Ramsey named 'man of year'; Ashbrook decries irresponsibles

Edward O. Ramsey, veteran theater operator who is serving his second term as president of the Chamber of Commerce, is Plymouth's man of the year.

They have 18 grandchildren.

"We'll be happy to see our friends and neighbors," say the Fenners, "and we would appreciate it if they do not bring or send any gifts."

Ashbrook said the issue of 1963 is the determination of an intelligent system of priorities upon which to focus the national interest.

"The Soviets do this by placing the individual last. Traditionally we have done this by placing the individual first. This is my philosophy of government. I reject the concept of economic determinism which has seized our country. Economists say our wealth and riches come from the government but I say they come from our freedom," the young legislator asserted.

"Whether you're Democrat or Republican, liberal or conservative, it's not important unless you realize that all of us are evading our responsibilities — we think it's easier and better to spend money, whether

at home or abroad, than to give of ourselves, at all levels, federal, state and local."

"Foreign aid, Ashbrook said, isn't working because the United States has substituted increased appropriations for a stepped up person-to-person instruction and aid program.

Programs designed to improve the common welfare are not based on needs, he said, so that charity — "the finest representation of our Christian ethic" — ceases to become charity and becomes a way of life, because the rules and regulations assert rights instead of privileges.

"Our strength is in the morality of our people," Ashbrook said. "I have no fear we will go Communist. I am afraid of the future of our system as such because our people are

apathetic, they don't care. And we have a vigorous government bureaucracy eager to move into the void and to make rights out of temporary charity. When government gets big in the field of welfare, it's an escape from responsibility because it becomes a case of the gift without the giver. If you expect a government to be big enough to give you everything you want, you've got to expect it to be big enough to take everything it needs."

He urged Abraham Lincoln's philosophy on government upon his audience: retain a sense of humor, speak honestly and express your own convictions only, and be dedicated to a great common cause — the survival of Western

Gerken gets revised contract, claiming previous plans faulty

A new contract was approved for Plymouth's consulting sewer engineer Tuesday night. Its additional cost to the village, compared with the

past in force since December, is about \$5,100.

Carl M. Gerken, Napoleon, authorized in special session Mar. 12 to examine the files of the Ohio Water Pollution Control board, found no evidence of any approved plans dated after 1948, he told the village council. These plans have an expiration date of Dec. 31, 1950, "unless the work envisaged thereby is undertaken prior to that date."

The village's previous engineering consultant, Alden E. Stilson & Associates, Ltd., of Columbus, filed a request for federal aid for interceptors and treatment system on June 30, 1961, requesting \$91,668, based on plans stated to have been filed and approved in 1958. No record of receipt of the plans let alone approval, can be found in WPCB files, Gerken said.

Without approved plans, he asserted, he cannot prepare estimates or specifications for bidders.

The plans approved in 1948 require "considerable re-work to make them usable," Gerken added, and the cost of doing so is greater than the one per cent specified in the earlier contract. He asked for 2.5 per cent.

APPROVAL WAS GIVEN after Gerken produced offhand estimates of \$132,000 for interceptor sewers and \$330,000 for laterals and trunks, in addition to about \$132,000 for oxidation lagoons. His fee would amount to about \$48,000, he said.

No provision is made in the estimates for cost of acquiring easements, he said, and he has no way of determining how much this may cost. Neither is there any provision for payment of surveying fees for the easements, which the village must undertake separately.

The entire project may be closer to \$600,000 than \$500,000, councilmen said.

James Archer, attorney for three-fourths interest in the of the 55-acre tract abutting it, Bittinger farm and for Dr. and Mrs. George J. Sichel, owners to the south, notified Solicitor Joseph F. Dush Tuesday that his principals are willing to sell at the price offered by the council, subject to certain agreements and terms. These are to be negotiated by Archer and Dush.

Purchase of the three-fourths interest will reduce, Dush said, the amount of legal work necessary to obtain the tract. Only the one-fourth interest of Mrs. Mabel Mathews would remain to be acquired. It could

be obtained by purchase, based on what is paid for the three-fourths interest, or by condemnation, in which the purchase price of the three-fourths interest "would doubtless bear important weight on the eventual price," Dush said.

State board of tax appeals has approved an application to transfer \$20,000 from the electric fund to the water fund to finance a second water tower, Dush reported. A hearing in Huron county common pleas court, which he described as "perfunctory," is now required.

James C. Root and Darrell M. Hampton were approved as alternate firemen.

William Waller, Lofland street, obtained approval by 5 to 1 vote of a request that four loads of gravel be spread near his home.

Councilmen Donald H. Levering, Donald E. Akers and C. O. Cramer were named to a committee to investigate costs of remodeling the council chamber which includes removal of the west wall to enlarge the room.

Mathews gets \$300

Settlement of damage claims of Gilbert Mathews for \$300 was authorized by village council in special session Mar. 12.

Mathews, who farms the Britten-Sickel site on which the village proposes to install oxidation sewer lagoons, had asked \$1,500 in damages after boring rigs had entered the property. He agreed to accept the village's offer through his attorney, Henry Nichols, New Washington.

A fee of \$25 was paid to Stearns & DeVoe, Willard real estate appraisers, for services in connection with an offer to buy three-fourths interest in the Bittinger farm transmitted Mar. 13 to James Archer, Atlanta, Ga., attorney for Mrs. Isabel Bishop Moore, Mrs. G. J. Sichel and Dr. Sichel, by Solicitor Joseph F. Dush.

Gravel will be laid in Walnut and Lofland streets to afford occupants of new homes access to their premises, the council ruled.

