THEY RUSHED TO THE scene and found the car on Reynolds' chest and abdomen, cement blocks on which it was suspended having crumb-led. An extension light bulb was broken and the canvas on which Reynolds was lying had

caught fire.

# Lauble files suit for \$1.225 million against Ford

Ford Motor Co., the Shelby Daily Globe and the Mansfield News-Journal are defendants in an action filed in U. S. District Court, Cleveland, by Fred Lauble, Shelby a ut to dealer, who see ks an injunction against Ford and compensatory and punktive damages totaling \$1.25 million against it and the other defendants. Lauble alleges in his com-

Laubie alleges in his com-plaint that Ford Motor Co. is seeking to terminate his Ford de aler franchise agreement, which he says he had held continuously since 1933.

He asks the court to issue temporary and permanent intemporary and permanent in-junctions against Ford Motor Co., Calvin Long, Bucyrus route 2, and Helen Long, Bu-cyrus route 2, (the Longs are owners of the showroom and owners of the showroom and garage occupied by Laubie at 81 West Main street, Shelby) from carrying an agreement with William Davis, Sebring, to whom sale of the agency was reported by the newspapers respondent

Laubie asks \$750,000 redress against Ford Motor Co and the Longs for damages alleged to have been received by him from the action which he labels in his complaint to be untrue. He says he has not sold the agency to Davis and sold the agency to Davis and because the newspapers re-spondent and Ford caused such information to be pub-lished, he has been damaged to the extent of \$500,000, since the public and financial insti-tutions now refuse to do bus-iness with him.


