this community in the past year. The winner in 1962, Dr. Darrell B. Faust, will make the presentation.

Will school board move office of Strohmenger to Shiloh? policy on use of buildings set

A new policy governing use of buildings and grounds was adopted by Plymouth Board of Education Mar. 6.

It includes a schedule of fees applicable to school-sponsored groups, school-related groups, civic and community groups, Saturday meetings, Sunday meetings and recreational uses of gymnasiums.

No fee shall be collected, the policy says, from school sponsored, school related or civic and community groups or for Saturday meetings where school related or sponsored. All other meetings on weekdays will be at the rate of \$5 custodial fee for the first four hours or fraction thereof, \$1.50 an hour thereafter.

Sunday meetings will be at double the Saturday rate. School sponsored or related groups may use the gymnasiums free. Local civic and community groups will pay \$1 building fee plus \$5 custodial fee for the first four hours or fraction thereof and \$1.50 an hour thereafter. Non-local civic or community groups will pay a \$25 building fee plus \$5 custodial fee for the first four hour or fraction thereof and \$1.50 hourly thereafter.

There will be no Sunday use of gymnasiums and auditoriums for recreational purposes. WHERE USE OF THE premises is for the purpose of raising funds, school sponsored groups will not be charged for the use of the buildings or grounds. School related groups will pay for the base custodial fee. Local civic and community groups will pay \$1 building fee each day plus the base custodial fee. Non-local groups will pay \$25 building fee each day plus the base custodial fee.

Use of the cafeterias is regulated similarly to use of gymnasiums, except that \$50 an hour shall be paid for the services of a cafeteria supervisor. Sunday use of the cafeterias is at double the weekday rate. Showers, receptions and parties are governed by size of gathering.

Local parties attended by less than 30 will be charged \$1 building fee plus the base custodial fee. Local parties attended by 30 or more will pay \$5 building fee plus the base custodial fee. Non-local parties of whatever size will pay \$25 building fee plus base custodial fee.

Sunday parties will pay double the weekday rate.

All activities and use of the premises and grounds shall be arranged through the office of the executive head. Fees must be paid in advance. A custodial report submitted after each use of the buildings will determine whether privileges

shall be revoked.

EDWARD M. KINSEL principal and part-time sixth grade instructor in Plymouth Elementary school, will serve as full-time principal beginning Sept. 1, the board ruled.

Inadequate facilities for vocational guidance counseling in the high school prompted the suggestion, Supt. C. Todd Strohmenger said, that his office be moved to the annex at Shiloh, which is vacant. Guidance Director Frank R. Garber could then use the executive suite as a conference room. Estimates of costs will be collected and a decision made later.

Title to 34.4 acres of Wilkins Air Force station at Shiloh will soon be delivered to the board, Strohmenger reported. The board is required to use the site for 20 consecutive years to preserve title. The land will be used for vocational agricultural purposes.

Whether Principal Kinsel duties as chief of transportation will be determined later, when the board comes to grips with the dual routing program.

PREPARATION OF A SALARY schedule for secretarial staff was suggested by the executive head, who added it seems wise to separate the job assignment of the clerk and secretary to the executive head. If this is done, eventually, it will be done simultaneously with the moving of the main office to Shiloh, where unused space that has still not been paid for is available.

Cost of establishing a separate schedule for secretarial staff would be about \$750 in additional funds the first year, Strohmenger said. But no additional personnel would be needed even if the clerk's assignment is separated from the secretarial staff to the executive head, because there are two secretaries working part-time and serving as study hall supervisors in the high school.

Appropriations for the new school year were prepared to accommodate such a move, Strohmenger added, and would provide for a minimum salary of \$5,000 for a full-time clerk of the board.