A proposal to move the office of the executive head from the high school building to the annex at Shiloh was beaten by 3 to 2 vote of Plymouth Board of Education Mar. 13.

Mrs. Roy Carter, who cast the deciding ballot, said she feared the renewal of a three-mill operating levy, to be submitted to the electorate in November, would be endangered if the board should approve the plan.

She said its cost alone would make it unpopular with electors.

C. Todd Strohmenger, executive head of the schools, told the board he believes the move would improve education in the district, although he personally would be out-of-pocket in costs, since the mileage to Shiloh is greater than that to his present office.

HE ADDED THAT HE HAS altered his thinking on communications among the four buildings of the system, form an effort to obtain citizen's band radio last month to movement of the office now.

Earlier, Strohmenger acknowledged the suggestion to move his office from Dale B. Kinney, Richland county school superintendent, as a means of relieving the shortage of space in the vocational guidance department.

Strohmenger said he was informed the question of a public depository had been raised. The village of Shiloh is served by a branch of First National Bank of Mansfield, whose assets are roughly 70 times those of Peoples National bank in Plymouth, where school funds are now deposited. Ohio law requires school district funds to be deposited in proportion to total assets where there is more than one bank serving the district. Strohmenger said he learned that opposition to his plan to move the office leaned in part on the argument that to move the office to Shiloh would soon mean transfer of the bank account, since the clerk of the board would accompany the executive head to Shiloh.

The vote was strictly along community lines. Moved by Donald Dawson and seconded by C. David Rich, the motion received negative votes from President Donald P. Markley, Edwin Beeching and Mrs. Carter. Dawson and Rich are Shilohans, the other three Plymouthites.

EFFECTIVE JULY 1, THE duties of the clerk of the board and of secretary to the executive head will be separated. Mrs. Kenneth Myers, incumbent, will serve as clerk. She now draws \$4,800 for both jobs, \$250 a month as secretary and \$3,800 annually as clerk. Her pay will be \$5,000.

A salary schedule for secretaries was established. Minimum will be \$2,000 annually, with increments to \$3,300 and \$3,400, depending upon the number of months of service annually. Fifteen days of sick leave and 15 days vacation will be allowed.

Why moan over Ohio State?

The rewards of a successful basketball season came home to two Plymouth High school athletes this week.

Jimmy Hamman and Dave Myers won selection by players of Richland county schools (exclusive of Mansfield, Madison and Shelby) to an all-county team, Hamman by the largest number of votes of any choice. He polled 95 ballots, 14 more than Dave Groff, fine Union sophomore.

Joe Huffman, Lucas senior, and Groff drew 81 votes apiece.

Myers garnered 80 votes. Dave Shaffer, spunky Lexington playmaker, and Sam Nichols of Ontario were tied at 68 votes for the fifth spot.

Hamman, a little fellow as high school seniors go, was out for half a dozen games with a broken finger. It is not surprising that his absence coincided with most of the Big Red's defeats. He scored only 141 points during the season but his value as playmaker more than offset his 10.8 scoring average.

Myers had 247 points for his pains, an average of 11.7 a game.

Groff, Shaffer and Nichols will be back next season.

It is futile for one who has for so long supported with all but blind devotion a particular team against all others to decry such conduct in others.

But it must be done. The Buckeye State has produced this season at least five splendid basketball teams—Cincinnati, Bowling Green, Wittenberg, Akron and Ohio State. Not necessarily in the order named as to rank or quality. Each or any of them can hold its own with any club in the country, give or take a few points.

Save for Wittenberg, which is a private institution, each of them is supported from the public purse. Cincinnati and Akron, of course, more so from their municipalities than from the state as a whole, but nevertheless to some extent by every Ohioan.

The fact that Wittenberg, as a private educational institution of excellent standing and repute, avails itself of tax forgiveness which the rest of the tax structure must make up entitles every Ohioan to have a special feeling for it.

WHY THEN THE LONG faces because Ohio State failed to win undisputed possession of the Western Conference basketball title?

Surely not because the conference plays the best basketball in the country! For there is room for doubt about that. The Missouri Valley entries this season, for example, won more games against Big Ten opposition than they lost. This is true for the 1961-62 and

1960-61 seasons, also.

That in the NCAA championships for the past three years the Western Conference entry was defeated suggests that claims of superiority for that league against any other are unfounded.

Surely not because of tenure of the sport at Columbus! Ohio State is not the oldest higher educational institution in the state. That honor belongs to Ohio University. Nor was Ohio State the first to undertake basketball. That honor belongs to Oberlin. Ohio State wasn't even the first PUBLIC institution to take up the sport.

Surely not because the state university at Columbus is superior to any other PUBLIC institution in its assembly of intellect and competence by its faculty or student body! Even President Fawcett would

not so claim.

Surely not because the Morrill Act, passed in the 19th century, enabling some institutions to become land grant colleges and thereby to obtain some favored position in the acquisition of demesne, has any particular hold on Ohioans! It is the rash conclusion here that 95 per cent of all Ohioans never heard of the Morrill Act and don't know what it is.

WHY, THEN, THE PITIFUL lament that Ohio State's entry failed to win the undisputed title of the Western Conference?

The Bucks had a good team, a lucky team (and it is better to be a lucky than good) and a team that won more than its fair share of games.

Ohio fared well in the basketball wars this season, re-

gardless of how well or poorly the Bearcats of Cincinnati do at Louisville tomorrow and Saturday. So well, in fact, that no other state can point to such an outstanding record of achievement by any collection of colleges or universities, public or private.

So, please, let us have no more of the sour grapes spread so profusely and so meanly by the "alumni", whether real or phony, of Ohio State university.
