



Water lower bids under estimates

Two bids totaling \$69,698.65 for construction of a 250,000 gallon water storage tank were accepted July 15 by Plymouth Board of Public Affairs.

Chicago Bridge and Iron Co., Cleveland, was the low bidder for the construction of the storage tank.

Only other bid received for it was from the Pittsburgh Des Moines Co., Pittsburgh, Pa., for \$68,500.

The foundation bid was won by Progress Construction, Inc., of Fostoria. Its bid was \$11,748.65.

Five other bids for the foundation were received from Funk Construction Co., New London, \$11,790; Bay Construction Co., Sandusky, 12,790; R. G. Bear Corp., Mansfield, \$13,804; Friebe & Hartman, Shelby, \$15,789, and Price Construction Co., Norwalk, \$16,977.

Council goes whole hog, raises members' pay, clerk, board

Village council authorized four pay raises Tuesday night.

Effective Jan. 1, 1964, the clerk of the village and board of public affairs will receive \$2,500 annually, a raise of \$400.

The board will pay \$1,475 from utility funds and the general fund of the village will pay \$1,025.

Annual salary of the village treasurer was raised \$100 to \$300, also effective Jan. 1.

Councilman approved a \$5 raise for each meeting. They now receive \$10. Beginning Jan. 1, they will receive \$15, or \$180 annually. Should they miss a meeting without being especially excused, they will be docked \$7.50 for it.

The board, which meets officially once a month, will receive the same raise. Annual salaries will be \$144 each. The same stipulation for meetings missed, in the amount of \$12 each, applies.

James F. Roose discussed his fees for engineering services in the sewer system.

A letter from the Water Pollution Control board to the village prompted the meeting. It asked for more specific information immediately concerning the hiring of an engineer and the beginning of the proposed sewers.

The council requested Roose to write a detailed contract to supplement the existing agreement signed by the mayor and Roose. He readily agreed this should be done. He said he believes "both parties must

understand each other completely."

THE CONTRACT WILL show the percentages of the sewer costs which will be Roose's engineering fees. He will receive two and one-half per cent to update the existing plans prepared by Alden E. Stilson and Associates. Where new plans must be made, he will receive five per cent. Under state law, total fees cannot exceed 10 per cent of the complete cost of the installation.

Roose said he is certain some of the figures the late Carl Gerken had set down for costs are still correct. But he warned the Gerken figures which were made in 1961 might be about 10 per cent lower than actual costs.

Three factors, higher cost of labor, materials, and shipping charges, may raise the estimate, he said.

If available village funds are not sufficient to cover these increases, there is a possibility the originally planned "sewerage district" in the village may have to be restricted.

"Cuts can be made," he said, "but the state will not give its approval unless the system is absolutely complete." He suggested that he and the council have another session to check areas in the village which are to be served.

He assured the council he would be able to start on the Plymouth plans under the existing working agreement next

week and would have the contract drawn up for the council to study at its next meeting.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS TO ENTER INTO CONTRACTS FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO WATER WORKS SYSTEM AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: Whereas, The water system of the Village of Plymouth is in need of improvements and additions, and Whereas, The Council of the Village of Plymouth has declared it to be a necessity to make the necessary improvements and additions, and Whereas, The Board of Trustees of Public Affairs have received bids for the improvements.
Now THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: SECTION 1. That the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs be and is hereby authorized to enter into a contract with: Chicago Bridge & Iron Company, the sum of \$57,950.00 for Contract 1, Elevated Water Storage Tank.
Progress Construction Inc., the sum of \$11,748.65 for Contract 2, Tank Foundations, Piping and Contracts.
SECTION 2. That funds for the contracts be and is hereby appropriated from the Water Tower Construction fund for the purpose of meeting their obligations.
SECTION 3. This ordinance is an emergency measure, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, welfare and safety and shall go into effect immediately. The reason for this emergency is that the erection of the water system improvements hereinafter contemplated is necessary at this time for the protection of the lives and health of the people of the Village.

ORDINANCE NO. 28-63
AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, FIXING SALARIES OF THE CLERK, THE TREASURER, COUNCILMEN AND MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: SECTION 1. From and after the first day of January, 1964, the offices of Clerk of the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs and Clerk of the Village of the Treasurer of the Village of Plymouth shall be combined in Ordinance No. 6-56, passed in Ordinance No. 6-56, shall carry a salary of \$2500.00 per annum, \$1475.00 of which shall be paid by the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs and the balance of the salary of the Treasurer of the Village shall be paid out of the Village General Fund.
SECTION 2. From and after the 1st day of January, 1964, the salary of the Treasurer of the Village of Plymouth shall be \$300.00 per annum, payable quarterly.
SECTION 3. From and after the 1st day of January, 1964, the salaries of councilmen shall be as follows:
(1) The councilmen elected to begin their term on January 1, 1964, shall be paid a salary of \$180.00 per year, payable quarterly, provided however, that any councilman absent from a regular meeting of the council shall suffer a reduction in salary of \$7.50 for each meeting missed, unless especially excused from attendance by the council.
(2) Councilmen elected to begin their term on January 1, 1966, shall be paid a salary of \$180.00 per year, payable quarterly, beginning January 1, 1966, provided however, that any councilman absent from a regular meeting of the council shall suffer a reduction in salary of \$7.50 for each meeting missed, unless especially excused from attendance by the Board.
SECTION 4. From and after the 1st day of January, 1964, the salary of members of the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs shall be \$144.00 per annum, payable quarterly, provided however, that any member of the Board absent from a regular meeting of the Board shall suffer a reduction in salary of \$12.00 for each meeting missed, unless especially excused from attendance by the Board.
SECTION 5. This ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, welfare and safety and shall go into effect immediately, the reason for this emergency being that the salaries herein provided are necessary in order to retain competent services in the positions indicated.
