Three old hands retire at F-R-H

Three veteran employees of the Fate-Root-Heath Co. punched the time clock for the last time Friday.

They are the first to retire under the compulsory age-with-pension arrangement inaugurated by the firm this year.

Their combined service is 121 years.

Forty-eight of those years is

the record of Rollo Van Wagner, New Haven, whose assignment as toolmaker produced numerous patents and innovations for manufactures of the company. His last assignment was as chief of the tool room.

Junior to Van Wagner in service by 10 years is Luther R. Fettes, who retired as service engineer in the locomotive

division after 38 years. Born Dec. 20, 1891, at Greentown, he came to Plymouth at the age of 10, obtained his schooling here and married the former Gladys Ruckman June 20, 1914.

After 10 years as a private businessman and as maintenance supervisor for the Norwalk - Shelby gasoline railway, he joined F-R-H Mar. 1, 1925.

Fettes is now chairman of the board of public affairs but has served previously as village councilman and school board member.

Low man on the totem pole in point of service is Neal Shepard, formerly of Plymouth, now residing in Shelby, who toiled for many years with inventory and stock control.

Kangaroo justice

Procedural difficulties may obstruct the drafting and introduction of a bill into the Ohio legislature that will transfer the jurisdiction of mayors' courts to county courts prior to the cut-off date later this month. But the right-thinking legislator ought to see what can be done to expedite the matter and get such a bill into the machinery so that it can be made into law.

It's clear to us that mayors' courts do not discharge justice adequately. It is patently impossible for a lay judge to adjudicate the law evenly, fairly and efficiently. He simply does not have the training to do so.

Mayors' courts have become an economic crutch for scores of communities, which rely upon their revenues to pay public expenses. The best authorities on government roundly condemn the financing of government on the peregrinations of its citizens. For a village to rely on revenues of its mayor's court is pretty much akin to the federal government anticipating, say, \$1 million in revenues from income tax frauds. The supposition is strong that if there aren't any frauds, the tax people will find them anyway.

Three years ago, when much of the jurisdiction was taken from mayors' courts and transferred to newly organized county courts, there was a hue and cry about lost revenue. Yet so far as we can ascertain, no village has gone bankrupt, no citizen has been deprived of protection of life, limb or property, no essential service has been denied because of failure to collect that revenue.

The argument that villages can't afford the loss of revenues collected in mayors' courts isn't worth a Continental. Villages shouldn't be counting on that revenue, in the first place. To do so leaves the whole foundation of honest government suspect. Police services should not be expected to pay for themselves, or any part thereof.

That police officers may need to leave their jurisdictions to testify in a county court on matters relating to arrests within the villages' jurisdictions is certainly true.

But isn't it worth the slight bother and expense to insure that nobody can complain of kangaroo justice?

Her pastor, the Rev. Harold L. Dague, will conduct a funeral service tomorrow at 2 p.m. from McQuate Funeral home, where mourners may call after 7 p.m. today. Burial will be in Greenlawn cemetery.

Reserve-for-depreciation fund for electric department ordered as price of transfer of moneys

A reserve for depreciation and replacement fund amounting to 10 per cent of the estimated value of the electric distribution system was established at insistence by the village council Tuesday night.

The council was informed the board of tax appeals will not approve transfer of \$20,000 from the electric to the water fund, so the council can finance a second water tower, unless a reserve for depreciation is established.

Although the board admits, said Councilman Donald E. Akers, it has no legal grounds for insisting on such a fund, and no powers of enforcement, it will not give its approval to the transfer unless the fund is established. The board is willing to allow the village to include \$18,000 in

councilmanic bonds held by the electric department and a materials inventory of \$9,680 in the fund. This means the village will need to put only \$12,320 in cash into the fund. The fund can be used only in dire emergency.

THE CONTRACT BY which Carl H. Gerken, Napoleon, consulting sanitary sewer engineer, was employed almost a year ago has been held in escrow in Peoples National bank until Gerken produced approval of plans to locate oxidation lagoons on the Bittinger-Sickel site. By 4 to 2 vote, Councilman John T. Dick and Charles Vansdale the dissenting, release of the contract was ordered. Proponents of the resolution argued Gerken cannot "get on with the plans until he is formally hired and can't practice before the Water Pollution Control Board until he has a

contract." Dick said "Gerken has already gone back on his word once, how much longer do we have to put up with this?"

Application for renewal of the permit for untreated sewage into the Huron river, which expires Apr. 15, was signed by Mayor William Fazio.

