Three teachers quit district jobs; Mrs. Sharpless hired at scale

Three resignations and one hiring were approved by Plymouth Board of Education May 8.

A one-year contract was authorized for Mrs. Ruth Sharpless, who will teach a second grade class in Plymouth Elementary school. She will receive \$5,038 on the current salary schedule.

With 20 years experience, she is now teaching in the Willard system at the New Haven building. Mrs. Sharpless received her bachelor's degree from Ashland college in 1961.

Mrs. Joan Coleman, fifth grade teacher at Shiloh, has resigned to accept a post in the Union district. Mrs. Louis Root and Miss Gloria Sharkey, elementary teachers, have accepted positions in Shelby.

School custodians received a

\$100 raise with two-year contracts effective June 1.

The five full-time custodians actually will receive a \$200 raise with their new contracts. Half of this is their normal increment on the salary schedule.

Their last raise was authorized Feb. 9, 1961, when the base salary was set at \$3,700 and the maximum at \$4,200. The new schedule begins with a salary of \$3,800 and goes to \$4,400 for six years of experience.

John Heifner and Henry Trauger will receive \$3,900, Glenn Moore \$4,000 and Henry Aumond and Charles Guthrie \$4,400.

The board amended the custodial duties to include any regular school activities such as the monthly P-TA and Mothers club meetings, open

houses and class plays.

FEE FOR THE DRIVER'S training summer school class was set at \$25. All other subjects offered in the summer school are free for pupils living in the district.

Summer school will begin June 3 and end July 26. This will allow for 120 required hours for full class credit.

Mrs. Cecil Smith will teach typing at a salary of \$288.83, William Flaherty health at \$305.55, L. J. Root driver's training at \$500, Jerry Bishop general science at \$511.11, Ronald Hostler American history at \$535.55 and Guy Flores remedial English at \$488.88.

Salaries for the summer session are based on the teacher's regular salary. The state will reimburse the district the sum of \$2,008.30 of the total salaries of \$2,629.87.

Because driver's training is not a regularly offered class in the school curriculum, no reimbursement is given for it. The \$25 fee per pupil partly covers the cost of the course.

A \$5 registration fee is in effect for the driver's training class. The full fee must be paid the day before the class begins, the board ruled.

This board decided that no class will be offered unless 10 pupils are registered.

Approval was given to James Davis to handle the school insurance. He represents Pioneer Mutual Casualty Co. State Agency of Shelby handled the policy last year. Principal Wayne Strine told the board the agent, Robert Stadler, was "very cooperative and the principals are very pleased with the work of the company."

This year, Shelby agency is representing another company, which does not offer quite so much as Davis' principals. The differences include payment for ambulance runs and a few dollars less on football players.

The actual deciding point, however, was that Davis resides in the district and has children in the school.

Six new typewriters will be purchased to replace World War II models. Total cost is \$1,200. The purchase will be by the sale of five old ones. The sixth is to be given to the high school library. Payment is to be stretched over a 12-month period.

Expenditure of \$650 for materials for room repairs was approved. Tropical Paint Co. has offered to send a representative to work with school custodians on the repairs until they have learned how the work is to be done. Glenn Moore will be assigned to this work. He will work with other custodians in their buildings.

Authorization was given for the purchase of a power mower costing about \$80 for use at Plymouth Elementary building. Later the board hopes to be able to purchase a riding tractor mower.

Clerk files petition

Village Clerk Carl V. Ellis filed his petition Thursday for reelection in November.

After the schools are closed, tickets may be purchased at a number of other points in Plymouth and Shiloh to be announced later.

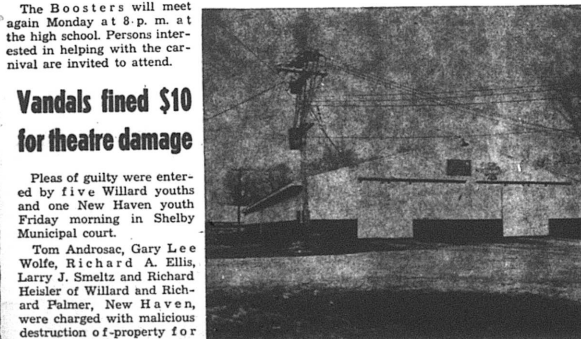
The Boosters will meet again Monday at 8 p. m. at the high school. Persons interested in helping with the carnival are invited to attend.

