Today is Youth day. A bicycle rodeo at 9 a. m., acoustome and pet parade for youngsters at 1 p. m., a Little League baseball game at 2 p. m. and free acts by Jimmy John and Gene Agin at 7 and 10 p. m. are scheduled. A drawing for \$100 will be conducted at 10:30 p. m.

Tomorrow is Ladies day. A free cooking school sponsored by Ohio Fuel Gas Co. will be conducted in Shiloh Junior High school at 9:45 a. m.

Mrs. Alice Clawson will be hostess for the new fall dress show in the Junior High school at 1:30 p. m.

Billy and Helen Scott will present their performance at 7 and 10 p. m. Judging of pioneer costumes will take place at 7:30 p. m. and another drawing for \$100 at 10:30 p. m.

Mrs. William Fritz dies; emulated Gran'ma Moses

Shiloh's grand old lady, Mrs. William Fritz, died quietly in her sleep Tuesday noon in Shelby Memorial hospital.

One of the oldest and most active members of the community, she celebrated her 94th birthday Feb. 12.

The former Bertha Gedney, she was born in Haskins in Wood county, the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. D. B. Gedney. Her father died when she was young and she was raised by her aunt, Mrs. Cornelia Hulbert, in Plymouth. She attended local schools and Berea college, where she studied art.

She married in 1894, lived in Shelby several years. In 1898, the Fritzes moved to Shiloh, her home most of her life. He died in 1926.

As she grew older, she returned to her first love, painting. Failing eyesight did not hinder her. When necessary

she used a strong magnifying glass to complete her work. She was well in her 80's, when her pictures took a number of ribbons in art shows in Mansfield and Cleveland. After she returned to Shiloh as a widow, she opened her home to many young school teachers. She participated in activities of Angelus chapter, OES, and in the WSSC of Shiloh Methodist church.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Frank Dawson, Plymouth route 1, and Mrs. Elizabeth Fryman, Dayton; one son, Dr. Harold D. Fritz, Cathlamet, Wash., a sister, Miss Ada Gedney, Elyria Methodist home; 13 grandchildren and 24 great-grandchildren.

OES services will be today at 8 p. m. in McQuate Funeral home. The Rev. H. L. Daguerre will conduct final rites tomorrow at 2 p. m. there. Burial will be in Mt. Hope cemetery.

The family will receive friends at the funeral home from 2 p. m. today.

Council declines to pass board's water request

Board of Public Affairs was rapped on the knuckles by village council Tuesday night.

An ordinance approving a contract with Floyd G. Browne Associates, Marion, to provide engineering services in connection with extension of water services to the Brooks allotment in West Broadway, was tabled, despite the Board's fulsome support.

President Luther R. Fetters of the Board said he took vigorous action after the Board agreed, in regular session, to extend water services to the allotment by summoning Browne engineers to prepare plans for the extension. A Browne official was present Tuesday night with plans already prepared.

Estimated cost of the extension is \$14,980. Raymond L. Brooks, owner of the allotment, has ordered pipe at a cost of \$6,379.36, which the Board agreed to install.

Councilman Charles Vansdale interjected here that Fetters and his colleagues on the board should not have promised extension of the water service without approval of the council.

AFTER COUNCILMAN Donald E. Akers joined with Vansdale in objecting, the

ordinance was tabled, because in its proposed form it was "a blank check." The board was instructed to obtain detailed estimates of costs, including Browne's fee.

Police Chief Robert L. Meiser asked for authority to expend the remainder of his vacation, a total of six days, on Saturdays. The council demurred. Cost of replacing the police chief on a Saturday, during the peak load of police work, is too high to justify allowing the chief to have leave on that day, the council said. His request was referred to the police committee.

Permit to dump untreated sewage into the Huron river has been extended to Feb. 15, 1964.

James F. Roese, the village's sewer, notified the mayor he will submit periodic progress reports. He has received the proposed contract, but since his lawyer is away, he has not yet been able to execute it.

He suggested a meeting Sept. 1 to discuss what areas of the village the sanitary sewers will serve.

Purchase of a snow plow for \$750 was approved, subject to financing arrangements suitable to the village.

Shiloh's school first built in 1870 with eight rooms

The original eight rooms of the Shiloh school were constructed in 1870. Four rooms and an auditorium were added in 1922.