The village will seek to negotiate privately with James Archer, attorney for three-fourths of the interest in the Bittinger property and attorney for Dr. and Mrs. George J. Sickel. Archer notified the village from his office at Atlanta, Ga., that his principals wish to receive an offer to acquire the site by outright purchase. A real estate appraiser will be engaged by the solicitor, on the council's order, and the council will prepare not later than tonight an offer to be sent to Archer.

School finances dealt punch - \$7,900 due Shiloh

The delicate structure of school finances received a blow Feb. 27.

Solicitor Robert Ross told Shiloh's village council in his opinion any "deal" with the board of education by which assessments against school properties for sewer services would be reduced is illegal. And, Ross added, it won't be possible to allow the schools to pay their sewer assessments in installments.

The school board has been billed at \$1,186 annually for sewer services. The sewer service charge was originally set at \$4 a head annually. With nearly 600 pupils and staff, the Shiloh school should have been billed about \$2,400. Ross said the financing of the mortgage revenue bonds was based upon this charge and bond holders have a right to anticipate that revenue.

The balance due since 1959 — about \$4,800 — and the special assessment of \$3,184.65 must be paid to the village, Ross said.

The school board had proposed an annual payment of \$2,000 for all sewer charges, to include water fees. Now the schools will be required to pay at the rate of \$4 a head annually and to negotiate the water fees.

Big Red to battle Huron county entry

The first Plymouth entry in a sectional tourney in 29 years is a 12-point underdog against Western Reserve at Pete Henry gymnasium, Mansfield, Saturday night.

If the Big Red gets by the Rough Riders, whose attack is led by Mike Hyde, a 6-8 center, it will advance to the Mansfield district.

Only two entries stand between the Big Red and the Class A finals at Columbus — three at Mansfield, two at Lima and one at Columbus.

But it's miss-and-out from here on in. Athletic Director William Flaherty reports pupil tickets purchased at the school are 50 cents. They'll be \$1 at the door in Mansfield Saturday.

All tickets, adult and pupil, will be sold at the school today from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and from 7 to 8 p.m. Tomorrow from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to noon.

Sporting a seven-game victory streak, the Big Red won't make any changes "We'll still be counting on Dave Myers against Butler in two regular season outings, 23 the first

"Get him on one of those nights," one scout says "and you couldn't shove a dime under his feet, he's that bad."

Western Reserve will wear white jerseys Saturday, Plymouth red jerseys. The Rough Riders have a 17-3 record.



Oldest Plymouthite, Mrs. Bittinger dies

Huron county's oldest resident, Mrs. William Bittinger, 102, died Tuesday morning in Willard Municipal hospital, where she had been under treatment for a broken hip for some months.

Born Eliza James, daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Thomas James, near Crestline Aug. 26, 1880, she had lived on the farm north of Plymouth since she came there as a bride 81 years ago.

Until her accident, she was a vigorous gardener and performed her own household chores.

On her 102nd birthday, she had this formula for longevity: "It helps to have a family that lives a long time (her

parents lived to a total of 166 years, two sisters to a total of more than 180 years) and it helps to get up early and go to bed early."

She was a member of First Evangelical Lutheran church. Three daughters, Mrs. George J. Sickel, Swarthmore, Pa.; Mrs. Mabel Mathews, at home, and Mrs. Leslie Megargee, San Diego, Cal., survive.

There are six grandchildren, four great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren. The Rev. John H. Worth will conduct last rites from McQuate Funeral home today at 1 p.m. Burial will be in Greenlawn cemetery.

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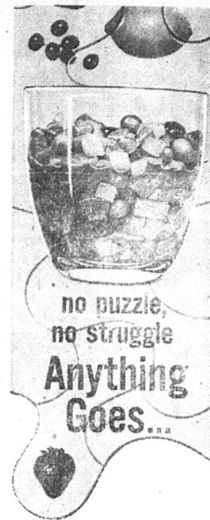

Mosher says GOP needs to do well where it's 'in'

Rep. Charles A. Mosher (R-Oberlin) 13th District Congressman, said at Kingsport, Tenn., Saturday the national party will depend largely on the success of Republican governors and Republican controlled state legislatures in demonstrating to the American people the party "stands for positive accomplishment". Speaking before a Lincoln's day dinner he said that necessarily the minority party in Congress, to meet its obligation to the American people, must develop "the will to say NO, NO, NO! when faced with the Kennedy administration's constant demands for increased power and added functions in the federal government." equally important that "great Republican governors and able Republican legislators say YES, YES, YES! in favor of soundly financed state and local programs to meet the valid needs and responsibilities, which too often are not being met at those levels." He said it is when state and local authorities "abdicate" their responsibility for valid needs that Washington "too often steps in and takes over." Mosher said "a most crucial American need is a revitalization of government at the local level."