With two firsts, six fourths and a pair of fifth places, Plymouth's track squad captured a tie for third place in the annual Richland county meet at Ontario Saturday.

Ontario was the winner with 79. Belleville had 52 for second. Plymouth's 29½ tied with Union for third. Butler had 15, Lucas 15 and Lexington only four.

DICK STROUP LEAPED five feet nine inches to win the high jump and Phil Fletcher heaved the shot 43 feet seven inches to win gold medals for the Vikings.

A record set by a Plymouth entrant in 1961 was broken. Dayton Reed's standard of 21.4 seconds in the 180-yard low hurdles was lowered by Ken Brague of Ontario by a full second.

The Old Timer and his principal side heir were guests Friday night of Tom Meany and the New York Mets.

A casual reference to a speech delivered by the redoubtable Meany at Toledo some months ago produced an offer for two box seats in the best location in the Polo Grounds, directly behind home plate.

"All you have to do," said Meany's left-hand man, "is produce identification and the federal tax, which we are prohibited from paying you."

The tax is 80 cents a ticket. When we called at the window in the ball park, the attendant had difficulty locating the ducats. Seems they were by mistake inserted in the envelope reserved for Joey Bishop and Buddy Hackett, who turned up later much better insulated and alcoholized against the bitter cold wind than the O. T. and heir.

WITH THE TICKETS was an invitation to visit the Mets Lounge, merely a room in which the bartender gets \$1.15 for a thimble of Scotch and 85 cents for a bottle of beer.

As the logical heir to the old Brooklyn Dodgers, the Mets are certainly a fine choice. Casey Stengel has no more than six real ball players, if you count Duke Snider and Gil Hodges, and a collection of never-will-bees.

But the crowd is as it was in Flatbush a generation ago, before the Dodgers started to be a pennant winner.

It shouts gloriously when one of the Mets hits safely, cheers when he is thrown out, exhorts him when he steps into the on-deck circle and praises him generously at other times.

And for each paean favoring the Mets, there is an equal and opposite reaction against the visitors, in this case the Redlegs.

For the information of those who care, the Cincinnati entry will not win the 1963 pennant of the older league unless the airplane carrying the San Francisco club falls down. Or some such catastrophe strikes the Dodgers or perhaps the Pirates.

The Reds have no infield. Coleman is another Zeke Bonura. Rose cannot hit and is an uncertain fielder. Kasco hits occasionally and fields well. Freese hits well and fields occasionally. Cardenas is the only major leaguer on the inner defense.

The Mets defeated O'Toole and the Reds this night on a wrong-field homer of a player who earlier had committed the cardinal sin of outfielders. He ran backwards for a ball hit over his head.

Hickman sliced O'Toole's pitch into the right field seats for the winning run. This came after an error and Johnny Edwards' equally Chinese homer had given the Reds a two-run lead.

THE METS EVEN HAVE A mascot, a beagle hound who dons a blue and orange blanket with Mets written on it and parades on a little platform behind the home plate screen, where the television camera can see him. Two-thirds of the kids in the Bronx thereupon crowd into the field of vision of the camera and behave like little monsters.

The Mets won't go anywhere this year. It's unlikely they'll go anywhere next season. When they move into their magnificent new stadium on the Flushing meadows, their Brooklyn friends will find it less difficult to commute.

But they'll have strong support from Brooklyn for a long time. Until they challenge for the pennant, whereupon the Johnnies-come-lately from the Bronx and Manhattan and Westchester and out in Jersey will flock to the park.

Brooklyn likes an underdog. The more downtrodden, the better. In Casey and the Mets, Brooklyn has a real lulu. God bless 'em all!

