Freak mishap fatal to William Reynolds

A freak accident at 9:30 a. m. Saturday took the life of a 26-year-old Shelby man who was born and raised locally.

William Edward Reynolds was pronounced dead by Dr. Charles O. Butler on the farm of his father-in-law, Leo Daup, in London East road, Cass township, after the latter found him pinned beneath a car on which he had been working.

Daup went to the field about 9:15 a. m. to work. After he had visited with Philip Kenil, who also later talked with Reynolds, Daup returned to his chores. In a short time Kenil returned to report Reynolds was pinned beneath the vehicle which he had raised on concrete blocks to enable him to install a new motor.

THEY RUSHED TO THE scene and found the car on Reynolds' chest and abdomen. The cement blocks on which it was suspended having crumbled. An extension light bulb was broken and the canvas on which Reynolds was lying had

caught fire. Daup removed the car with a chain hoist and sent for the physician, who pronounced Reynolds dead.

Dr. D. C. Lavender, Richland county coroner, said Reynolds died of suffocation.

A former Marine, he was employed by R. E. Moorhead & Son, Mansfield auto agency, in its department. He was a member of Mt. Hope Lutheran church, Shiloh.

His wife, Catherine; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roscoe L. Reynolds, Largo Fla.; three brothers, Donald, New Washington; Richard, Shiloh; and Roscoe, Jr., Columbus, and two sisters, Mrs. Richard Goodall, Columbus, and Mrs. Edward A. Miller, Largo, Fla., survive.

His pastor, the Rev. James H. Nichols, conducted funeral services Tuesday at 3 p. m. from Dye Funeral home, Shelby. Burial was in Mt. Hope cemetery, Shiloh.

Laubie files suit for \$1.225 million against Ford

Ford Motor Co., the Shelby Daily Globe and the Mansfield News-Journal are defendants in an action filed in U. S. District Court, Cleveland, by Fred Laubie, Shelby auto dealer, who seeks an injunction against Ford and compensatory and punitive damages totaling \$1.225 million against it and the other defendants.

Laubie alleges in his complaint that Ford Motor Co. is seeking to terminate his Ford dealer franchise agreement, which he says he had held continuously since 1933.

He asks the court to issue temporary and permanent injunctions against Ford Motor Co., Calvin Long, Bucyrus route 2, and Helen Long, Bucyrus route 2, (the Longs are owners of the showroom and garage occupied by Laubie at 81 West Main street, Shelby) from carrying an agreement with William Davis, Sebring, to whom sale of the agency was reported by the newspapers respondent.

Laubie asks \$750,000 redress against Ford Motor Co. and the Longs for damages alleged to have been received by him from the action which he labels in his complaint to be untrue. He says he has not sold the agency to Davis and because the newspapers respondent and Ford caused such information to be published, he has been damaged to the extent of \$500,000, since the public and financial institutions now refuse to do business with him.

Park vandalized

Carl Hough, caretaker of Mary Fate park, reported to Plymouth Garden club the petunias in the planters at the park entrance have been completely pulled out.

He also reported a car had driven through the flower bed, breaking off the flowering plants.

Garden club members say they will replant the planters and make one more try at beautifying the park entrance.

Shiloh fined \$100

Edgar Youngblood, 54, Shiloh route 1, was fined \$100 and costs a charge of intoxication in Huron county common pleas court June 15. He was arrested by the sheriff's department. Half of the fine was suspended on condition the defendant, who pleaded guilty, remain sober.

Robert Grohowski, 37, Swanton route 4, pleaded guilty

to June 11 and was sentenced June 18 to 90 days in jail after he pleaded guilty to theft of tires from Vern LeSage. Seventy-five days of the fine were suspended and he defendant ordered to pay court costs.

