Curtright's shot at 49 seconds gave Plymouth the lead and Fredericktown turned the ball over with seven seconds left, after playing cat-and-mouse with the Red defense to get the last shot.

Jim Glaque led all scorers with 21. Conley had 14, Cutright 14 and Brad Ream 12 for the losers, who're now 4-and-3 in the league and 6-and-4 overall.

Mrs. John Gundrum's topic was "Your Garden Indoors". Temperature is important, with 70 degrees by day and 60 degrees by night, she said. When foliage on plants becomes yellow and buds fall prematurely, it is undoubtedly because of the humidity. This may be helped by syringing the leaves with water once or twice a week. Ventilation is important to plants. Watering is necessary. Clay pots are better than plastic. Before putting plants in pots, the pots should be sterilized by using one part bleach to 10 parts of water. Liquid fertilizer is better than solid and should be used about every six weeks. For wintertime bloom, start byacintha in pebbles and water, or foliage, using carrot tops, onions or sweet potatoes.