ORDINANCE NO. 14-63
AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF A NOTE OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF IMPROVING THE MUNICIPAL WATERWORKS SYSTEM BY CONSTRUCTING WATER STORAGE FACILITIES AND THE NECESSARY APPURTENANCES THERETO, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, this Council has heretofore requested the Clerk to issue his certificate as to the estimated life of the improvement and the maximum maturity of the bonds hereinafter referred to and of the note issued in anticipation of said bonds, and the Clerk has certified to this Council such estimated life as exceeding five years and has further certified the maximum maturity of such bonds as forty years and of such note as five years, or one year if sold privately;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL of the Village of Plymouth, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That it is deemed necessary to issue the bonds of the Village of Plymouth in the principal sum of \$45,000 for the purpose of improving the municipal waterworks system by constructing water storage facilities and the necessary appurtenances thereto.

Section 2. That said bonds shall be dated May 1, 1964, shall bear interest at the rate of four per centum (4%) per annum, payable semi-annually until the principal sum is paid and shall be substantially equal in amount to the principal sum of said bonds. Such anticipatory note shall bear interest at a rate not to exceed four per centum (4%) per annum, such interest to be payable at maturity, shall be dated as of the date of issuance and shall mature on or after one year from said date.

Section 4. That such note shall be executed by the Mayor and the Clerk and bear the seal of the corporation. It shall be payable to the order of the People's National Bank of Plymouth, Plymouth, Ohio, and shall express upon its face the purpose for which it is issued and that it is issued pursuant to this ordinance.

Section 5. Subject to the rejection of said note by the Treasurer for investment in the Bond Retirement Fund, said note shall be sold at private sale by the Clerk for not less than par value thereof and at such rate of interest not exceeding four per centum (4%) per annum as may be fixed by the Clerk in his award of said note. The proceeds of such sale shall be paid into the proper fund and used for the purpose for which said note is being issued under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 6. Said note shall be the full general obligation of the Village of Plymouth and the full faith, credit and revenue of such Village are hereby pledged for the prompt payment of the same. The par value to be received for the bonds anticipated by said note and any excess fund resulting from the issuance of said note shall, to the extent necessary, be used only for the retirement of said note at maturity, together with interest thereon, and is hereby pledged for such purpose.

Section 7. During the years while such note runs there

shall be levied on all the taxable property in the Village of Plymouth, in addition to all other taxes, a direct tax annually not less than that which would have been levied if bonds had been issued without the prior issue of such note. Said tax shall be and is hereby ordered to be assessed, certified, levied and extended upon the tax duplicate and collected by the same officers, in the same manner and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of said years are certified, extended and collected. Said tax shall be placed before and in preference to all other items and for the full amount thereof. The funds derived from said tax levies hereby required shall be placed in a separate and distinct fund which, together with the interest collected on the same, shall be irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal and interest of said note or the bonds in anticipation of which it is issued, when and as the same falls due; provided, however, that in each year to the extent that the income from the waterworks system is available for the payment of such note and bonds and is appropriate for such purpose, the amount of such tax shall be reduced by the amount of such income so available and appropriated.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and recited that all acts, conditions and things necessary to be done precedent to and in the issuing of said note in order to make it a legal, valid and binding obligation of the Village of Plymouth, have happened, been done and performed in regular and due form and as required by law; that no limitation of indebtedness or taxation, either statutory or constitutional, will have been a bar to the issuance of said note.

Section 9. The Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to forward a certified copy of this ordinance to the County Auditors of Richland and Huron Counties.

Section 10. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, safety, and welfare in said Village for the reason that the immediate construction of the improvements to be provided from the proceeds of the bonds and the note herein authorized is required in order to protect the health of the inhabitants of the Village by providing adequate water storage facilities; wherefore, this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and immediately after its passage.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND THE CLERK TO ENTER A PURCHASE AGREEMENT FOR THE HUBACH PROPERTY ON SANDUSKY STREET IN THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: SECTION 1. The Mayor and the Clerk are authorized to enter purchase contract with the owners of the Hubach property, situated between the Village jail and the municipal offices building in Plymouth.

SECTION 2. This ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, welfare and safety and shall go into immediate effect, the reason for this emergency being that the acquisition of this property at this time for Village purposes is necessary for the operation of the departments of the Municipality and for the protection of the lives and health of the people of the Village.