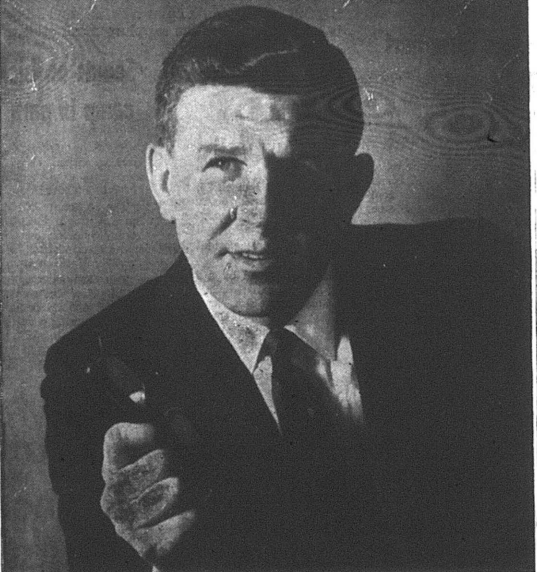

Old Timer thinks Indians won't rise higher, pegs Tribe for sixth place

Nostalgia, says our new dictionary, is "a very whimsical or excessively sentimental, sometimes morbid, yearning for return to some past period or irrevocable condition."

The word is well chosen to describe what seized 46,000 citizens in the lakefront stadium at Cleveland Sunday.

Taking a leaf from the book of the hated Yankees, the Indians summoned their championship heroes of 1948 to return for the plaudits of what turned out to be the biggest crowd of the season.

Loey Boudreau and the 1948 titlists, well, some of them anyway, comported themselves with much enthusiasm and some skill to the delight of those who harken back to better times and a better team.

INDEED, THE ONLY occasion on which the big scoreboard could be lighted up and set to exploding arena bombs was when Eddie Robinson walloped Hal Newhouse's southpaw offering into the right field seats. No Chicago or Cleveland athlete of the present could muster the strength or skill to do that.

That the 1948 Indians were defeated in a two-inning game was incidental, although it would have been nice if the champions could have won.

Rapid Robert Feller held the All-Stars down to no runs in the first frame. Thereafter Loey called in a string of pitchers, including shuffling Satchel Paige, who gave up a line single to Buddy Roscar in his only pitch.

The All-Stars got five scores in the second, and although the Indians rallied for

a run in their half, it was two little and too late.

The 1963 Indians comported themselves in that pattern throughout the afternoon. George R. Tebbetts, himself an all-star in 1948 when he played in a Boston uniform, has allowed that without injuries his clubs could take the pennant. It has been understood in this corner that the federal narcotics boys will look you up in Lexington for smoking stuff of that kind. Because Tebbetts is plainly doped when he thinks the 1963 Indians could win the flag, let alone finish in the first division.

WITH THE ENFORCED departure of the young Davalillo, the only real ball player in Indian uniform save for Donovan, Adeock and now Early Wynn, the Indians simply do not have much. They have flown high and far on support that defies the science of aeronautics.

Woodie Held is patently not a second baseman nor a lead-off hitter. There is not a big league outfielder among the whole lot of Indians. Alvis may develop into both an insider and a hitter, but he is not there yet. Whitfield is a farce. Francona is over the hill. Jerry Kindall is unable to hit enough to play regularly. Houser is just a journeyman.

Joe Arcue has played over his head and hit there, too. But what happens when Azcue has to rest? Neeman? Don't be silly.

The feeling is strong that Cleveland pitching might be better if the venerable Harder, coach these many years, were put to pasture. Sound baseball men argue Harder has insisted that strong young

throwers develop curve balls he will certify them for regular duty, at the expense of their general effectiveness and the resiliency of their arms.

There is much circumstantial evidence to support this view. Be it remembered that the great pitchers in Cleveland uniform since World War II had achieved their greatness elsewhere. And some others pitching creditably in other uniforms were out-and-out failures at Cleveland.

Over two million fans turned out to see the 1948 champions. The club won't draw half that this season.

Would it draw two million

with a winner? We dub it. Golf, putt-putt, auto racing, boating and other participant sports have enticed away folks who would otherwise go to ball games.

BUT MARK IT DOWN IN your little book that Cleveland will be cotton-pickin' lucky

to finish higher than sixth this season.

Which is why "Nostalgia" was the right word in the first place: "a return to some past period or IRREVOCABLE CONDITION."

The present Indians aren't a patch upon the '48 club.

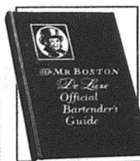