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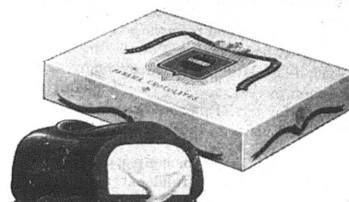

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Laboratory named for Dr. Arch Cole

A distinguished former Plymouthite has been memorialized by his employer, the University of Louisville school of medicine, which has named its new anatomy laboratory in honor of the late Dr. Arch E. Cole.

A memorial plaque has been placed in the present building. When the proposed new medical school building is completed, its laboratory will be named for him.

In special presentation ceremonies in Louisville, at which Dr. Cole's son and two daughters were present, Dr. Sydney E. Johnson, professor emeritus of radiology at the university and a long time friend of Dr. Cole, said the doctor possessed the intangible qualities which make a great teacher — "the love of truth, intellectual honesty, the love of learning and intellectual curiosity."

Two innovations Dr. Cole long advocated at the medical school now are becoming realities, he said. These are a reform of the school's curriculum and better living conditions for medical students.

At the time of his death in an automobile collision last summer, Dr. Cole was acting chairman of the department of anatomy in the university.

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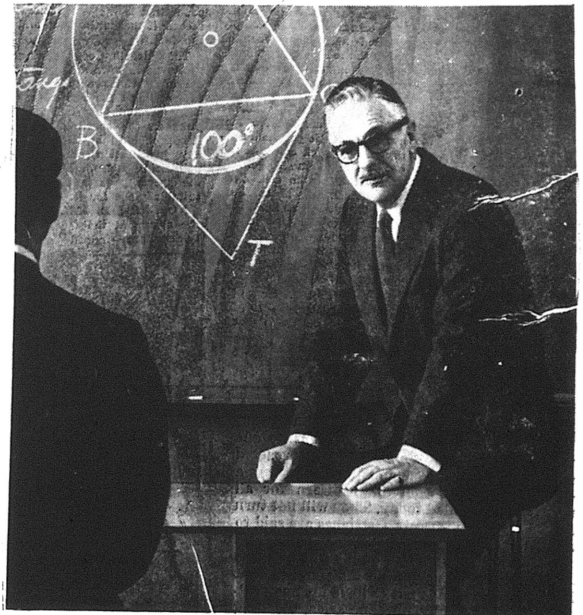

Red ousted in extra quarter by two

For want of a shot a basket was lost; for want of a basket, a game was lost; for want of a game, wait till next year.

Plymouth's Big Red bowed out of the state Class A championships in the first round of the Mansfield sectional Saturday night with a 56 to 54 defeat at the hands of Western Reserve in an overtime game.

With Mike Hyde, the Rough Riders' big 6-8 center, fouled out with 1:08 left in regulation, Plymouth had all the advantage. It was a young sophomore, Tom Lasley, whose father is executive head of Western Reserve schools, who led the Rough Riders to victory.

He shot one free throw with 35 seconds on the clock to make it 50 to 48. Tommy Barnd drove underneath for the tying bucket at 14 seconds.

FOUR OF THE WINNERS' regulars had fouled out by the start of the three-minute overtime period. Lasley shot a basket and then two free throws to establish a 54 to 50 lead. Barnd bagged a set shot to cut the lead to two at 54 to 52. Then he converted a re-

verse lay-up to tie it at 54 with a minute left.

Lasley was fouled by Dave Myers and calmly cannot both tries. Plymouth missed two field goal tries from close-in, one by Bob Young and one by Myers and with 10 seconds left Allen Arnold, with a bonus shot awaiting conversion of the first one, missed. Lasley was at the line with four seconds left with an insurance try that he missed.

Plymouth's Jimmy Hamman left the game with five personals with 35 seconds left and Phil Fletcher followed 20 seconds later. The Big Red thereupon looked to Myers for the scoring in the overtime. It was the first game this season in which the big center failed to bag a field goal. He missed four shots in the final canto.

