Where do we stand?

Commencement time is all but upon us

The public is barraged with the propaganda of the most powerful union in Ohio, the Ohio Education association, which complains that we aren't doing right by education.

To the layman whose experience and opportunity for knowledge is limited, it's worthwhile to consider just what a high — school and the complaint is chiefly about high school shortages — is.

The typical U. S. high school, says Project Talent, Washington, D. C., after an in-depth survey of 1,353 schools, is this:

- part of a K-12 or 7-12 system
- fewer than 100 seniors
- serves rural or small town community
- spends about \$375 per pupil per year
- teachers average 10.5 years of experience
- average teacher pay starts at \$3,720-\$3,750 annually
- classes average 23-25 pupils
- building is about 24 years old
- chances of a guidance program about three in four
- principal is middle-aged man with a graduate degree who has about 12 years of experience as an administrator and about the same number as a teacher
- about 28 per cent of graduates go on to college
- about 10 per cent of 10th graders drop out before graduation

The researchers conclude the typical good (and the emphasis is upon "good") high school has four ingredients as measured by pupil achievement, staying in school, and going on to college:

1. Teacher salaries
2. Teacher experience
3. Number of books in library
4. Expenditures per pupil

These ingredients remain important, the researchers said, after region, rural-urban status and such socio-economic factors as median family income and quality of housing are held constant. "It is possible that the teacher salary schedule may be a good general indirect index of teacher quality," they say.

Factors not so important in determining a good high school, they add, are school size, average size of classes, age of building and suburban location.

Consider where our school stands and be guided accordingly, bearing in mind this: do you want your kids to be average?

All bids to furnish a new police cruiser were thrown out by the village council Tuesday night, only one of them having complied with the specifications and all three of them "too expensive."

One reason why police cruisers do not stand up well, councilmen said, is that streets are in poor repair. A brutal winter merely compounds the damage, Mayor Fazio claimed, to streets which have received little maintenance over the past one or two years.

He presented for discussion a proposed priority list for patching, repair and resurfacing of all 27 miles of streets and alleys in the village over a five-year period.

He admitted he cannot foresee where the village will obtain the money necessary to pay for such work.

ONE WAY OF SAVING money, he said, is for the village to buy an apparatus with which to put down and finish a new surface, at a cost of \$5,700. Over a period of two or three years, Fazio said, "the village will recover the cost of the machine in savings on work which we could do ourselves."

Several methods of payment for the machine, which has been repossessed in good condition, were outlined.

Alternatively, the village could buy a used roller, at \$600 before overhaul, with which to re-surface streets

on its own account.

No action was taken.

A resolution calling upon the General Assembly to defeat House Bills 557 and 558, providing for payment of real and personal property taxes and of excise taxes by municipally-owned utilities, was approved unanimously.

CARL HUGH HAS BEEN re-engaged as caretaker of Mary Fate park, the park board reported. Rates for reservations of tables under the pavilions have been slightly altered this season. All re-union and non-residents will pay \$1 per table, local residents 50 cents.

School principals get boosts in salaries

Salaries of its three school principals were raised by Plymouth Board of Education Apr. 10.

The board worked with a formula of base pay plus number of months on duty plus approximately \$40 for each teacher unit.

Wayne Strine, high school for 11 months and 1½ teachers, \$8325.40 or \$526 over his present salary;

John Fazzini, Shiloh Junior High and Elementary school, 10½ months and 20.8 teachers, \$9,008 or \$583 over present salary;

Edward Kinsel, Plymouth Elementary, 10 months and 11 teachers, \$7,552.80 or \$833 over present salary.

Kinsel's salary reflects the additional duties as head of the transportation system for the school district.

The raises, effective with the principals' contract dates, will cost the board \$132 over the sum appropriated in the 1963 budget. This was provided for in the monies earmarked for teachers' salaries.

C. Todd Strohmenger, executive head, had recom-

mended a higher schedule which the board turned down. It felt the principals' raises should be proportionate to those given teachers. These averaged about seven per cent. Strohmenger told the board, "The day of the \$4,000 teacher is gone. You have to pay for good teachers, administrators and coaches. You are very lucky to have three experienced principals. All have had elementary and secondary experience."

Permission was given to the Shiloh Midget league, represented by Delmar Nesbitt and William Rook, to use the baseball diamond there Mondays through Fridays. Four teams play through the summer months. The league will be responsible for erecting its own fence and other devices.

Plymouth Midget league, and the high school baseball team are vying for use of the diamond at the high school. The board set up Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday for the Midget league and Thursday, Friday and Saturday for the other two teams, which dates are interchangeable.

Jobie Hughes spoke for the Pony league. He said there are enough boys for two teams, some of whom will be playing on the high school team. Any changes of schedules can be worked out with the Midget league, he said.

The Midget league, however, will be responsible for taking care of its fence problem. It was suggested that a portable fence would be suitable.

On the lighter side, the board had a lesson in interior decorating and furniture arrangement. Strohmenger used the new overhead projector to suggest several ways by which more space can be gained in the two offices which now house him and the board clerk.

He and the clerk will trade offices and a desk for the secretary will be put in with Mrs. Kenneth Myers, the clerk. His present office is slightly larger, approximately 18 inches wider, than hers.

At the Apr. 24 meeting, the board will review the arrangement and decide if it is feasible. No action on hiring

a secretary will be taken until this decided.

All pupils who regularly ride with another pupil to and from school must have written permission from their parents and register in the school office. All other pupils may not ride to and from school with other than their own parents or another parent. If a pupil has been suspended from bus privileges or stays after school for any reason, it is the responsibility of the parents to provide transportation.

A new resolution requesting the county board of education to make a survey for a vocational high school was passed.

The board also gave vent to its feelings on the governor's reduction for school monies. Plymouth district can stand to lose about \$12,000 if various bills before the legislature should pass.

The district would have gained about \$40,000 had the suggested budget by the state department of education not been slashed. It speedily passed a resolution on this subject to be sent to the governor.

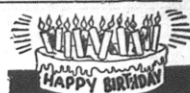

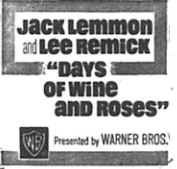
Council throws out bids for cruiser, to re-advertise
