Council tables action on storm sewers

Village clean-up day set for May 9

An acrid exchange between Mayor Fazio and Council President John T. Dick marked Tuesday's special session village council.

Fazio alleged Dick seeks to "stall" action on storm sewer problems in East Main street and Dick retorted he will not "go off half-cocked on anything."

The exchange came after George Metzger, Shelby, had told the council he thinks 24-inch tile measuring 111 feet will solve the drainage prob-

lem in the rear of stores in East Main street and Sandusky street. He said present 10-inch services are too small to accommodate run-off from buildings in the northwest section of the Public Square.

Metzger could give only an approximate estimate of cost of tile and when a resolution calling upon the Huron county commissioners to contribute \$600 toward expense of the project was introduced, Dick said he wishes the advice of the consulting sewer engineer,

Carl H. Gerken, Napoleon, as to size, type and location of tile before authorizing any expenditure.

FOR HIS PART, COUNCILMAN Charles Vanasdale said, he will not vote for any expenditure of public funds to relieve private citizens who "already have sewer service." The complaints of the business houses are based upon the contention that improvements undertaken by the village increased storm water runoff to the point that services which

therefore accommodate all runoff no longer were satisfactory.

Councilman Donald E. Akers pointed out that two years ago the council refused to assist householders east of the AC&Y tracks in Trux street. They were advised to undertake correction of storm damage correction of storm drainage by assessment.

The resolution calling for Huron county assistance was tabled. Engineer Gerken is please see page 4

Salary scale for coaches set by schools

A salary increment schedule for coaches and extra-curricular activities was approved by Plymouth Board of Education April 24.

The coaching staff in most cases will receive the same increments as before. The athletic director was increased from five to 10 per cent of base pay and the junior high track coach was raised one half per cent to make the increase three per cent.

Total cost of all coaches based on present salaries is \$3,822.74.

No teacher may receive more than 15 per cent increment for these activities.

The coaching staff will consist of an athletic director, head football coach, head basketball coach, assistants to both, freshman basketball coach, high school basketball coach, cross country, track, junior high track and baseball coaches.

Emphasis, Executive Head C. Todd Strohmenger pointed out, is on basketball, where five coaches are needed during

the season to maintain the program.

Other increments are \$100 for direction of each class play; \$100 for yearbook adviser; \$100 for GAA and cheerleading; \$200 for slow learner classes, and \$200 for the band director. The latter will also receive one ninth of his base salary for one month of extra duty to direct the summer session of the band.

The high school guidance counselor will also receive one ninth of the base salary for one month of extra duty.

Increments for home economics and vocational agriculture are allowed by the state.

Strohmenger told the board these increases are provided for in the salary appropriations. He said the budget will provide for another high school English instructor and a full time elementary teacher to replace Edward Kinsel, who will be a full time principal in Plymouth Elementary building and take charge of all the

transportation in the district.

Another guidance counselor will be hired for the high school. Frank Garber the incumbent will be assigned classes in the expanded industrial arts department and serve as guidance counselor for the junior high school.

All experienced teachers entering the system will receive credit for a maximum of seven years of service. Administrators may receive no more than 10 years.

MRS. WILBUR SHIELDS was appointed secretary to the central office at a salary of \$240 monthly for 12 months of service. She is presently part-time secretary of High School Principal Wayne H. Strine. Her contract is for one year.

A one-year contract for Mrs. Roscoe Hamman, also a part-time secretary to the principal, at \$230 monthly for 11 months of service was also approved.

Mrs. C. David Rish was given a two-year contract at \$280 monthly for 10 months of service as secretary in the jun-

ior high school.

The variances occur to recognize differences in experience, Strohmenger said.

TEACHERS ENGAGED for summer school work will be paid one month of their regular salaries, the board ruled. The state will reimburse the school for expense of teaching any subject regularly a part of the curriculum. Tentative schedule of courses will cost \$2,653.93, of which \$2,008.30 would be reimbursed by the state.

Pupils in driver training will pay a fee, since the course is not regularly offered, and pupils in science courses will pay a laboratory fee. Pupils residing outside the district will pay \$25 a course. Pupils of Plymouth district will not pay tuition.

Until "something better can be done," Strohmenger said, the tentative office rearrangement is satisfactory. A motion recording the action as "temporary" was approved at his request.

Jim unleashed the next pitch at Pearsall's head, coddled him but good, and the unipire — advertisement —

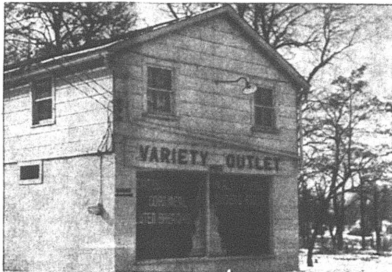
and some Tribe players had to hold him to keep him from charging the mound. Coates stood there pounding his mitt.