At least one Big Red fan, was ready to pay it up after the first eight minutes. Western jumped off to a 16 to 4 lead, Hyde scoring six of the 35 he was to total in this one. But Plymouth fought back and went to the dressing room with a one-point lead at 21 to 20. The Big Red limited Western in the second quarter to four, the exact total Plymouth had scored in the first period.

PLYMOUTH GOT A FREE throw by Fletcher shortly after the second half got under way and another by Myers a moment later to establish a tie at 23. At this point the Big Red scored six straight points, by Hamman, Barnd and Fletcher, and after Hamman converted a technical called on Bob Sherwood when he fouled out, the Big Red enjoyed a seven-point bulge at 32 to 25.

Here Hyde began to click. The guards passed in to the big center and he simply whirled and shot over the heads of the Plymouth defenders. He is not a great ball player, and because of his inordinate size and an affected Lord Fauntleroy look on his face he induces officials to give him every break. He got them Saturday, until luck and time ran out, much to the disgust of Western fans who said Hyde was jobbed. This he certainly was not, but he was more than sufficient to his task in this one. Whatever level Western reaches in the tourney this year, Hyde will be responsible for 80 per cent of it.

Western shot 37 per cent of its field goal tries - 19 of 51 - and Plymouth also shot 57

per cent - 16 of 43. The Big Red was substantially below its season average in free throw shooting, with 22 successes in 43 tries. Western shot 18 of 34.

About this time of year, since 1938 or 1939, at least, it has been fashionable for the collegiate crowd to engage in activity which may qualify as sport. As much as professional wrestling, anyway.

Deponent cannot testify as to what occurred during the war years, but in each other year for a quarter of a century the close of the round-ball season demarcated the beginning of what he calls the knuckle-head season.

Last year the sport took the form of cramming collegians into a compact car, an act that Ringling Bros. Barnum and Bailey featured in its clown routine for 15 or 16 years until people got tired of it. The year before, it was the cramming of collegians into a telephone booth.

The knuckle head climbs into the spinner, engages a cohort to hold the door open and a finger against the trip switch and spins monotonously until he has achieved, if that is the verb, a new record, if that is the noun and the fact.

The dearth of exciting sports news toward the middle of March prompts some enterprising editors to display news accounts of such high jinks on the sporting pages. It is probable that, if there be any justification at all for publicizing such undertakings, the sports page is the most suitable place for it.

NO BRIEF IS HELD FOR the argument that such activities are indeed sports,

whether competitive or otherwise. But they do have some things going for them. Such as, for example, that they're not rigged, as professional wrestling is rigged.

And that, further, they're strictly amateur, in the truest sense of the word. All competitors, if that's what they are, remain as simon pure as a Davis Cup player in the pre-Tilden era.

Time and the acquisition of good sense dictate that an older gaffer, which is what deponent is, should look with some alarm upon the laundromat bit. Indeed, he has already exerted himself to disabuse at least one young man from such a performance.

But time and the memory of youth, ah, allow youth, dictate the conclusion that boys will be boys. Panties raids, pushing beds for miles and miles down the highway, cramming the young into compact cars and telephone booths and similar antics tend to manifest themselves with the venal equinox.

They serve no useful purpose. In some of their manifestations, they have endangered life, limb and the sanct-

ity of property, more's the pity.

BUT FOR THE MOST part they do no permanent harm.

Deponent knows wherof he speaks. Twenty-five years ago come Thursday, in the presence of a great all-American, the late Nile C. Kinnick, Jr., who was obviously pained by such conduct, deponent to prove his manhood ate three live goldfish.

Save, for an infrequent queasiness in his gullet that his physician insists is local indigestion brought about by an anxiety complex, such as that the income tax payment is due and the bank balance is low, there is no evidence of any kind that ingestion of the three fish has contributed to deponent's delinquency, physical or moral, in any way.

Pardon is sought and doubtless will be granted for recounting this tale on the sports page: one's basketball team is washed up, activity in the Grapefruit league hasn't progressed enough for one to choose a winner in the National league, and there isn't a damn thing to report on the sports scene.
