## Where are my records? In the high school, that's where!

"I graduated from high school in 1954, now I'm retired and I'd kind of like to go back to school. But I can't for the life of me remember what courses I took in high school. How do I prove to the college that I'm eligible to enter?"

"I attended high school until 1909. Now I'm applying for social studies and can't prove my age. Can the school help me?"

The answer to these and similar questions

is yes, but don't push it too far, says Marion Wynn, high school principal.

Standards for secondary schools set by the Ohio department of education require that a continuing permanent record of every pupil be maintained by the school.

Records of recent graduates are available in considerable detail: courses in which enrolled, grade standing in class, test scores, counselor's appraisal,

principal's appraisal, attendance record, whether graduated.

Reports of such records are rendered in compliance with Ohio law on authority of the graduate of former pupils to prospective employers, credit investigators, banks, military and civil loyalty investigators, colleges, universities and trade schools and to police authorities when they are in legitimate search of data.

"The earliest record we have has been required to verify dates back to 1900," Rhodes says. "Records before that time are available but not nearly so detailed as those after 1900."

The first class to be graduated consisted of four girls in 1872. There were five years in which no class was graduated, so the 1971 class, which was to be the 99th, is actually the 92nd.

Total number of diplomas issued through 1970 is 2,025, of which 507 were issued between 1872 and 1933.

The total was four more than last year and included 282 mourning doves, two bluebirds and four white-throated sparrows.

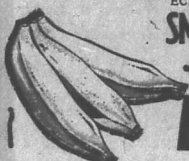

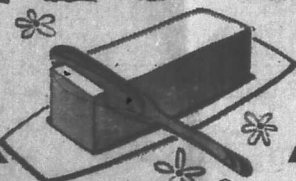

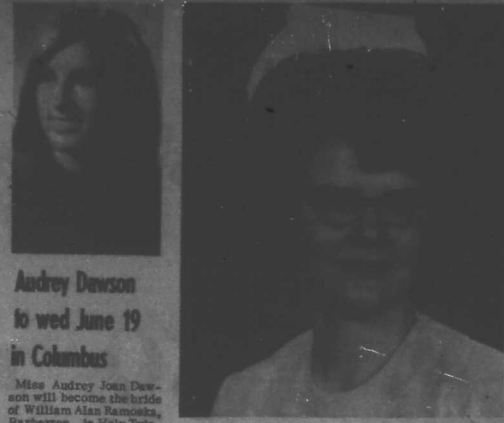

## Red whips Trojans, loses to Buckeye Central

A last ditch effort by the visitors to pull it out of the fire failed at the buzzer when Mark Pike was fouled. He converted two penalty shots after time had expired to put it on ice for the Bucks.

Jim Cutright's garbage basket with six seconds left had cut the lead to a single point.

Bill Van Wagner had an opportunity to narrow the Bucks' advantage with 35 seconds remaining. He was awarded two free

throws but converted only one. This reduced the Bucks to 57 to 54.

BUCKEYE CENTRAL outplayed Plymouth in the second period, when it scored 20 points and limited Plymouth to only 10, and managed to outscore the visitors by three in the third period. The Bucks moved the ball well and attacked the Red zone defense with some accuracy.

Plymouth's shooting was not good, 25 of 83. The Bucks were 21 of 56.

Coach Ron Hostler went to his bench to put life into his team and the result was more or less balanced scoring but not enough to win. Cutright is plainly the unsung hero of this team, which prospers as John Conley prospers and is a different outfit when he is on the bench or not on his game.

Ron Kimmel was the game's high scorer with 23. Cutright had 18.

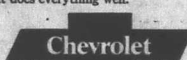
