ORDINANCE NO. 15-63 AN ORDINANCE TO PRO-VIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF A NOTE-OF THE VIL-LAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF IM-PROVING THE MUNICIPAL WATERWORKS SYSTEM BY CONSTRUCTING WATER STORAGE FACILITIES AND THE NECESSARY APPUR-TENANCES THERETO, AND DECLARING AN EMERGEN-

WHEREAS, this Council has heretofore requested the Clerk to issue his certificate as to the estimated life of the improvement and the maximum maturity of the bonds herinafter referred to and of the issued in anticipation of said bonds, and the Clerk has certified to this Council such certified to this Council such estimated life as exceeding five years and has further certified the maximum matur-ity of such bonds as forty years and of such note as five years, or one year if sold pri-
