

Police busy with counterfeiter

It was a busy weekend for Plymouth police.

An 18-year-old Plymouth youth was arrested Saturday and held for federal officers on a charge of unlawful mutilation of United States currency with intent to defraud.

Mason Reed, who lives with Clovis Sexton in Walnut street, admitted to police he cut corners from \$20 notes and passed them on a \$1 note, which he passed for \$20 value at New Washington. The note was eventually passed at Sharpless Texaco station here. It was traced to Reed.

Mack's Foodland was broken into during the night Sunday about 175 cartons of cigarettes and some \$10 in currency were taken after the rear door was forced. Police surmise the intruders hid their car in Mary Kate park and made their way on foot to the market.

R. Harold Mack, proprietor, told police about \$300 in currency stored in a light strong box was not touched.

William Thomas Brown, 43, Mansfield, was arrested here Sunday on a charge of drunk-driving. He was fined \$250 and costs.

Suspicious plates

lead sheriff on trail of market burglar

It's important to law enforcement agencies that citizens take notes of suspicious license tags, says Sheriff John Borgia of Huron county.

Because one citizen did so Thursday, sheriff's deputies arrested a 23-year-old Ashland man, who confessed breaking and entering a market at Delphi on July 7.

The trail led from a grocery at Fitchville to Savannah in Ashland county and thence to Edward A. Mills, 644 West 11th street in Ashland, who signed a confession there before Huron county sheriff's deputies Thursday.

It started when Clarence Mitchell, proprietor of the Fitchville grocery, was asked by strangers to convert \$15 in half dollars to paper currency. They purchased nothing in the store and his suspicions were aroused. He noted the license tag number of a red pick-up truck they were driving.

It belonged to Alfred Harpster, Savannah, whose son, Larry, was sought by police as Mills' confessed accomplice. Harpster was arrested July 12 and signed a statement admitting his guilt.

Both entered pleas of not guilty upon arraignment before Common Pleas Judge Robert J. Vetter. Friday and have been bound over to a grand jury on cash bond of \$2,000 each.

Will change in bus system force board to eliminate religious education classes?

Religious education in Plymouth public schools may be a thing of the past.

Kenneth Humbert, Shiloh, who taught the class last year in the two elementary schools, asked the board of education July 10 what its plans are for the classes during the coming school year.

Executive head C. Todd Strohmenger took a hands-off position. He cited the recent U. S. Supreme Court decisions in religious matters in the public schools and told the board it would have to make its own decision. The agreement to permit religious education to continue was in the 1962-63 only, he pointed out.

President Donald P. Markley told Humbert adoption of a dual routing system in use of school buses would result in a shorter school day for elementary pupils and observed this fact would probably mean there would be no time for religious education instruction during school hours.

MRS. ROY CARTER, board member, inquired if pupils can really afford the time during their school week to undertake religious instruction.

The matter was left hanging after Markley told Humbert the administration would have to see whether an additional 15 minutes of school time can be accumulated during the

now-tight schedule.

Five resignations were received, one of them while the board was in session. July 10 is the deadline by which teachers can terminate their contracts.

Resignations were from: Frank R. Garber, industrial arts and guidance counselor, who will go to a junior high school in Ashland.

Mr. and Mrs. Harold R. Davenport, Jr., band teacher and home economics teacher, respectively. He will teach in Coshocton schools next year.

Jordan R. Holthouse, mathematics instructor, who will engage in farming with his family. He said he might be available to teach part time.

Miss Donna Sue Harrison, Latin and biology teacher, who said she was homesick for Kentucky.

They are: Mrs. Howard Sloan, Shiloh, at \$4,770, to teach fourth grade there. She has a bachelor's degree and five years of experience.

Next clerk to get \$400 raise; treasurer's pay upped by \$100

Salary of the village clerk was raised by \$400 annually to \$2,500 and that of the village council Tuesday night.

Legislation to adopt the new salary scales will be promulgated so that it will be approved and made of record prior to Aug. 1, five days in advance of the deadline filing date for nominations by petition.

Heneses sell out at Wellington

The Wellington Enterprise, crack weekly newspaper published by Ernest L. Henes and his wife, the former Martha Artz of Shiloh, was sold last week to the Lorain Journal Co.

