

24th annual sale of poppies set by Legion auxiliary here

Saturday will mark the 24th year of the annual Poppy sale by the auxiliary of Ehret-Parish Post, American Legion. Auxiliary members headed by Mrs. Thomas Crabbe and led by Plymouth Girl Scouts will sell over 1,000 poppies. The poppy was adopted by the American Legion as its memorial day flower during the national convention in Cleveland in September, 1920. The auxiliary held its first annual Poppy day in 1921. Originally the small red flowers were worn in honor of the dead in World War I. They are made of silk material by the war widows and orphans the French soldiers. In 1922 the Legion turned over their manufacturing to the disabled veterans. Hospitalized veterans in Minnesota made the first red crepe paper poppies. They are now made at hospitals and workshops in all states. All revenues from the sale are used to aid disabled veterans and their children.

The Poppy sale is one of the main activities of the local auxiliary, formed in 1938 at the invitation of Lloyd Lippard, legion commander, and Harry Vandervort, adjutant. Mrs. E. L. Earst, first vice-president; Mrs. George Hershiser, second vice-president; Mrs. Vandervort, secretary and Mrs. Phillips Moore, treasurer. THE AUXILIARY WAS instrumental in organizing Plymouth groups to assist at restline during World War when troop trains passed through there and stopped for short periods. On Feb. 24, 1944, they helped serve refreshments to over 700 soldiers.

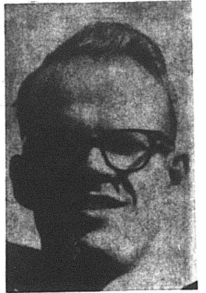

Council says no for present on public water for new homes

An effort by Plymouth Chamber of Commerce to obtain public funds to induce private builders to erect new housing here got no immediate encouragement from the village council Tuesday night. J. Benjamin Smith, treasurer of Chamber, appearing in place of Edward O. Ramsey, its president, asked the council if it would approve public expenditure to pay for water service to the allotment of Postmaster Raymond L. Brooks in West Broadway. Estimated cost is \$2,000, at \$4 a linear foot for a six-inch main.

But the council observed that other householders hold early priority on any funds to be spent for water extension, having petitioned as far back as four years ago. Smith said the Chamber has sought to interest private builders in erecting new homes. He said a list of 45 persons considered to be active prospects for new homes here has been compiled by the Chamber. Mayor Fazio, a real estate broker, added he has an active list of 13 persons who seek new houses.

Majestic Homes, Mansfield, has been asked to erect a model home for display purposes. The firm declined, saying it is not equipped to undertake such risks.

BROOKS WAS SAID to be planning to prepare four lots having 100 feet of frontage on West Broadway. Subsequent development of sites south toward the AC & Y railroad for a distance of 600 feet is possible.

Hardware dealers of Richland, Huron and Crawford counties will have dinner at Cornell's and later tour the village. Mrs. Fred Ross of Mansfield is spending this week with her daughter, Mrs. George W. Cheesman.

Councilmen Charles Vanasdale and John T. Dick argued that Brooks should undertake water services for his own account, recovering the expense on a pro rata basis when he sells each lot. Smith and Fazio replied this tends to make development too expensive and to discourage "a desirable element from settling here."

Fazio will discuss with Brooks the possibility of a share-the-expense plan, by which the village might install the main if Brooks pays for materials.

There will be no sanitary sewer installed in 1963, the council noted. Eugene Gerken, son of the late Carl H. Gerken, notified the council he is not a licensed engineer and is therefore not qualified to carry out his father's business.

He offered to associate with a licensed engineer, subject to the council's approval, if the council will resume the contract with him.

Although the village has no legal or moral obligation to the younger Gerken, the Council ruled he will be invited to discuss the possibility, together with his proposed associate, before another engineer is solicited.

A special meeting of the council next week will be called to approve a resolution requesting cooperation of the Huron county commissioners in street repair. Mayor Fazio will in the meantime prepare cost estimates of repair for Portner, Walnut and New streets.

Repair to Mulberry and West High streets, which lie in Richland county, is also contemplated, if funds hold out. Richland county commissioners will be asked to cooperate in this project.

Six to be heard

Six motorists will be heard in Mayor William Fazio's court tonight to account for speeding charges. They are Ruth Hartman, Plymouth route 1, 50 mph in a 35 mile zone; Daniel E. Kilgore, Plymouth route 1, 46 mph in the same zone; Carl E. Ginter, Shelby, 48 mph; Thomas A. Stover, Shelby, 43 mph and Gordon Smith, Plymouth, 47 mph. All were trapped by radar.

All have posted bonds of \$1 for each mile over the allowed 35 less the first five miles. Cynthia Snodgrass, Shiloh, is also to appear on a charge of reckless operation.

A Shelby driver, Stella M. Ingle, paid \$15 and court costs to the court this week on a charge of driving 68 mph in a 35 mile zone.

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ORDINANCE NO. 15-63
AN ORDINANCE TO PRO-
VIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE
OF A NOTE-O F THE VIL-
LAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO,
IN ANTICIPATION OF THE
ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR
THE PURPOSE OF IMPROVING
THE MUNICIPAL WATERWORKS SYSTEM BY
CONSTRUCTING WATER
STORAGE FACILITIES AND
THE NECESSARY APPUR-
TENANCES THERETO, AND
DECLARING AN EMERGEN-
CY.

