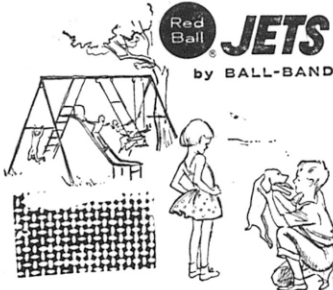

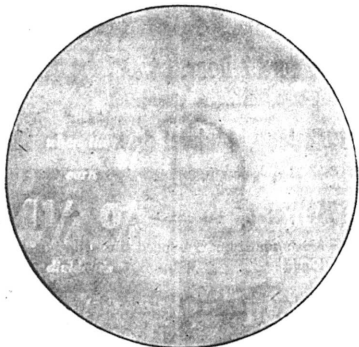

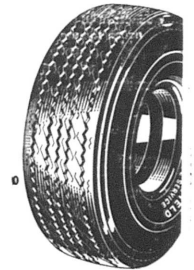

Baseball comes to maturity: college man accepted now

No more than a casual glance at the rosters of 20 major league clubs is required to assure the baseball fan that times have indeed changed.

George Tebbets, the erudite holder of a bachelor's degree in philosophy from Providence college, relates how he was compelled to write letters for his first roommate in organized baseball because that fellow could not write. Neither could he read. And his wife was in the same fix, so George read what a neighbor wrote for her.

A GENERATION AGO, THE college boy was seldom seen on major league fields of play. The few who made it were singular not only because they held collegiate degrees but because they were singular performers. One of the stripe of Mathewson, who went to Bucknell at Lewisburg, Pa., but nevertheless great players. Men like Henry L. Gehrig, the pride of Columbia, and Frank Frisch, the Fordham Flash.

The Yankees of the early thirties stepped up from their farm club at Newark two pitchers of the Ivy league. One was Johnny Broaca, a bespectacled righthander, who had pitched for Yale. The other was Charley Devens, a big strapping righthand pitcher off the banks of the Charles at Cambridge, where he won his varsity letter in three seasons of pitching for the John Harvards.

Devens proved after several outings at Newark and a spring training with the big club that he needed to learn more about fielding his position. So he was sent out to amateur and semi-pro clubs in Essex, Union and Somerset counties of New Jersey to play twilight ball with some fast clubs.

In a few weeks, Devens could handle the lunt down the first base line with great skill and the treacherous third base dribbler with slightly less ability.

With this equipment McCarthy started him one afternoon against Detroit. **THE TIGER BENCH GOT ON** big Devens with a Hah-vuhd accent and brutally remarked in raucous tones that he carried lace handkerchiefs, wore silk underwear and otherwise comported himself in a namby pamby fashion.

Such criticism was new to Devens but he showed no sign of distress. Until the fourth or fifth inning, anyway, when a Detroit outfielder deliberately swung wild at an inside pitch and let his bat sail at Devens' head. It struck the big pitcher over the eye, drew some blood and a big welt and stopped the game.

McCarthy wasn't the type to relieve a pitcher for such an injury and he prevailed upon Devens to stay on the mound. Bill Dickey was catching for New York. He called for three straight outside pitches and got them. The Tiger ran to first and began to jockey for a steal. Gehrig ignored him.

If there was some signal between Dickey and the shortstop, we did not see it. But when the runner took off, Devens' pitch broke outside and Dickey's throw was clearly four feet to the right field side of second. The shortstop speared it easily and drove his mitt into the jaw of the runner. They were 10 minutes reviving him.

When the inning concluded, Dickey spoke to Devens as they clambered down the dug-out steps. The big Arkansas spoke with a thick Ozark drawl.

"Donchew worry none about them bums, Hah-vuhd. You jus pitch like ah call 'em and me and the infield will do the res'."

DEVENS CAME TO BAT for the Yankees with one out in their half and Chief Hogsett, the Tiger pitcher, decked him, twice. Charley was a bit gun shy and fanned easily, waving at outside pitches because he was all but out of the batter's box.

The leadoff hitter was halted as he picked out a bat and McCarthy muttered something.

He took the first pitch and then laid down a dandy butt

along the first base line. It was no time or place for a bunt except that McCarthy wanted to play policeman when Hogsett wheeled off the mound to field the ball, the bunter hit him amidships with a block that would open a hole in the Packer line. Hogsett flew in one direction, his mitt and cap in another.

The umpire ruled the runner out for leaving the base path. The Tiger bench stormed up the steps and made for the runner. They hadn't a chance. Ten Yankees with bats in hand stood there, a solid phalanx. And one of them said, "He may be from Hah-vuhd, but let 'im alone."

There are so many college boys now, and such big ones, well able to take care of themselves, that such treatment is hardly necessary.