In 1949 a bond issue financed a 10-room addition. Old records say the building was constructed in 1878 by F. Bricker and Co. of Shelby, at a cost of \$5,848.50. C. W. Wakefield, J. C. Fenner, C. McBride and C. S. O'Dyke signed the building contracts.

Miss Pearl Darling recalls the Fourth of July parade when 18 members of her Ruth Gleasons class of Mt. Hope Lutheran church had their gaily decorated purple and white wagon pulled by the Vansdales' white horses also were decorated in purple and white. Other recollection:

Ringling Bros.-Barnum Bailey circus purchased a very fine chestnut colored Belgian horse from Boyd Hamman.

At the WSSC meeting Aug. 11, 1949, Mrs. Charles Seaman, read a paper in honor of the late Mrs. Flora Marriott Swadger.

It traced the history of Shiloh Methodist church. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William H. Long, helped to organize the second Methodist church in Richland County. The first Sunday school began in Mansfield and the second in Cass township near Plankton in 1824. It met in various locations, including the Long's cabin home.

Dr. Reynolds dies after heart attack

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon for Dr. D. C. Reynolds, 73, in Greenwich.

He was an optometrist in Greenwich until his retirement three years ago. He died Friday afternoon, a few hours after being admitted to Willard Municipal hospital after a heart attack.

He was a native of Greenwich and graduated from the Philadelphia School of Optometry. For many years he practiced in Logan before returning to this area.

He was a member of the United Methodist church, Greenwich lodge 543, F. & A. M., the chapter, the council and the commandery of Masonic lodges at Logan.

His wife, three daughters and six grandchildren survive. The Rev. Stanley Robinson conducted the final service. Burial was in Greenlawn cemetery there.

Religious education to continue; board to seek method of accumulating time

Religious education will continue in Plymouth public schools during the 1963-64 school year, the board of education ruled by almost unanimous vote Aug. 14.

Only Edwin Beeching abstained. Four members voted to continue the religious education class for elementary pupils subject to an administrative determination of whether it is lawful and feasible to schedule 15 minutes of each school day to be used for religious instruction one day a week.

Executive head C. Todd Strohmenger told the board the school day would consist of five hours 15 minutes, of which five hours are required by state law. "If we would be allowed to accumulate 15 minutes a day so that one hour could be collected for the religious instruction, it could be carried on as it is now," he said.

HE READ TO THE BOARD the recent U. S. Supreme Court decisions about religious instruction in public schools and warned that if a decision to continue religious education is made, the board may be required to fight the policy in the courts.

A delegation of supporters of religious education led by Kenneth Humbert, Shiloh, the teacher, and the Rev. Harland L. Daguerre, pastor of Plymouth and Shiloh Methodist churches, was present to urge continuance of the program.

The board president and clerk have received 67 letters the signers thereof in some cases sent the same letter to two addresses, urging the program be continued.

Both Strohmenger and the board acknowledged the ad-

ministration has not seen the curriculum and has no knowledge of what is being taught. The legal structure upon which the program is permitted to continue was described by Strohmenger thus:

The law allows pupils to be released from public school to attend religious classes. In Plymouth schools, an idle classroom is leased by an association of churches so that pupils may report there. Participation is voluntary, based upon a signed request by a child's parent or guardian.

OF THE SEVEN CHURCHES in the district, only two support the program financially. These are Plymouth

Methodist and Shiloh Methodist. St. Joseph's Roman Catholic church in Plymouth conducts its own program after school, in its own quarters. Mt. Hope Lutheran church, Shiloh; First Presbyterian and First Evangelical Lutheran churches in Plymouth, and Rome Community church do not contribute.

Gerald Ognibene, a graduate of Niagara university with a master's degree from Canisius college and 40 hours toward a doctorate in education at Ohio State university, was hired as guidance director and English and Latin instructor. Only second year Latin will be offered this year, for one year only.

His salary is \$6,500 annually.

Deborah Hunsinger, Wadsworth, a graduate of Oberlin college in 1961, with two years

of study in Germany and Austria, will teach German, a new subject, and general science. She will be paid \$4,368 annually.

Although another teacher of slow learners is desirable, hiring of one, the board ruled, shortage of funds will prevent.

No speech therapist has been engaged by Richland county system for the coming year.