Mosher said the best way for the Republican party to demonstrate its capacity for positive national leadership is by responsible accomplishment wherever it is in control of local levels of government. "In Ohio," he said, "this means we Republicans should work for and support programs that will provide schools second to none in the nation, state hospitals and enlightened psychiatric services second to none, highways second to none, and I personally believe Ohio should provide effective implementation to the Kerr-Mills act, to provide fully adequate care for the needy aged. If the states don't do that, inevitably Washington will."

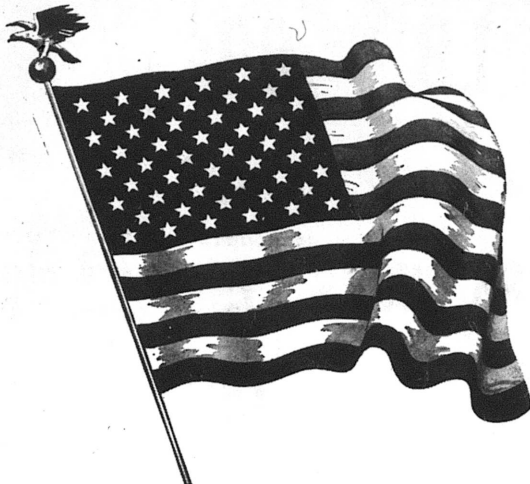

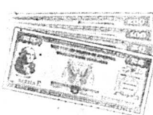

Red whips Butler for 4th county title

Plymouth's Big Red won the 39-year history — probably the last, said John Hauck, tourney chairman, because there may be only one Class A team in the county next year — of the tourney

that Plymouth won. The local entry capped the crown in 1926 by beating Lucas, again in 1931 by downing Shiloh, and finally in 1934 by beating Butler, Saturday's foe.

It was the eighth time a Plymouth team had reached the finals.

And it was the first championship in 29 years.

THE 60 TO 47 VICTORY was sweet, the more so because Plymouth won it in unorthodox fashion. Its principal point-getters got no great number of points in this one. Coach Ron Hostler had to go to his bench early and chose Earl Hess, a little used senior, to replace Phil Fletcher, who was having a bad night. Hess produced 10 points and some excellent floor play.

Tommy Barnd, playing his last season for the Big Red, outshone his teammates in this victory. Although he scored only 11 points, he led the Big Red in defensive rebounding and was the chief driver on attack. Be it said for Jimmy Hamman that he was playing with an infected ear.

Plymouth bagged the first basket and then fell behind for most of the first quarter. Hamman's set shot from 22 feet out with 37 seconds on the clock near the end of the first period reestablished the Plymouth lead and the Big Red never was headed.

Hostler was counting on a weak set of Butler guards and he counted correctly. Bruce Ramsey got into foul trouble early and without the ball-handling of Ramsey and Ken Swank, Bob Hoyt didn't get the feeds that are his wont. Nevertheless, he was top scorer in this match with 19 and lost at least six more when apparently sure baskets rolled out of the hoop.

AFTER DAVE MYERS ran into some foul trouble, his coach ordered him to handle Hoyt more loosely — "he isn't causing us that much trouble" — and the big freshman ran up eight points in the last half. Plymouth outscored Butler in every period save the third, when each team bagged 11. The Big Red shot 19 of 41 tries from the floor. Butler 18 of 43. Plymouth missed only six free throws in 28 tries. Butler bagged 11 of 19.

Both coaches cleared the benches when time was running out. The Plymouth coach was hoisted to the shoulders of his players and given a ride around the gymnasium before Hauck presented the trophies.

By popular vote of players, Butler and Belleville shared the sportsmanship trophy. Lucas was awarded a trophy as league champion.

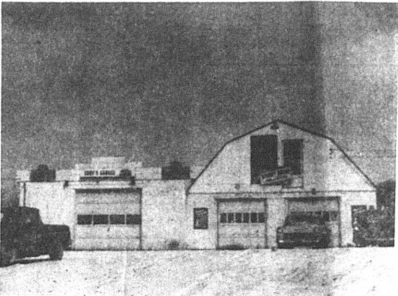
