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Two held for dope possession

James Elbert Gum, 21, New Haven, charged Dec. 10 by the state highway patrol with drunken driving, pleaded guilty on arraignment Dec. 10 and was sentenced to three months in jail to pay a fine of \$200 and court costs and to suspension of his license for 30 days.

Mrs. Myers rehired as school district clerk

Mrs. Kenneth V. Myers was reappointed clerk-treasurer of Plymouth Local School district by its board of education Monday night.

She was given a four-year contract on salary schedule.

And, as of Nov. 15, that salary level will be advanced.

Advised by Supr. John Fazzini that "for our purposes the freeze is off," the board voted unanimously to adjust salaries of all personnel, certificated and non-certificated, to what they would have been on Aug. 15, incorporating the new pay schedules, less any increases effective after Aug. 15 until Nov. 15.

The clerk was instructed to adjust all salary payments to conform to existing agreements, regardless of effective date, but to withhold retroactive payments (which apply in cases where annual increments are due) until the board determines how and when they shall be paid.

MRS. CAROLYN WEAVER, special education teacher, resigned, saying she is not qualified for the assignment, effective Jan. 21 or before if a replacement can be found.

The resignation was accepted.

A contract was offered, for \$4,445.85 for 107 days of service, beginning Jan. 3, 1972, to Jerry Julian, 30, Belpre, a graduate of the University of Illinois, Champaign, Ill., now doing practice teaching in FMR classes at Belpre. He is a four-year veteran of the Air Force.

Parents who transport their children to private schools will be paid \$38.49 for each child for the 1971-72 year, the board ruled.

Bids will be received next month for a new 66-passenger school bus. The board plans to offer one of its present vehicles in trade and anticipates a cost of \$9,000, of which \$5,400 will be funded by the state department of education.

Mrs. Cleith Lewis, Rome South road, was hired at \$1,386 for 105 days of services as regular bus driver. She has previously been a substitute driver.

First National Bank of Mansfield and Peoples National Bank, Plymouth, were designated as official depositories of the board for a two-year period ending Dec. 31, 1974.

State law requires Ohio deposit of school funds will apply to both institutions.

INCREASED FEDERAL subsidies on school lunches -- 40 cents for "need" children and sixty cents for others -- will probably mean the cafeterias can operate at a slight profit, Fazzini said.

INCUMBENT RICHLAND County Prosecutor of the Common Pleas, William F. McKee, will seek reelection, he announced.

He was elected in 1968 after serving as assistant prosecutor for eight years.

He says "we have maintained in Richland county a current criminal docket unequalled by any county of comparable size or case load without a reserve team, by an appellate court."

Richland County Common Pleas Judge Ralph F. Johns will be a candidate for judge of the court of appeals in May.

Johns, who heads the juvenile division of the Richland county common pleas court, gained statewide prominence when he won a mandamus action from the 5th District Court of Appeals, forcing the Richland county commissioners to build a juvenile detention center as required by state statute.

The lone dissenter was Judge Leland Rutherford, whom Johns is opposing in May.

Before his election as common pleas judge, Johns served as assistant attorney general under William Saxbe.

A native of Mansfield, Johns attended Ashland college and Ohio university and received his law degree from Ohio Northern university. He is married and the father of two children.

McKee says he has initiated court action to collect delinquent moneys due to the county, villages, townships and school districts during 1971 amounting so far to \$63,601.57. He says this program is self-financing and will not cost the county any additional funds.

The prosecutor's office has also, McKee says, instituted actions against welfare cheats, resulting in a saving of \$48,000 during 1971.

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At Fenton -- Village to pay \$300

Why did village council decide Dec. 7 to pay some of the expense of a sewerage connection in Fenton development?

Councilman Frank Garber, member of the sewer committee, said he and Councilman Edward O. Ramsey studied the problem and felt the developers should be paid the specified amount. The 80-foot connection actually cost \$366.40.

The connection was done, Councilman Robert I. Bachrach said, without any authority from the village, which is necessary for the connection and streets in the newly developed area more than meet the requirements, and although the developers had by passed the village approval necessary, the committee would try to smooth over the situation, which apparently has been the result of a "family feud."

Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., contends the developers should be responsible for the cost of connection of the sewer line since the ordinance states, but Forquer said that section 2 of the ordinance says any development under-taking previous to the passage of the ordinance does not fall under its requirements.

