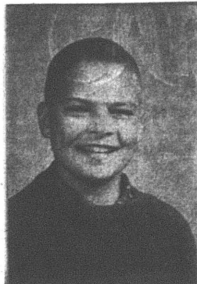

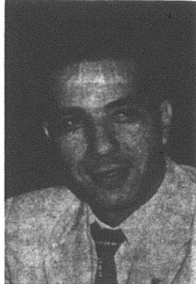

# Will Big Red gridders number more than handfull?

Prospects are that at least 187 boys will be enrolled in Plymouth High school next fall.

As matters stand now, barring any change in the regulations, the Big Red will compete in Class AA.

If Coach Richard Carpenter can count on 35 candidates for football, slightly under 20 percent of the enrollment, it's just possible the Vikings will not be wholly undermanned in their 10-game slate.

At least two-thirds of the opponents boast enrollments greater than Plymouth. Some of the schools, Fredericktown, Ontario, the new Belleville-Butler consolidation and Crestline, to name but four — have a hardnosed football tradition and will outfit considerably more than 35 candidates when the first whistle blows in August.

It's something to think about. If a program is both desired and desirable, it must

show participation to warrant the expenditure of time, effort and money. The values of interscholastic competition in

football are too well known and accepted to belabor them here. Parents and friends of football need to do some punt-

ing on their own, notably to urge more boys to turn out.

"Plymouth is a football town and Shiloh is a basketball town," one of the players told the O. T. recently.

Hogwash, son.

There is — or should be —

no distinction as to where a boy lives. He attends Plymouth High school, the program is offered and available and waiting for him to participate. Previous experience in the game means nothing. Young Walter Hall never played any

football anywhere until he was a junior here. And he shone brightly in the Red forward wall last season.

**THE STORMY MAX CHILCOTE** has left the Richland county coaching ranks. He never changed. When he was at Attica, he groused against referees and put on a show that at times would beggar Jimmy Pearsall. At Ontario, he was equally histrionic. Now he's going into the law profession. Some judge somewhere is going to rap Chilcote on the knuckles with his gavel if he performs in the court room as he did on the basketball floor.

Judges value the decorum of their courts, more so, apparently, than school officials value the decorum of their athletic programs.

His replacement? Jack R. Reeth, cage coach at Dresden High school since 1959 and Ohio Class A coach-of-the-year in 1963.

face the purpose for which it is issued and that it is issued pursuant to this ordinance.

Section 5. Subject to the rejection of said note by the Treasurer for investment in the Bond Retirement Fund, said note shall be sold at private sale by the Clerk for not less than par value thereof and at such rate of interest not exceeding four per centum per annum as may be fixed by the Clerk in his award of said note. The proceeds of such sale shall be paid into the proper fund and used for the purpose for which said note is being issued under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 6. Said note shall be the full general obligation of the Village of Plymouth and the full faith, credit and revenue of such Village are hereby pledged for the prompt payment and redemption of said note at maturity, together with interest thereon, and is hereby pledged for such purpose.

Section 7. During the years while such note runs there shall be levied on all the taxable property in the Village of Plymouth, in addition to all other taxes, a direct tax annually not less than that which would have been levied if bonds had been issued with note. Said tax shall be and is hereby ordered computed, certified, levied and extended upon the true duplicate and collected by the same officers, in the same manner and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of said years are certified, extended and collected. Said tax shall be placed before and in preference to all other items and collected in full amount thereof. The funds derived from said tax levies hereby required shall be placed in a separate and distinct fund which, together with the interest collected on the same, shall be irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal and interest of said note or the bonds in anticipation of which it is issued, when and as the same falls due; provided, however, that in each year to the extent that the income from the waterworks system is available for the payment of such note and bond and is appropriate for such purpose, the amount of such tax shall be reduced by the amount of such income so available and appropriated.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and recited that all acts, conditions and things necessary to be done precedent to and in the issuing of said note in order to make it a legal, valid and binding obligation of the Village of Plymouth, have happened, been done and performed in regular and due form and as required by law; that no limitation of indebtedness or taxation, either by statute or constitutional, will have been exceeded in the issuance of said note.
