

# Record crowd sees Red win in new gymnasium

Before the largest crowd ever to see a basketball game in Plymouth, the Red improved on its rebounding and tightened its defenses in the second half to trim Clear Fork, 73 to 66, in a Johnny Appleseed conference game here Friday.

It was the first contest on the new gymnasium floor.

Red rebounded in the first half by the Colts, who shot so poorly they held only a three point lead after 16 minutes. Plymouth put a together early in the first period. The Big Red scored 10 points while Clear Fork was getting just two and changed the complexion of the contest.

The defense broke out Jim Martin, the game's leading scorer and perhaps the best player Plymouth has faced this season, and the rebounding improved once Bill Van Wagner was in the lineup to assist Jim Curtright. CURTRIGHT IS FAR AND AWAY the brightest hope on the local basketball scene in several seasons.

At 5:28 of the third period, Plymouth had climbed to a 41 to 36 advantage and it held on to a lead thereafter, although Clear Fork closed to within a point at 43 to 42 a few moments later.

The Colts committed three turnovers and Plymouth converted with its opportunities to take an eight point lead into the last period.

Clear Fork never got closer than six.

How the momentum of the game changed became clear after the third period. Plymouth scored 21 points on 20 advances and its first period had the most on 21 advances.

Clear Fork outbounded Plymouth overall, 52 to 44. Curtright took down 20 rebounds.

PLYMOUTH COULD not master the offensive boards. It managed only 13 offensive rebounds and 33 defensive ones.

Had the Colts shot with any accuracy in the first half, they would have blown Plymouth out of the gymnasium. The Colts succeeded with only 11 of 41 shots in the first half. Plymouth converted 12 of 28 and was 29 of 59 for the game. The Colts unloaded 76 shots.

Plymouth obtained a better record for free throw accuracy than it has shown for some time. The Big Red missed only nine of 24. The Colts failed with 12 of 52.

First scoring in the new gymnasium was by Lee Wilkins, the 6-5 junior, who bagged a field goal with 5:04 on the clock of the first period of the reserve game, which Plymouth won, 59 to 49.

The victory gives the Big Red a 7-and-4 record for the season and a 5-and-3 standing in the Johnny Appleseed conference. Clear Fork is 3-and-7 and 2-and-5, respectively.

A HIGHLIGHT OF THE reserve contest was the scoring of a goal at the wrong end of the floor by the visitors.

## Gas rate to go up, then descend before Mar. 2

Plymouthers will begin paying a few cents more a month for natural gas on Feb. 9, because of increases in the cost of gas at Columbus, Gas of Ohio, Inc., from its suppliers. It is announced.

An increase of 72 one-hundredths of a cent per 1,000 cubic feet of gas used becomes effective then.

On Mar. 1, however, a refund of 28 one-hundredths of a cent per 1,000 cubic feet, or about seven cents a month for the average customer who heats his home with natural gas.

The adjustments reflect increases in the cost of gas and refunds from suppliers, which are passed on to customers through provisions of fuel cost clauses in the village's contract with the company.

## Church ready, Feb. 7

Members of First Unitarian Presbyterian church will occupy their remodeled building for the first time on Feb. 7, the minister, Rev. Robert Bellingham, announced this week.

The building was heavily damaged by fire on the eve of its 180th anniversary on Sept. 18, 1969.

Since then, services have been conducted in First Evangelical Lutheran church and in Charles Rhine army in Sandusky street.

The fire was believed to have started when a heater was actuated by a thermostat during the night, when the temperature dropped abruptly, and kindling discarded clothing that had been collected for sale as rummage and for use by relief recipients.

An all-congregational dinner had been served on Sept. 17 by the church's Women's association in connection with the anniversary celebration.

THE CONGREGATION set a goal of \$53,000 for repairs and remodeling to the damaged building.

Four church school rooms and a study for the minister have been added. The basement facilities which house the kitchen have been expanded, but are not yet complete.

The building's main floor has been completely recarpeted.

A great part of the work has been done by volunteers from the congregation, including members of the Women's association, who have painted and landscaped.

The building which houses Plymouth's oldest church was originally purchased in 1885 by the Congregational church, which had abandoned it.

After a remodeling program, the church was formally dedicated Jan. 17, 1966, and was in constant use until the fire in 1969.