The Heneses published the paper 39 of its 99 years of existence. During that period, the respected newspaper twice won the coveted National Editorial association first place award for community service, the only journal in America so honored. Scores of awards fell to the newspaper, including the American Press association's 1950 Get-Out-the-Vote contest.

Henes has served his professional association in several offices, currently as trustee and treasurer of the Ohio Newspaper association.

He will continue as publisher and Mrs. Henes will continue to write the widely read and quoted weekly column, "I've Been Told."

731 of the revised code of Ohio prohibits any increase in the salary of councilmen. Their pay is now \$120 annually.

Fazio had sought increases of \$120 annually for councilmen, \$84 for trustees of public affairs, \$400 for the clerk and \$100 for the treasurer.

When incumbent clerk Carl V. Ellis told the council he fears the inception of a sanitary sewer system will burden the clerk to the point he cannot handle the treasurer's job satisfactorily, a plan to combine that post with that of the clerk was abandoned.

A conference with the board of public affairs will establish what portion of the clerk's salary will be paid from utilities revenues.

Occupants of the village lock-up are not to be treated

as "special guests", councilmen told Mayor Fazio. They objected to serving of "chicken dinners and steaks to men in jail". He was instructed to notify police that no more than \$1 may be spent for a prisoner's meal.

Huron county commissioners will contribute \$1,000 in cash, which the village will match, for repair of 5,200 linear feet of roadway in eight streets, Mayor Fazio reported. Richland county commissioners will contribute labor and materials. The first week of August was set as the time when the repairs will commence.

Six weeks have passed without any action by the newly engaged sanitary sewer engineer, Mayor Fazio reported. He was urged by Councilman John T. Dick to ascertain if "Roose still wants the job."

A request by the police department for about \$750 with which to replace radio equipment prior to mid-October was tabled, until "we get some tax money from Huron county."

Councilman Dick observed that "something we didn't bargain for will come in on us between now and October and we just can't make it. The clerk has bought up his retirement, some \$1300 worth, and we will have to pay out share, probably \$600, and the last time the chief of police took a vacation of a week it cost us over \$300 for extra labor. He has another week coming and we've got to watch our funds."

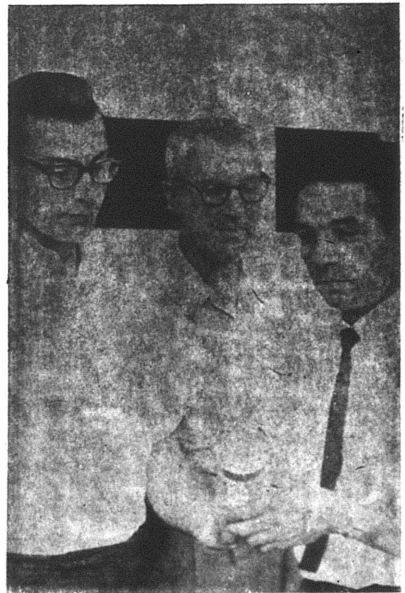

ders present equipment obsolete. If the new equipment is ordered in August, its delivery

in late September would enable the village to institute the new frequency-at the time of the official change-over in October, he said.

MAYOR FAIZO SAID Adoption of a charter and revision of the system of village government would save the

village at least \$4,120 a year in wages in the service department. He said a charter would enable the village to appoint a service director at \$5,500 annually, having responsibility for electricity, water, sewers, streets, cemetery and parks. This employee would be assigned four semi-skilled subordinates at \$1.70 an hour, who would function as "pool help", available for assignment to work as it develops.

Three councilmen — Dick Donald E. Akers and Willard

W. Wirth — took exception to his claim that qualified help would be available for \$1.70 an hour. They said they do not see how any savings can be made in salaries if the system of government is changed.

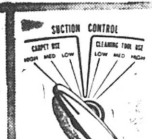

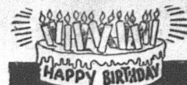

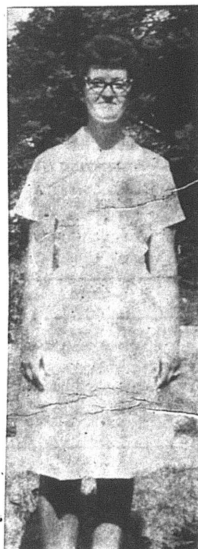
