A hard winter

It has been a hard — and expensive — winter.

Just how expensive will soon be noted when householders begin to repair the damage to down spouts, roofs, water services and the like.

But these are not the only expensive operations that must be undertaken. Streets are in bad condition and it's plain that unless additional revenues can be raised, repairs must of necessity be piecemeal. For those living in less heavily travelled thoroughfares, the repairs may be extremely skimpy.

The right way to go about repairs, in our view, is for the council to give immediate study to the needs and to establish a priority of call upon available funds from which there will be no deviation. The public ought to be told in advance what priorities are established and afforded an opportunity to object, if need be.

There are only so many dollars available. The cost of maximum repair exceeds that availability. It is better to accord maximum repair to one street than to fritter away resources bit by bit, with no genuine repair.

Because there are three alternatives: pay more taxes, submit to special assessment, or live with reality and put up with what can be done.

Edward O. Ramsey, who attended OWU a generation ago, will be toastmaster.

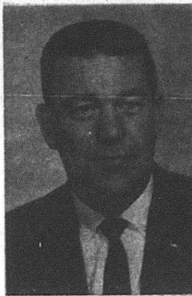