By motion of Bachrach, \$3,000 will be repaid to the electric fund from the general fund. The money was borrowed last year when the general fund was very low.

Second reading of a new trailer ordinance prepared by Garber was approved.

Staylor Houghton, executive secretary, Ohio Education association, was approved as commencement speaker in the high school May 28 at 6:30 p. m.

Panel truck will be used for transporting smaller groups of official school business. Its driver will be paid \$5.75 for each trip.

Red swamps Loudonville in league opener, 83-55

Contest at Lexington Saturday could be crucial for both teams

Brad Ream led Plymouth to an easy 83 to 55 conquest of unranked Loudonville in the first game of the 1971-72 basketball season here Friday night.

Ream scored 20 points. Plymouth took a 13 to 12 advantage with 1:47 on the clock in the first period and never was headed

thereafter. The Big Red won because it outbounded the visitors, 58 to 30 (Plymouth had 24 offensive caroms and 34 on defense) and because it outshot Loudonville, 48 per cent to 32 per cent, from the floor. Plymouth was not less effective from the foul line where it made nine of 12 tries, whereas Loudonville was only nine of 29. NEVERTHELESS, PLYMOUTH was not sensational. If indeed this is a derby winner, it needs much more work on the backstretch.

Without many of its mistakes derive from inactivity. The team was

forced to postpone its opener because of circumstances beyond its control and certainly those errors attributable to poor timing can be laid to lack of activity. Plymouth got balanced scoring from its five starters, only Jeff Fazio failing to get into double figures. Larry Taylor had 14, John Conley 12, Bill Van Wagner 11 and Lee Wilkins, employed as a swing man, scored 11. The name of the game this season is to deal with Lexington. Plymouth will have that opportunity this weekend, at Lexington. To defeat the Minutemen will require superior rebounding, accurate shoot-

ing and the fast break. The fast break depends almost entirely on the quick, accurate outlet pass. There was no sign

Friday that any of the underneth men can master that quick pass. That Loudonville was afforded 29 free throws in a

game in which it was clearly outplayed by Plymouth suggests that Coach Bryan Neff must exhort his team to reduce fouls. With a bigger opponent, the fouling can be painful. Plymouth plays Crestview in another Johnny Applesced conference game here tomorrow and tackles heretofore unbeaten Lexington Saturday.

Girls defeat Western Reserve, lose to Norwalk

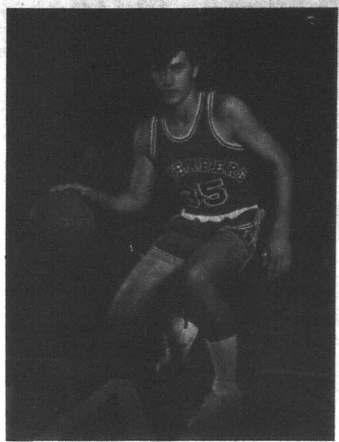

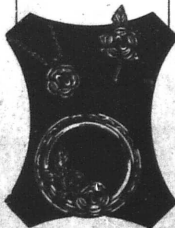

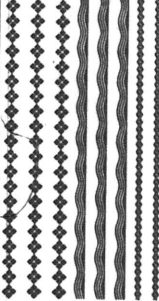

Brunch-Book'
It has 55 recipes for making various drinks with the white firewater that it advertises, but it's absolutely loaded with other mouth-watering things that are a little different from the average cookbook. But then, food for a brunch is a little different than what one would serve for breakfast, lunch, dinner or supper. Brunchy foods are all mixed up in various combinations.

Next to the vodka recipes, eggs are most popular; there are 53 ways of preparing them. The one which really sounds good is called Huevos De Los Charros. In English it is simply called 'Cowboy's Eggs'. This should serve eight, but if they look hungry, plan on this for five to

six. Start with a pound and a half of good ground beef, which you brown, adding a minced onion and a half of a teaspoon of thyme. When the meat looks as though it is browned enough, add salt and pepper, half a teaspoon of marjoram, one and half tablespoons of chili powder and three fourths of a cup of light cream.

