Village council authorized four pay raises Tuesday night. Effective Jan. 1, 1964, the clerk of the village and board of public affairs will receive \$2,500 annually, a raise of

The board will pay \$1,475 The board will pay \$1,475 from utility funds and the general fund of the village will pay \$1,025.

Annual salary of the village treasurer was raised \$100 to \$300, also effective Jan. 1.