WHEREAS, this Council has
heretofore requested the Clerk
to issue his certificate as to
the estimated life of the im-
provement and the maximum
maturity of the bonds here-
after referred to and of the
note issued in anticipation of
said bonds, and the Clerk has
certified to this Council such
estimated life as exceeding
five years and has further
certified that the maximum ma-
turity of such bonds as forty
years, or one year if sold pri-
vately;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT
ORDAINED BY the Council of
the Village of Plymouth, State
of Ohio,

Section 1. That it is deemed
necessary to issue the bonds
of the Village of Plymouth in
the principal sum of \$45,000
for the purpose of improving
the municipal waterworks
system by constructing water
storage facilities and the nec-
essary appurtenances thereto.

Section 2. That said bonds
shall be dated May 1, 1964,
shall bear interest at the rate
of four per centum (4%) per
annum, payable semi-annu-
ally on the principal sum of
said and shall mature in
twenty substantially equal an-
nual installments after the
issuance thereof.

Section 3. That it is neces-
sary that this Council hereby
determines that a note in the
principal sum of \$45,000 shall
be issued in anticipation of the
issuance of said bonds. Such
anticipatory note shall bear in-
terest at a rate not to exceed
four per centum (4%) per
annum, such interest to be
payable at maturity, shall be
dated as of the date of is-
sue and shall mature on or
before one year from said
date.

Section 4. That such note
shall be executed by the May-
or and the Clerk and bear the
seal of the corporation. It
shall be payable at the office
of the Peoples National Bank
of Plymouth, Plymouth, Ohio,
and shall express upon its
face the purpose for which it
is issued and that it is issued
pursuant to this ordinance.

Section 5. Subject to the re-
jection of said note by the
Treasurer for investment in
the Bond Retirement Fund,
said note shall be sold at pri-
vate sale by the Clerk for not
less than par value thereof and
at such rate of interest not ex-
ceeding four per centum (4%)
per annum as may be fixed by
the Clerk in his award of
said note. The proceeds of
such sale shall be paid into the
proper fund and used for the
purpose for which said note is
being issued under the provi-
sions of this ordinance.

Section 6. Said note shall be
the full general obligation of
the Village of Plymouth and
the full faith, credit and re-
venue of such Village are here-
by pledged for the prompt
payment of the same. The par
value to be received from the
sale of the bonds anticipated
by said note and any excess
fund resulting from the is-
sue of said note shall, to the
extent necessary, be used only
for the retirement of said note
at maturity, together with in-
terest thereon, and is hereby
pledged for such purpose.

Section 7. During the years
while such note runs there
shall be levied on all the tax-
able property in the Village of
Plymouth, in addition to all
other taxes, a direct tax an-
nually not less than that which
would have been levied if
bonds had been issued with-
out the prior issue of such
note. Said tax shall be and is
hereby ordered computed,
certified, levied and extended
upon the tax duplicate and
collected by the same officers,
in the same manner and at the
same time that taxes for gen-
eral purposes for each of said
years are certified, extended
and collected. Said tax shall
be placed before and in pre-
ference to all other items and
for the full amount thereof.
The funds derived from said
tax levies hereby required
shall be placed in a separate
and distinct fund which, to-
gether with the interest col-
lected on the same, shall be
revocably pledged for the pay-
ment of the principal and in-
terest of said note or the bonds
in anticipation of which it is
issued, when and as the same
falls due; provided, however,
that in each year of such in-
come so available and exten-
ded to the Village of Plym-
outh, have happened, been
done and performed in regular
and due form and as required
by law; that no limitation of
indebtedness or taxation, citi-
her statutory or constitutional,
has been exceeded in the
issuance of said note.

Section 9. The Clerk is here-
by authorized and directed to
forward a certified copy of
this ordinance to the County
Auditors of Richland and Hur-
on Counties.

Section 10. This ordinance
is hereby declared to be an
emergency measure necessary
for the immediate preservation
of the public health, safety,
and welfare in said Village, and
for the reason that the im-
mediate construction of the im-
provements to be provided from
the proceeds of the bonds and
the note herein authorized is re-
quired in order to protect the
health of the inhabitants of
the Village by providing ade-
quate water storage facilities;
wherefore, this ordinance shall
be in full force and effect from
and immediately after its
passage.

PURCHASE AGREEMENT
FOR THE HUBACH PROP-
ERTY ON SANDUSKY
STREET IN THE VILLAGE
OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, AND
DECLARING AN EMERGEN-
CY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF
PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:
SECTION 1. The Mayor and
the Clerk are authorized to
enter purchase contract with
the owners of the Hubach
property, situated between
the Village jail and the mu-
nicipal offices building in
Plymouth.

SECTION 2. This ordinance is
an emergency measure neces-
sary for the immediate preser-
vation of the public peace,
health, welfare and safety
and shall go into immediate
effect, the reason for this
emergency being that the ac-
quisition of this property at
this time for Village purposes
is necessary for the operation
of the departments of the
Municipality and for the
protection of the lives and health
of the people of the Village.