Mash up three avocados and add a dash of coriander powder (if you do not have all these spices, best you suggest someone give you a whole collection for Christmas). Mince up another medium sized onion and add. Set aside while you put three tomatoes in a pan and more or less toast them for a few minutes. Peel them and chop them up. Mix with the other ingredients,

stirring until you have a paste. If you think it needs a little more salt and pepper, add it. Fry as many tortillas as you are serving people. While they are cooking, start frying two eggs a-piece for each person. When it is all finished, put a little of the meat mixture in the center of each tortilla with the avocado mixture in its center and the eggs on each side. Sprinkle it all with grated cheese.

FOR A NIGHT WHEN you want to finish wrapping presents rather than cook dinner, this can be a fast meal.

Sometime during the day chop up a cup each of onion and green peppers and peel two tomatoes and cut in quarters so they are ready. If you have fresh mushrooms,

have about a half of pound sliced ones, otherwise you can use the canned bits and pieces, since they aren't going to show very much. About a half hour before your dinner time, brown a cup of rice with the onion and green pepper in two tablespoons of oil. Add the mushrooms, tomatoes, a 12 ounce can of corned beef cut up, little can of Vienna sausages, also cut up, and one and

a half cups of water. Cover and simmer for about 20 minutes, then add a small can of drained peas and a half cup of sliced, pitted ripe olives. Continue cooking for about 10 minutes until the rice is done. This should serve about six.

Since this is all cooked in one pan, there will be fewer things to wash, so there should be time to make some really nice tree ornaments. This

An open letter to the Ohio High School Athletic Association:

Please be advised that the superintendent and other administrative and athletic staff members of this school district are completely opposed to the concept of an Ohio High School basketball Hall of Fame, including the reason for its existence; the method of subscribing funds for construction and; the expense of its maintenance; its method of selecting persons to be honored (whatever they may be); or items to be enshrined.

Please do everything in your power to help us stop the creation of this monster!

How could this project possibly stop with basketball? Is any other sport less important in the mind of the participant? Haven't we had enough "politics" in athletics with the stupid methods used by newspaper, radio, magazines, coaches associations, athletic conferences, and others in the selection of "all-star" teams? Do we have to do everything the pros do? Are we corrupting amateurism in high school athletics? Who gave the OHSAA the "authority" to endorse this project?

If this project is sanctioned, I would imagine the manufacturers of athletic supplies and equipment would be asked to contribute, resulting in higher costs to school athletic funds.

The brochure makes no mention of how the building will be maintained and operated; how large a staff will be required; and what their salaries will be.

We smell "private interests" and "political maneuvering" in the place -- all in the name of high school athletics. Won't this escalate the activities of Booster clubs and athletic conferences to produce winning at any expense? There is a great question now relative to who controls the athletic programs in high schools. This will further induce publicity campaigns and vote-swapping.

How can a coaches association impose a decision of this nature on the schools of Ohio, even receiving the endorsement of the OHSAA without a vote ever having been taken by the principals of Ohio's high schools on the matter? Why hasn't the Ohio High School principals association endorsed this project? How does the North Central association give its endorsement? BSA? The coaches association should be condemned for proposing such a wild scheme, and the OHSAA also for endorsing it (if indeed it has).

This project should be dropped immediately, even if a court injunction is necessary. We are officially making this request of the OHSAA, and would appreciate a prompt response from it on this matter.

It is not inconceivable that the Women's Lib group would object to this project which most certainly will not "enshrine" commemorative plaques on any females or female athletic events, at least at present.

This project will receive no financial support from Monroeville High school, one of the smallest Class A schools in the state, and we urge you to encourage every other school to turn down this nefarious scheme.

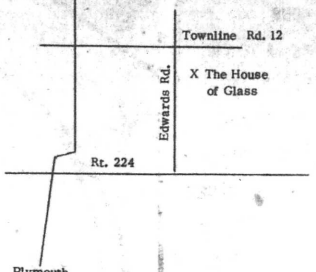

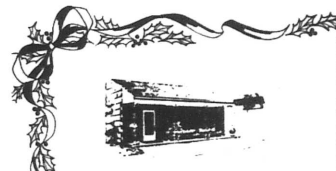

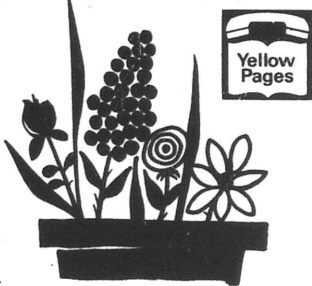