Mrs. Russell Barbour and Mrs. Robert Forsythe were hired as cafeteria supervisors, at Plymouth and Shiloh, respectively. Their salaries were set at \$2,450 for 10 months of service.

Other cafeteria employees are Mrs. Clea Hass, Mrs. Charles Vansdale, Mr. Frances Rodman, Mrs. Leo Russell and Mrs. Nellie Hall, at \$1,700 annually each.

Shiloh's founding matter of differing view by historians, but bear, wolf were there

Although Shiloh this year is celebrating its centennial, the community is really much older than 100 years.

Records show the first settlement in Cass township, near the present site of Shiloh, was established in 1815 by John Long.

The country was wild then, wilderness and swamps that teamed with wildlife of every kind — wolves, deer, bear, and wild turkey, in addition to bobcats, raccoons and other smaller game in abundance.

An interesting account of conditions existing then is given in a history published in 1894 by an in a Huron-Lorain County J. H. Beers & Co. of Chicago, Ill. on the subject of W. P. Noble, father of the late Sherm Noble, who at one time operated a pool room in Plymouth where the American Legion now is.

Harvey Noble, father of W. P. and grandfather of Sherm, according to the account, came to Richland county from Pennsylvania in 1827 and settled near the present site of Shiloh.

"The country was even then in a most primitive condition," the account reads. "The forest teemed with animals of the chase: bear, deer, and wolves were abundant, and even the panther came to visit the district at intervals."

"On one occasion, Mr. Noble was compelled to go as far as Plymouth for a doctor; the wolves appeared to be unusually disturbed and howled the whole night, but he went on his journey, unmindful of the brutes, and that night was the last one for the wolves in the country."

W. P. NOBLE WAS BORN in 1839 on the family homestead in Richland county, and after his marriage in 1864 to Eliza Jane Starkey settled on a farm just across the Richland county line near the Big Four railroad tracks.

I distinctly recall him back in 1917 and 1918, riding up road in a one-horse wagon and down the County line road with a white goat on his chin. "Uncle Billy," the neighbors all called him, and occasionally he would stop to chat with my brother Charles and me when we were in the

field along the road.

He liked to talk of the past and the country as it was when he was a boy. "I remember," he said, "when the 40 acres of your father's farm here (which was two miles north of Shiloh) "was all dense woods and swamps. Prachere and Shiloh was woods teatally all the land between here and Shiloh was woods and swam p. It was full of coons and just about everybody kept coon hounds and huntury to markets in Cleveland."

The Hale pasture across the road, now owned, I think, by Frank Hopkins, was, he said, one vast beaver dam and in later years known as the Beaver Dam farm.

William Noble, 78, who resides on the old family homestead near Cherry Tree corners in Noble road east of Shiloh, is a distant relative of W. P., as is Loren (Cooney) Noble and the late Lloyd Noble. Their father, John, was a first cousin of W. P. The farm, he said, has been in the Noble name for over 100 years, one of the few farms within a five mile radius that can boast continuous family ownership for so long a period.

Prior to acquiring the name of Shiloh, after the Civil War battle of that name which occurred near Pittsburgh Landing on the Tennessee river on Apr. 6, 1862, the community was known as Salem.

The Moser brothers, Ross and Jay, have on display in their hardware store a large map of Richland county printed in 1856 which shows Shiloh

listed as Salem and nearby Planttown as Richland. For a time, after the construction of the Big Four railroad that runs through the town in 1848, it was known as Richland Post Office.

The community was much more prosperous in the late 1800s and early 1900s than it is today. There were more railroad did a booming busi-nesses and factories and the ness, hauling livestock and land. The late Bart Guthrie, huntury to markets in Cleveland who operated a poultry packing plant in East Main street, daily shipped carloads of dressed poultry to Cleveland and it was a shipping point for livestock buyers.

I REMEMBER AS A BOY on my father's farm back in 1918 and 1919 of getting up early in the morning to help Dad put the hograck on his wagon and load hogs, which he took in the early morning light to Shiloh, which was a shipping point for the Bach-rack brothers of Plymouth. If I recall correctly they some-times shipped as many as six or seven carloads in a day.

The population of the town and township has not changed much in 100 years. According to the map of the Mosers the population of Cass township in 1856 was 1,431. The 1960 census lists the population as 1605 and the town 724. A 1890 census book in my possession lists the population as 661.
